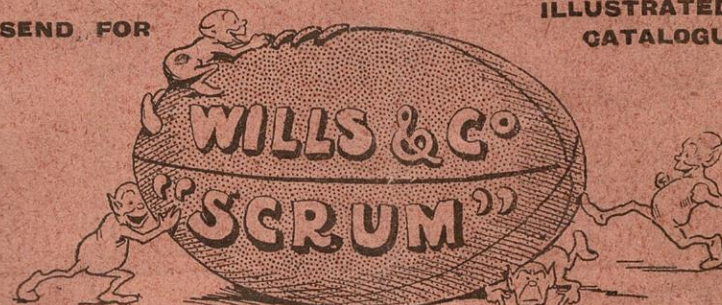

## REAL PROGRESS

**Real Reasons.** At this late hour there would be little method in our devoting space in the "Northern Union News" to an explanatory notice of Northern Union football, even though this, our International number will probably be read by many, who for the first time made the acquaintance of our game at Coventry this afternoon. The reasons for establishment were real, and that those who severed their connection with the English Rugby Union were thoroughly justified, will be granted by all conversant with the conditions of the time.

\*\*\*\*\*

**A Spirit of Prejudice.** What we regard as coming within our sphere of usefulness, is the making of reasonable comparisons between the old game and the new. Now when the original founder's committee of the Northern Union commenced their gigantic task of construction, they were faced with apparently over-whelming difficulties. In the first place the area was strictly limited. Then the opposition was formidable, but above all was the spirit of prejudice which prevailed amongst those who were opposed to professionalism at any cost.

\*\*\*\*\*

**Opposition Overcome.** It has taken years to overcome this unfair opposition. We say unfair advisedly, for our opponents are remarkably inconsistent. They actively support professionalism in other branches of sport, but for some reason or other Northern Union professionalism is not palatable. However, time has narrowed the breach, and events of recent years have shown that the sport-loving public of the British Empire are far seeing, and that our game is by virtue of its attractiveness, to obtain a high position in the

realms of sport. We never doubted for one moment that any other result was possible, and that ultimately we should triumph over prejudice.

\*\*\*\*\*

**Efforts to Attract.** All this has only been attained by hard work on the part of those officials responsible for the modern Rugby game. They, years ago, realised that the public demanded a change, and to combat successfully the rapid growth of the Association game in Rugby strongholds, the old code must be brought more up-to-date with the spirit of the age. Call it what you will, outdoor sport must be attractive to make progress, and the Northern Rugby Union were not discouraged in their attempts at reformation, by the carping criticism, with which their efforts were invariably received.

\*\*\*\*\*

**Opportunities for Comparison.** They persevered in their object, and this afternoon at Coventry, Midland Rugby enthusiasts will have, we hope, a splendid opportunity of making comparisons. Elsewhere these comparisons have been favourable. We need not revert to the triumphs of the Colonial tour, or to the desire of the Australasian League to visit England next season. These facts speak for themselves. We cannot make our point more than by quoting a well-known Australasian writer. He said, respecting the Northern Union game: "Their (the players) nationality was not the attraction; their football reputation is no greater than that of the New Zealanders. **It is the League game, and nothing but the League game, that captured the public.**" We leave it at that, confident that Midland sportsmen will be fair critics.

## LEAVES FROM MY NOTE BOOK.

## The County Cup.

The County cup competition resulted in the trophies being secured by the two leading teams in the respective Counties—victories perhaps in accordance with popular anticipations. Even though the margins in favour of the successful sides were somewhat small, the League records of Oldham and Wakefield thoroughly entitle the cup holders to the honours of the day, and last Saturday's contests at Manchester and Leeds, were but confirmation of the wonderful consistency exhibited for nearly half the season.

## Old Matches—New Dates.

The cup competitions have been so much before the public of late, that the League competition is somewhat neglected. Matches get in arrears but the League committee are fixing up dates at every meeting, and on Tuesday confirmed the following:—

Leeds v. Dewsbury, from December 3 to December 27; Broughton Rangers v. Hull, from December 3 to January 3.

These two games were postponed last Saturday through the cup finals being played on the home grounds, the compensation of course, being a 10 per cent. commission on the "gate" receipts.

