HELLO everyone and welcome to today's game against Newcastle Thunder at the Vestacare Stadium.

Our opponents today come to us in a strong fifth position in the league and with plenty of confidence, having run Doncaster and York close in two home games.

Their head coach, Jason Payne, has had a strong start to the season and you can see why when you watch them play with speed in the ruck and with an open, attacking game whenever they have good ball.

They make very few mistakes in yardage, so they give little field position away. Add to that a great attitude and a belief that they can match it with anyone and you realise why Newcastle

are a much different challenge this year than they have been in recent seasons.

Our game at Workington was extremely pleasing to be involved with as a head coach.

We showed lots of grit and determination, especially in defence, but for long periods we were also much calmer with the ball than we have been in earlier games.

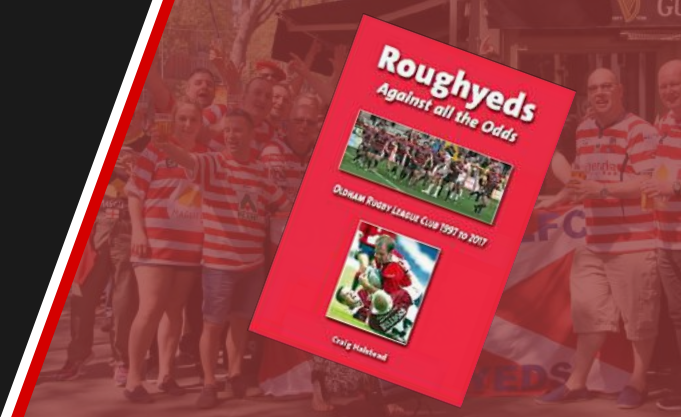

Roughyed Fan Focus:

Howard Mayers

Q How long have you been watching Oldham?

I've been watching the Roughyeds about 30 years, on and off. I don't think I can count my first few visits to Watersheddings as I was only eighteen months old! I started watching properly in the 86/87 season.

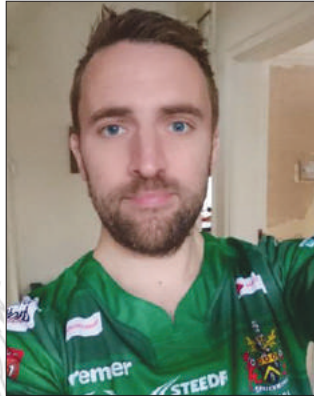
Back then it was very much a family affair with my Dad, Mum and younger sister meeting up with extended family in the social club before the game and also after the game. As a youngster I would eagerly get autographs from both Oldham players and their opponents particularly if we were playing one of the bigger teams.

Q Any favourite players past and present?

There have been so many over the years. I was always a huge fan of John Cogger in the eighties, he was a real handful for any opposition. I was also a fan of Hugh Waddell, Charlie McAlister and Paddy Kirwan. I think my all-time favourite from back then would have to be Mick Worrall; I thought he was absolutely outstanding and very exciting to watch. Notable players from recent seasons are Michael Ward (it's been nice to see him at a few games this season), fans-favourite Sam Gee, Danny Langtree and of course the return of Gilly.

Q Do any games stand out in your memory?

I suppose one memorable game for all the wrong reasons was the Challenge Cup semi-final at Central Park. I remember being so excited at the prospect of the team finally getting to Wembley made even more poignant with Oldham Athletic making it to Wembley on the



same weekend (I still live in hope), If only Paul Lord's try had been allowed.

Another memorable game was Oldham's first season in Super League and particularly the trip to France to see Oldham take on Paris St-Germain. We didn't get the result but it was a fantastic weekend away to Paris setting off from 'sheddings on a coach and going on Le Shuttle for the first time.

Q Do you have any favourite away grounds?

Favourite away ground of yesteryear was a toss-up between Wilderspool, Central Park or Thrum Hall. Current favourite away ground is a visit to NW Crusaders which I think is a cracking little setup.

Q Can you recall any funny moments watching Oldham?

I think one of my favourite moments was the night at Watersheddings when Oldham played Warrington although I can't remember the exact year. A fan ran onto the pitch and tackled the bear (our mascot at the time) he then saluted all his mates in the Watersheddings stand and got a cheer. What he didn't bargain for was the mascot tackling him back and then a Benny Hill style chase took place all over the pitch.

