Q Can you remember your first Oldham game?

That's easy. The promotion final against Keighley Cougars at Whitebank. I'd moved up to the North West in 2016 and my partner had been an Oldham fan for years. He asked me if I wanted to go and watch the match and I was really up for it.

Q Had you been to a Rugby League game before?

No, I don't think I'd ever really seen the game. I'm from a small place just outside Norwich and watched RU games such as England at Twickenham. I'd also been a season ticket holder at Norwich City for five or six years.

Once I'd seen that Keighley game though I was hooked. I loved the atmosphere and interaction with the players, the whole experience was really entertaining. Since that day I think I've only missed three or four games.

Q Most memorable game?

I'll never forget that first one, it helped with us winning the game and everyone was so happy. Since then there are a couple that stand out. The Bradford game at Bower Fold when Kieran Gill scored that try. Wow!

Then there was the second to last game in 2006 against Whitehaven where we stayed up in the Championship. There was so much tension and when the hooter went everyone was bouncing around on the terraces. We've watched the match video a lot and every time we notice someone new in the crowd going crazy.

Q Favourite player?

From the ones that left last season, Sammy Gee, I really wish he hadn't retired. In the current squad, Nealo is a big player for us and I love Benty. From what I've seen of the new signings, Zack McComb and Ben West look like they'll have a great season.



Q Do you have funny match-day story?

Last year when we were fighting for survival, we played Batley away and I didn't think we'd win there. I said that if we did, I'd streak across the pitch. In the second half we staged a great comeback to draw the game. As the points were going in I got a text off a mate saying "OMG get your kit off"! I've never been so relieved that we didn't win!

Q What are your expectations this season?

I'm very hopeful and so far so good. We seem to have a strong squad and if we can compete against the top teams in the league there's no reason why we can't go for that top spot.

Q Any thoughts on being back in Oldham at the Vestacare Stadium?

It's great, it's a tidy little stadium and the improvements to the playing surface and club house make a big difference. We were chatting to the Featherstone Lions fans last week at the cup game and they were very complimentary about the place.

When Oldham's 'famous five' twice floored the French . . .

GEORGE COWBURN continues his series in which he looks at Oldham's contribution to major events in RL history

IN 1957, when Oldham RL Club was a power in the land, the club had five players in the Great Britain team which played France twice in November that year.

The "famous five" were full-back Bernard Ganley, centre Alan Davies and forwards Ken Jackson, Sid Little and Derek Turner.

On November 3 Great Britain journeyed to the Stade Municipal in Toulouse and defeated France 25-14.

Oldham's players accounted for 19 points with Ganley kicking five goals and he, Davies and Turner each scoring a try, which was then worth three points.

In the return fixture at Central Park, Wigan on November 27, Great Britain triumphed 44-15. Ganley's ten goals remain a record against France which he shares with Jonathan Davies. Tries by Alan Davies and Turner saw Oldham players scoring more than half their country's points.

In 1958, at the Stade Des Alpes in Grenoble, four of the five retained their places in a 23-9 victory. Ken Jackson missed out. Ganley weighed in with four goals and Turner scored his customary try.

What of the players themselves?

Alan Davies was, in most peoples eyes, the best centre ever to play for Oldham and his Test record bears that out.

At a time when he faced stiff competition from other greats such as Neil Fox and Eric Ashton, Davies played 20 times for Great Britain while he was at Oldham. With 391 appearances for the club - 174 tries and one goal - he was an original member of the club's Hall of Fame, and rightly so. With plenty of pace, good hands and a significant physical presence, he had all the skills plus ebullience and confidence a-plenty to make a great centre.

In any discussions about the greatest goalkicker in Rugby League, Bernard Ganley's name will always be to the fore.

In the club's 'End of an Era' brochure commemorating the last match at Watersheddings, that doyen of Rugby League historians Robert Gate wrote of Bernard: "He just had to look at the posts and it was a goal".