## The Rovers' Grievance.

That the work of the League committee does not always prove satisfactory is apparent from the protests lodged by Hull Kingston Rovers and Bramley. The first named club declare that the Hull club has broken an implied agreement between the two Hull clubs and the League, that no games should clash at the Boulevard and Craven street. Last week Hull re-arranged a postponed game by fixing up the match for the day on which the Rovers were at home, and I understand the matter is to be gone into fully by the League committee.

## A Natural Complaint.

Bramley's complaint is one of a somewhat different character. The complaining club take objection to playing Wakefield Trinity, on Tuesday, December 27, and would much rather entertain the Yorkshire cup holders during the mid-week. To those who do not understand the objection, I should explain that Wakefield Trinity visiting Barley Mow, on any day other than Saturday, or a public holiday, the Yorkshire cup holders would be compelled to give Bramley compensation to the amount of a third of their share of the cup match takings on the day of the original match. Bramley, not unnaturally perhaps, prefer a "compensated" match. This matter also will be considered by the League committee.

## Fines for Late Starts.

In addition to other important matters, the League committee, on Tuesday, inflicted fines for late starts on Bramley and Hull Kingston Rovers, 10/-; Leigh, 8/-; and St. Helen's, 5/-. This being the regulation 1/- per minute.

The Bradford and District Intermediate Union also reported the Batley club for signing on a player without their permission. After hearing the evidence, the committee decided that the claim of the Intermediate League should be sustained, and Batley were ordered to strike the player in question off their register.

## Batten and Hunslet.

After all the negotiations for the transfer of W. Batten, the famous Hunslet three-quarter back, to Oldham, have fallen through. I learned last week end that the clubs had agreed as to the amount of the transfer, but the arrangements were not completed between the Oldham club and the player. I believe that Oldham had agreed to pay Hunslet £250 when the transfer was legally completed—a sum equal to that paid by Leeds to Oldham for Phil Thomas. However Batten and his old club have made peace, and I look forward to the famous back resuming his playing connection at Parkside, with mutual benefit to himself and his club.



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## Notes and Notions.

(By A. S. M.)

I HAD not sufficient space at my disposal last week to deal with the question of the eligibility of players for Cup tie purposes. To-day is the first round of the qualifying stage of the Union Challenge Cup, and although my comments will be too late for to-day's games they may be of service for the future.

\*\*\*\*\*

### A Ruling Point.

My remarks of course will apply chiefly to the clubs in the qualifying stages, as I venture to think the rules governing the points are pretty generally understood by the Senior clubs. There appears to be a certain impression that a Junior club is at liberty to utilise a player in the Cup ties who assists them in their League matches, even though such player plays for them under a permit from a Senior club. That is, he is a professional of the Senior club, but the latter, not requiring his services at the time, allow him to play for a Junior.

### New Senior Rule.

Now such a player is not eligible to play for the Junior club in the Cup ties. He is not a bon-fide member of their club, and strictly speaking he belongs to the Senior club. This point appears quite simple, but my readers would be surprised to learn the number of communications that the Union secretary receives on this question each season. Senior clubs cannot play any player who has not signed his League or professional registration form, prior to February the 1st., in the current season. It is not necessary now for him to actually play for his club before that day, as in past seasons.

### Progress at Broughton.

I was in conversation last week-end with certain prominent officials of the Broughton Rangers' club, and was particularly pleased to hear that although they are not doing as well as they would

like, in a playing sense, yet they are doing considerably better than they did last season financially. I could not quite understand this, and said so, and was informed that the reason was that they had now got a team of "triers," and although they did not win so often, their spectators knew that the men were striving honestly to the last ounce, and it was appreciated. Their "gates" are up 30 per cent. on every home match this season. This is only the just reward of the new committee's efforts. It would surprise some clubs' officials to know what the Rangers' committee have actually done to lift the club out of the mire. Right manfully have they put their shoulder to the wheel.

### Coventry's Victory.

The victory of Coventry last week was exceedingly pleasant reading to me, although it was at the expense of Runcorn, who I regret to say, appear to have struck a bad patch. Still to win on the Cheshire club's ground is no small feat, and I hope it will be the forerunner of many more such successes. Coventry people will have another treat in store next Saturday, when the famous Wigan team are due to visit them. The gate should be a "bumper."