Q Any thoughts on this season?

I think a lot of people underestimated some of the quality in this league and whilst we had some early successes notably the performance at Halifax, we then had a couple of disappointing performances getting beaten by Hunslet, Bradford Bulls and narrowly by York. I'm really buoyed by recent performances though and I believe we have the right squad to get us where we need to be with promotion being the end result.

GEORGE COWBURN continues his series in which he looks at Oldham's contribution to big events in RL history

RUGBY Union had its Four Nations and at football England were playing the other home nations, so what about the Northern Union?

Despite having a parochial attitude (the clue is in the name) the Northern Union decided it needed an international match too.

So on April 5, 1904 England lined up to play an Other Nationalities side consisting of ten Welshmen and two Scots.

Hang on, that only makes 12 . . . what happened to the others ?

Conscious of the need to counter the growing popularity of association football, the Northern Union were looking for ways to make the game more open and spectator friendly.

One idea was to reduce the number of players in a team from 15 to 12 or 13, so it was decided to play the international as an experimental 12-a-side match.

The game was hardly a classic. Even so, if a couple of clubs had voted differently at a subsequent meeting of the Northern Union we could have been watching a 12-a-side game for the past 114 years or so.

In the England side were two players from Oldham - Joe Ferguson and Frank Spottiswoode. A third member of the side, James "Jumbo" Lomas, would become an Oldham player a few years later in 1911.

The Other Nationalities side was captained by Oldham's George Frater, a Scotsman, and also included two Welshmen from the

Oldham club in Dai "Ginger" Thomas and David Lewis plus a Scotsman, Jim Moffat, who played for Oldham from 1896 to 1901 before moving to Leeds.

Joe Ferguson had an incredible career with Oldham, playing in 627 games for the club in a 24-year period.

A hooker or prop forward, he won every honour available with Oldham apart from a Challenge Cup winners medal and he held the record for many years of being the game's oldest player.

He also shared, with James Lomas, the distinction of playing international Rugby League at 12, 13 and 15-a-side.

First he played an international under the old rules (15-a-side), then he played against Other Nationalities in the 1904 12-a-side match and then he played in two 13-a-side internationals, including one in which he captained England to victory over the 1907 New Zealand All

Golds.

Frank Spottiswoode made his debut for Oldham in September, 1901, playing in 112 games and scoring 45 tries. A winger, he was signed from Carlisle Rugby Union club and played for Cumberland in both codes.

A record fee of £300 secured the services of James Lomas for Oldham when he transferred from Salford in January, 1911.

The powerful well-built centre or stand off (hence the nickname 'Jumbo') was a superstar of his era, captaining the ground-breaking 1910 Great Britain tour to Australia and New Zealand.

Other Nationalities captain George Frater signed for Oldham from the Melrose club in Scotland in time for the start of the 1896-7 season.

He made 262 appearances before retiring after the last game of the 1904-5 season. A tough, hard-working forward, he later emigrated to New Zealand.

Dai Thomas, one of two players in the Other Nationalities side with the same name, played 61 times for Oldham, missing only one game in his last season of 1904-5. A back-row forward, he was signed from the Cardiff Rugby Union club.

David Lewis, signed from Swansea RU, appeared only 26 times for Oldham, playing either in the centre or at scrum half.

Jim Moffat, also from Melrose, played 96 times for the club, making his debut on Christmas Day, 1896 before leaving for the Leeds club. A versatile forward, he also played for Lancashire, as did Frater and Dai Thomas.

The match was originally due to be played at Watersheddings on New Year's Day, 1904 but it was

postponed due to severe frost and played instead at Wigan's Central Park ground in the April.