In the 1957-8 season Ganley became the first player to kick 200 goals in a season for a club and his total of 219 goals has only been beaten by the 221 kicked by Salford's David Watkins in 1972-3. Needless to say, Ganley is Oldham's record points scorer with 2,761 comprising of 1,358 goals and 15 tries in his ten years at the club.

lad who signed from amateur club Waterhead in 1950. It took him a little time to cement his position in the side but once established the open-side prop was a fixture until his retirement. A real grafter, he helped

Ken Jackson was a local

his hooker Jack Keith to ensure Oldham got plenty of possession from the scrums as well as contributing fully on attack and defence.

In addition to his two Tests against France, Ken went on the 1958 Great Britain tour to Australia. Sadly, a serious leg injury early in the tour meant he was unable to add to his Test appearances. Ken made 243 appearances for Oldham, scoring 24 tries.

Sid Little joined Oldham in 1952 from Harlequins Rugby Union club and enjoyed eight seasons at Watersheddings, appearing 249 times and scoring 49 tries. An ex-RAF pilot, he was a fast running forward who formed a formidable second-row partnership with Charlie Winslade. Sid played ten times in a row for Great Britain. surprisingly mostly at blind-side prop.

Derek "Rocky" Turner played only four seasons for Oldham but his leadership, fierce determination and no little skill made the looseforward the cornerstone of the Oldham team of the mid to late fifties.

Like Alan Davies, Turner faced fierce competition for his Test place from the likes of Johnny Whiteley and Vince Karalius but he still played in 11 Tests while at Oldham and would have toured Australia in 1958, having been selected, had he not been injured. He went on to tour in 1962, by which time he was with Wakefield.

An inspiring, forceful leader, Derek made 134 appearances for Oldham, scoring 35 tries and one goal.

Oldham back then were not only the talk of the town but one of the best footballing sides ever to grace our great sport.

ONE-TIME fans' favourite Lucas Onyango, the Kenyan winger who had six good seasons with Oldham, is back at the club to assist the coaching and backroom staff on match days.

Since leaving Roughyeds for Oxford at the end of the 2012 season, he's qualified to work in sport with a degree in coaching and sports development and a masters in exercise and sports science.

Aged 36, his playing days are over, but he is keen to find his feet in a sporting environment and what better place to try, he said, than the club for which he scored 73 tries in 108 appearances between 2007 and 2012 and appeared in three Grand Finals in 2007, 2009 and 2010.

Said club chairman Chris Hamilton: "Lucas got in touch a few weeks ago to say he would like to get involved again at the club. "We are more than happy to help him with that so he will be assisting initially at home games in and around the dressing room and from the bench."

Lucas watched the Keighley Cougars preseason game and he was in action for the first time at the cup-tie against Featherstone Lions, helping with the warm-up and other duties during the game.

He said: "I loved my time with Oldham and although I live in Manchester I've always regarded Oldham, town and club, as my second home. It's great to be back here.

"I've been coaching young people at the Mancunians club, but it will be brilliant to be back with the Roughyeds and in a professional environment.

"I loved my six years at the club and it brought back a lot of memories when I was on the pitch



at the Featherstone Lions game and some of the fans recognised me and acknowledged me. I think it was Kev and his group. That was nice, really nice.

"As for the pitch, what a beauty ! Had it been down in my day I'd have scored a hundred tries !".

Injury interfered with his last two seasons with us, but over the four seasons 2007 to 2010 inclusive he scored 62 tries in 87 games - a superb ratio of tries to games.

First formed as York Football Club in 1868, the Knights are celebrating their 150th anniversary this year.

Ownership changes at the end of 2016 led to an unsettled 2017 preseason for York but they almost managed to turn adversity into triumph by reaching the semi-finals of the League 1 promotion play-offs. Whitehaven's golden point drop-goal from Steve Roper cruelly ended their promotion hopes after an epic battle at the Recreation Ground and a game that lasted a full 105 minutes.