### A Ruling Required.

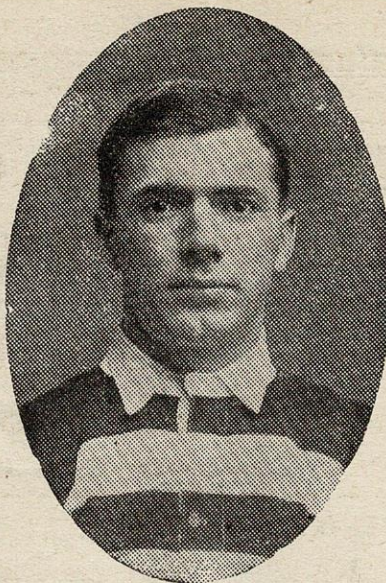

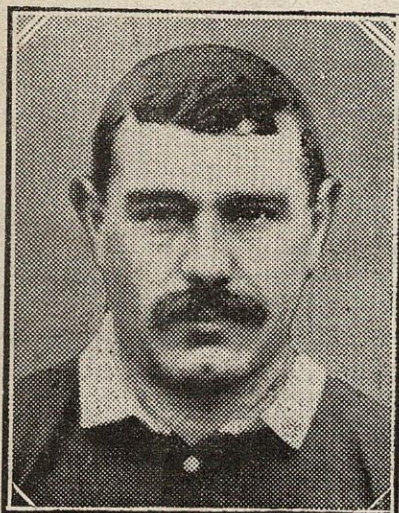

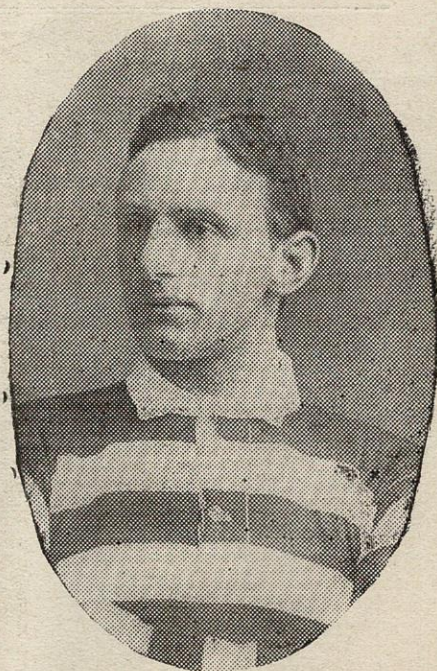




J. THOMAS, (Welsh Captain).

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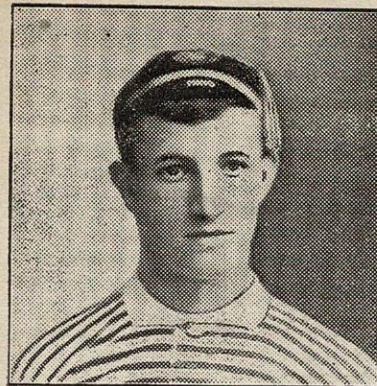