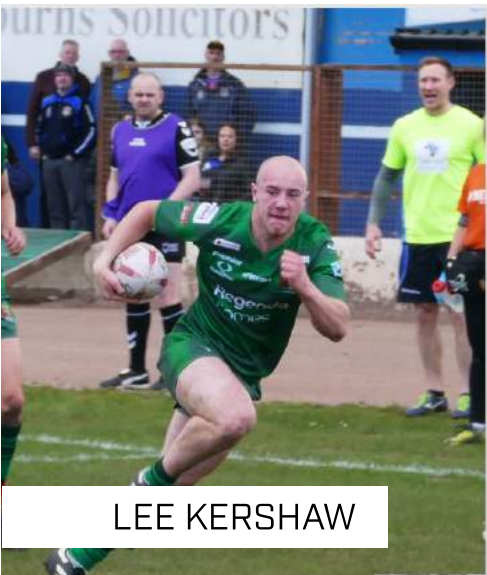
Unfortunately, due to incessant rain, the pitch was heavy and the weather kept the crowd down to 6,000.

The score was 9-3 in the Other Nationalities favour. England's try was scored by Warrington winger Jack Fish and the Other Nationalities tries went to David Harris and one apiece for each Dai Thomas. Neither side was able to kick a goal in this first-ever international.

Turning back the clock . . .



OUR 32-10 win at Workington was special for Scott Naylor in more ways than one.

In more than 30 years of going to Derwent Park as player and coach -- and that's with Bradford, Salford and Oldham - it was the first time he had ever sampled the satisfaction of ending up on the celebrating side.

"A first . . . it's a good feeling," he said, with a smile on his face, as the Roughyeds players belted out their victory song in the dressing room.

"I deliberately didn't mention it before the game, for obvious reasons, but it won't be a secret any more!"

Then off he went to enjoy the moment after handing over the duties of dealing with the post-game media interviews to his right-hand man and close friend Peter Carey.

Chairman Chris Hamilton, meanwhile, was savouring the extremely sporting and complimentary comments that were being made about the Roughyeds by Town officials and by their young coach Leon Pryce.

"We looked a League 1 side," he said. "Oldham looked like a Championship outfit."

On the long journey home the question was asked: When did we last win at both Workington and Whitehaven in the same season?

Answer: Not as long ago as you might think, the 2000/2001 Northern Ford Premiership season when we won 22-6 at Workington on December 17, 2000 and 16-15 at Whitehaven on June 17, 2001.

In Scott's tenure as coach we had played only once at Workington, prior to last Sunday, and that was a 23-12 defeat in the 2016 Championship season.

A glance at the team that day, which includes only six players who are still at the club, shows the extent of the turnover on the playing roster in the last two years.

Home sweet home in May and June

SOMETHING that separates us from rivals in Betfred League 1 is the fact that each of our seven games has been against a team from the 'northern powerhouse'.

Four have been away - at Whitehaven, North Wales, Bradford Bulls and Workington -- and we've won three, including two in Cumbria.

Of our three home games - York, Hunslet and Keighley - we were beaten by York and Hunslet, but we redeemed ourselves by defeating the Cougars.

Two things are set to change. Starting today, four of our next six league games are here at the Vestacare Stadium and all but two of the six will be against teams we can loosely describe as 'southern' sides.

Note, too, that we then travel to Llanelli for the West Wales Raiders game on SATURDAY, May 19 (3pm) and that the home game with Doncaster -- a potential cracker -- has been moved from Sunday, May 27 to Sunday, June 3 (3pm) because the Vestacare is unavailable on the weekend of May 26 and 27.

After today we've got Hemel, West Wales, Coventry and London Skolars in our next five, but the immediate focus is on today's opponents, Newcastle Thunder, who are above us in the table and lie in the play-off group with Bradford, Doncaster and Whitehaven.

Only two points separate Hunslet (9th) and Doncaster (3rd) and Doncaster chief executive Carl Hall has said

publicly that Super League has gone backwards while the Championship and League 1 have kicked-on.

He told League Express that the progression of Championship and League 1 under the current system was there for all to see, adding: "League 1 now is where the Championship was four years ago.

"League 1 is stronger than its ever been. The Championship has kicked on too and I honestly believe the game is progressing fantastically well outside of Super League, which has gone backwards.

"Super League clubs are scared stiff about the Super 8s this year because there could be three, or even four, Championship clubs who could take their spots at the big table. They're terrified."

Our Visitors

Newcastle Thunder

We welcome Newcastle Thunder to the Vestacare Stadium today for our first encounter with the men from Kingston Park since August 2015. That fixture was played up on Tyneside when Oldham were in the midst of an unbeaten run that would ultimately lead to promotion.