Coach James Ford has sought to build a team for 2018 that can battle it out for promotion places and push for a return to the Championship after an absence of 5 years. Former Hull KR players Ben Cockayne, Graeme Horne and Will Jubb should bolster Ford's squad and with a dual registration agreement in place with Hull KR, a wealth of Super League talent is available to the Yorkshire club.

Colton Roche, a propforward who played two games for Oldham in 2012, has joined York on a month's load period from Huddersfield Giants, similarly, so has Aussie Kieren Moss from Hull KR.

Round 1 of this years Betfred League 1 competition saw York host relegated Bradford Bulls at Bootham Crescent. A close game ensued with Bradford taking the spoils with the last kick of the game and a 22-20 win. York were left lamenting disallowed scores and considered themselves unlucky. Impressively, the game was played in front of 4281 spectators, the highest home attendance achieved by the Knights for a competitive match since the club re-formed in 2003.

Challenge Cup action followed the Bradford game and a trip up to Askam in Cumbria. The amateur side were beaten 64-4 and the Knights



have been rewarded for their efforts with a round 4 tie against Swinton Lions.

The weather conditions resulting from the socalled beast-from-the east meant postponed fixtures for all League 1 clubs in round 2 last weekend. Todav should see a return to action for both sides and York will be looking to build on the encouraging start to their current campaign. They visit the Vestacare Stadium today for the first time since 2015 hoping to put a dent in Oldham's equally promising start.

James Ford has praised Oldham's two shut-out games so far this season, impressed by the fact that both Whitehaven and Featherstone Lions failed to register points. Quoting Oldham as favourites for today's game, he went on to say that his side would need to be right on the money to have a chance of recording a win in Oldham.





Three to watch York City Knights



Andy Ellis

33yr old Derbyshire born hooker with bags of experience. Began his career at Hull KR before moving to Barrow Raiders in 2007. Spent three seasons in south Cumbria where he scored 53 tries in 94 appearances, leading his club to the Championship title in 2009 and claiming the division's man of steel award along the way.

Spells with Super League sides Harlequins and Wakefield Wildcats followed before joining Featherstone Rovers in 2012. Joined York in 2018 after coming out of retirement which was seen as a major coup for the Knights.



Ben Cockayne

A product of his local amateur side Normanton Knights, 33yr old Cockayne began his professional career with time at Hunslet Hawks and Doncaster before landing a contract at Hull KR.

A full-back or wing, he went on to play over 200 times for the Robins and score 71 tries in two periods at the club.

Released from Craven Park at the end of the 2017 season, he was quickly snapped up to play for York in 2018.



Connor Robinson

Came through the academy system at Hull KR and made his Super League debut for the side in 2014.

A brief loan spell with Coventry Bears was followed by a move to Halifax in 2015 where he helped his new club achieve a top four Championship place.

Released by 'Fax in June 2017 due to work commitments outside the game, a move to York benefitted the player due to reduced travelling from his home in Hull.





Vestacare Stadium granted RFL dispensation

WE confirm that, as in previous years, the RFL has granted dispensation for our use of the Vestacare Stadium in 2018 although it doesn't have the requisite 500 seats.

The club acknowledges the stadium doesn't meet RFL minimum standards in terms of Betfred League 1 seating capacities and says it is grateful to the game's governing body for granting the dispensation.

In reaching that decision the RFL took into account recent investment in the stadium and its subsequent refurbishment.

News of the RFL's green light was another huge tonic for the club in the run-up to the first home league game of 2018. ...

FOLLOWING our two latest wins - 14-0 at Whitehaven and 42-0 in the cup against Featherstone Lions -- fans have been wondering when we last 'nilled' opponents in successive matches.

It last happened in 1963 against York at Watersheddings (17-0) and then away at Whitehaven (19-0). Before that, you have to go back to 1956.

Since Oldham RLFC (1997) was launched, the closest we had come to it previously was in 2001 when we beat Queensbury 64-0 in the Challenge Cup and then demolished Chorley Lynx 56-2 in the next game.