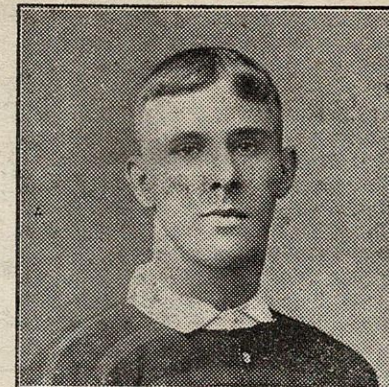

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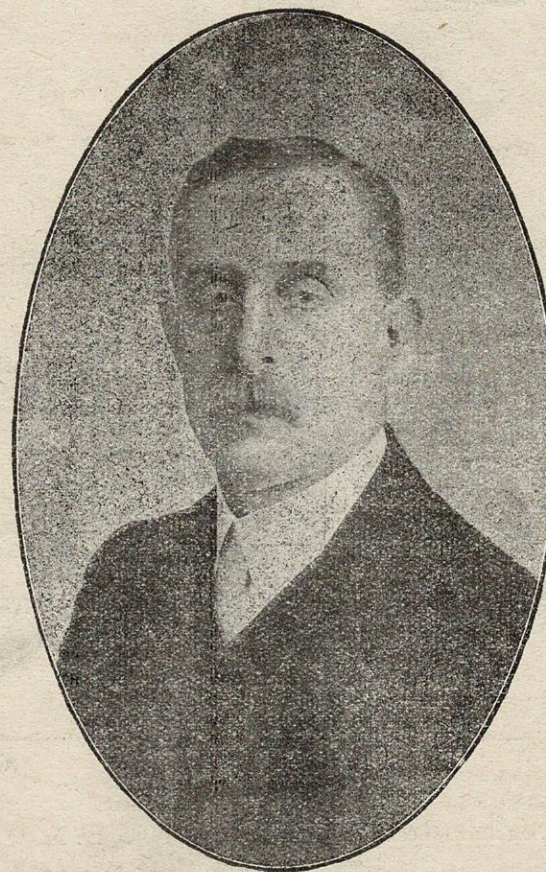

## The Season's Internationals.

### ENGLAND.

\*\*\*\*\*

#### Ellis Clarkson (Hull).

Full-back. Played with Leigh up to the present season, and his transfer to Hull was regarded as the surprise of the close season's negotiations. Was selected for the corresponding game last season, but injuries prevented him playing at Wakefield. A native of Leigh, and regarded locally as the finest full-back-back in the Northern Union.

#### James Leytham (Wigan).

Left wing three-quarter back. Came from Lancaster to Central Park. Last December completed an aggregate of one thousand points for the Wigan club. Scored 255 points during season 1908-9. Born at Lancaster. 5-ft. 9-ins; 12-stones, 8-lbs. Played 12 matches during the Colonial tour, scored 5 goals, 12 tries.

#### James Lomas (Salford).

Centre three-quarter back, and captain of the team. County honours for Cumberland and Lancashire, and has every possible honour conferred upon him by the Northern Union. In 45 games for Salford has scored every point, and for the sixteen years he has played football, always top scorer for his club. Born at Maryport. 5-ft. 7-ins; 13 stones, 5-lbs. Played in 13 matches during the recent tour, scored 53 goals, 10 tries, and defeated Messenger in the famous goal-kicking competition.

#### H. Wagstaff (Huddersfield).

Centre three-quarter back. Yorkshire's most promising three-quarter, who by his abilities has worthily earned the right to appear for his country. Is only 19 years of age. 5-ft. 11-ins., and 12 stones, 4-lbs. Born at Underbank, and played for that club when 15 years of age, prior to joining the Huddersfield team. Is also a cricketer of more than average merit.

#### J. Miller (Wigan).

Wing three-quarter back. A local product of the Wigan club. First played for Pemberton. Appeared in the Northern Union team against the "Kangaroos" at Glasgow, and played twice for Lancashire County this season. Age 24; 5 ft. 7-in., and 11-stones, 7-lbs.

#### Fred Smith (Hunslet).

Stand-off or scrummage half-back. County honours for Yorkshire and International for England. Born at Woodlesford. 5-ft., 6-ins; 12-stones, 5-lbs. Played 12 matches in Australia and New Zealand, and scored 12 tries.

#### T. White (Oldham).

Stand-off half-back. One of the most consistent players in the Oldham side this season, and unquestionably England's best outside half-back. Came to Oldham from Bath. Played for Bath and Bristol, and County honours for Gloucester (R.U.) and Lancashire (N.U.) Born at Bath; 26 years of age.

#### William Jukes (Hunslet).

Forward. Played for Featherstone Rovers. County honours for Yorkshire, and International for England. Born at Featherstone. 5-ft. 8½-ins; 12-stones, 10 lbs. Played 12 games in Australia and New Zealand, scoring 10 tries.

#### F. Webster (Leeds).

Forward. Played with Brotherton. County honours for Yorkshire. Born at Chesterfield. 5-ft. 9-ins; 13-stones, 4-lbs. Played 14 matches in the Colonial tour, and scored 5 tries.