A tough encounter saw the two sides fight tooth and nail for the two points with Oldham's Sam Gee enjoying an early bath in the 62nd minute. The result could have swung either way with Thunder taking full advantage of their extra numbers. The luck stayed with Oldham though and a late try for centre Tom Ashton sealed the win for the Roughyeds.

Newcastle finished in eighth place in 2015 and so sought a higher finish in the 2016 season. Seven wins from 14 games saw them finish in ninth place, one position short of the newly introduced League 1 Super 8s competition. That meant they contested the League 1 Shield which they went on to win, beating North Wales Crusaders 27-20 in the final.

Last season in 2017, Newcastle finished sixth in

the regular season, winning nine out of 15 games. That meant a place in the Super 8s which led to a semi-final contest with Barrow Raiders. The Cumbrian side comprehensively defeated Thunder at Craven Park by 60-0 but nevertheless the club had rallied in the latter stages of the season under interim coach Jason Payne who would go on to take-up the position permanently.

For this season's promotion push, coach Payne has signed Theerapol Ritson and Connor Fitzsimmons from Workington Town and Castleford respectively whilst managing to hold-on to key players in his squad such as hooker Evan Simons and second-row Harry Aldous.

This season Newcastle started off with a trip to South Wales but due to an absence of necessary medical supplies, the game at Stebonheath park was abandoned and Thunder had to make the 367 mile trip back to the North East without throwing a pass.

London Skolars were to provide the first competitive opposition for Newcastle at their New River Stadium. The Thunder team must have been raring to go since



they turned over the North London side 60-16.

Since that resounding victory in the south the rest of the season has seen mixed fortune for Jason Payne's side. A narrow loss at home to Doncaster was followed by an away victory at Coventry Bears. Further wins against North Wales Crusaders and most recently Hunslet Hawks are set against losses to York City Knights and Keighley Cougars.

Newcastle and Oldham have eight points each from seven games and are level in the table. Our visitors sit in fifth place compared to Oldham's seventh due a 14 point superior points difference. A Thunder win today would advance them towards the play-off places whereas an Oldham win would see the Roughyeds leap-frog our opponents in a similar quest for the end of season promotion challenge.

There's much at stake then for both teams and today's game should be another good spectacle in this year's competitive League 1.

Neal blow as specialist gives his verdict

PROP Adam Neal could be out of action for several weeks following the blow to his head in the home game against Keighley Cougars on April 15 which Roughyeds won 32-18.

He was knocked out in a 65th-minute tackle that was placed on report with Oldham 24-18 ahead in a thrilling game that was very much in the balance at that stage.

He was led from the field, never to return, and Roughyeds went on to seal victory with a Liam Bent try and two goals by Paul Crook.

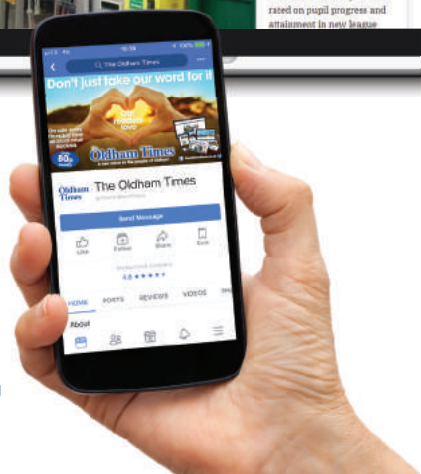
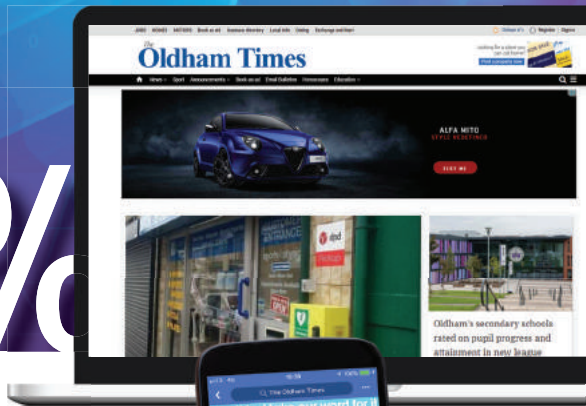