#### W. Winstanley (Leigh).

Forward. Played with Platt Bridge. County honours for Lancashire, and International for England. Born at Platt Bridge. 5-ft. 9-ins; 13-stones, 9-lbs. Played 14 matches for the Union during the Colonial tour, and scored 5 tries.

#### A. E. Avery (Oldham).

Forward. Scored 13 tries in 13 successive games for Oldham. Played for Plymouth and Devonport Albion. County honours for Devon (23 times) and Lancashire. Born at Buckfastleigh. 5-ft. 10½-ins; 14-stones, 4-lbs. Played 10 times in Australasia, scoring 7 tries.

#### H. Kershaw (Wakefield Trinity).

Forward. Played for Wakefield (R.U.) County honours for Yorkshire (R.U.) Born at Wakefield. 5-ft. 8-ins; 12-stones. Played in 10 games during the recent Colonial tour, scoring 5 tries.

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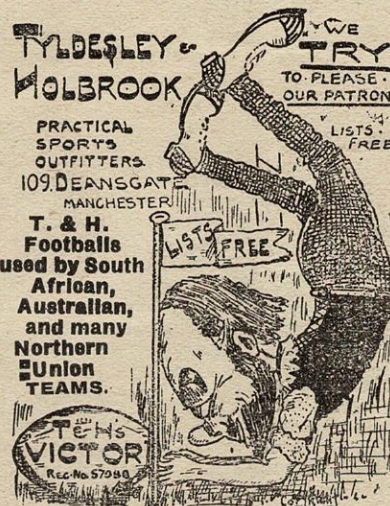
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## The Season's Internationals—continued.

### John Tomes (Coventry).

Forward, of the fearless type. Played with Newbold, Rugby, and then Coventry. During his first season with the last named club he secured his Midland Counties cap. Was one of the first to sign a form for the new Coventry club. Born at Newbold, 25 years ago.

## WALES.

### "Chick" Jenkins (Ebbw Vale).

Centre three-quarter back. Played for Pontypool and Hull. County honours for Monmouthshire (R.U.), and International (N.U.), for Wales against "All Blacks," "Kangaroos," and England. Born at Cwm. 5-ft. 8-ins., and 11-stones, 6-lbs. Played 10 matches in Australasia, scoring 4 goals, 3 tries.

### L. J. Llewellyn (Ebbw Vale).

Wing three-quarter back. Played for Pill Harriers (Monmouthshire League club) Monmouthshire County, eight times, and then joined the Ebbw Vale club. A particularly speedy "winger," and two seasons ago scored forty-one tries. Born at Newport; 29; 5-ft., 5-ins., and 9-stones, 12-lbs.

### Phil Thomas (Hull Kingston Rovers).

Centre three-quarter back. A most important asset to the season's most prolific scoring team in the Northern Union. Came from Wales originally to Oldham. From Watersheddings he went to Headingley, and after service with the Leeds team, was transferred to Hull. Held the record up to the present week for the highest transfer fee ever paid for a Northern Union player.

### Bert Jenkins (Wigan).

Underbank Res. could only draw at Slaithwaite. Had a few of the Intermediate teams got into swing earlier, the League leaders would not have occupied such a commanding position.

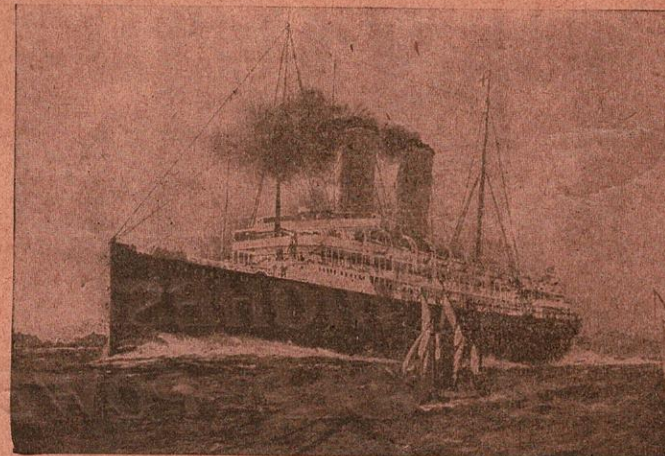
