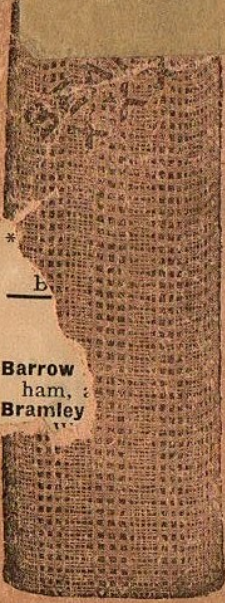


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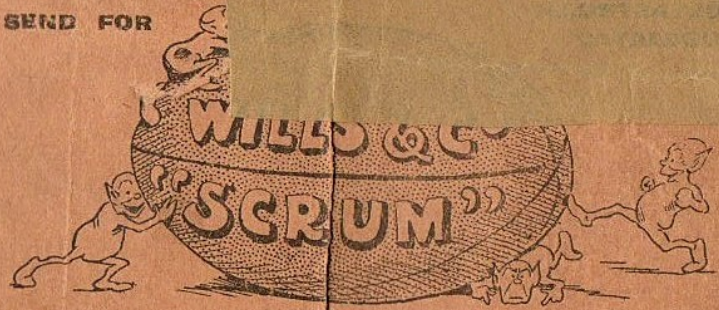

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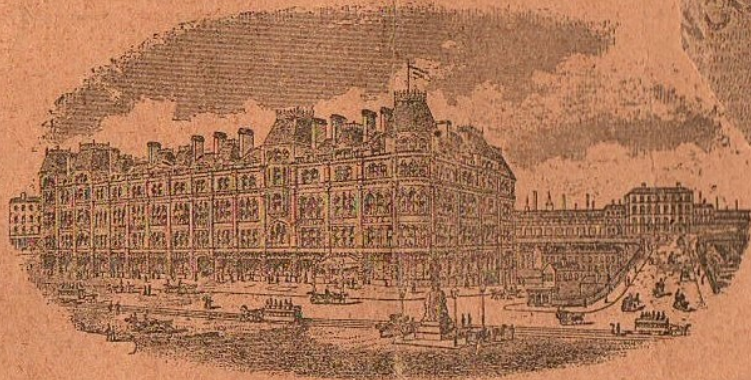

There will in due course, be added to the professional rules, a bye law, which in effect will state "that any player signing a recognised form of the N.U. (any League) or playing under N.U. rules, over 17 years of age, be an acknowledged N.U. player." So hurry up boys, and enjoy yourselves while you are young.

Never were the prophets more **Rochdale's Re-Play.** confused than by the result of the Rochdale v. Oldham cup-tie. We ourselves were at fault, but we must acknowledge our error and congratulate the Hornets on their most note-worthy victory of the season. From a financial point of view the success from the cup-ties assures Rochdale of a record year.

Oldham's withdrawal from **Players' Ambitions.** the challenge cup competition, will allow the champions to concentrate all their efforts on retaining the League trophy. But there is all the same, a feeling of disappointment at Watersheddings, where several prominent members of the team were anxious to sport a cup medal. And James Lomas, up to a week ago, appeared likely to attain the height of his ambition after weary years of waiting.

The question raised by a club **Full Strength!** with "first four" possibilities, as to the Bradford and Hunslet match is somewhat peculiar. In the game under notice, Hunslet won, and it was alleged that their success was assisted by the Bradford officials only playing a weakened side. The inference, of course, was that the Yorkshire team were saving themselves for the cup-ties.

The League committee who **The Penalty of Age.** considered the matter, whilst agreeing that the explanation of Bradford was not entirely satisfactory, found that the circumstances did not constitute an infringement of the rule. As the match was played at Bradford, and Hunslet were not to blame, no good purpose could have been served by any other decision. And with all due respect to the complaining club, Bradford must of necessity pay a penalty by playing veterans.

MY NOTE BOOK.

The International Teams.

(By THE EDITOR).

THE various committees of the Northern Union have had a busy week. The cup semi-finals needed attention, and there was the selection of the teams to represent England and Wales, at Ebbw Vale, next Saturday. Then the League had several important matters to consider, and as the Lancashire County committee also held a meeting, the gathering on Tuesday was unduly extended.

England v. Wales.

As the cup-ties are dealt with elsewhere, I will take the International match; the teams for which are as follows:—

will also regret the absence of two such formidable players from the ranks of the visitors, even though they themselves will be without Blackmore.

Backs of Merit.

On the whole I think there will be little adverse criticism of the selected sides. I thought that possibly Willie Thomas of Salford, would have received his well-merited "cap"; but the game is at Ebbw Vale, and there Chick Jenkins is a power in the land with his colleague Llewellyn. Lomas has of late been playing so well that his selection was assured and I am pleased to see the officials persevering with Wagstaffe. The English back division is sound in every department, and should, I think, be capable of holding the spry Welshmen.

Powerful Scrummagers.

Two powerful packs will take the field. Five of the English side were members of the team which toured the Colonies, and the sixth—J. L. Clampitt, the Broughton captain is little inferior to his colleagues. The Welsh six are also particularly strong, for the men are noted for their brilliance, both in the loose and in the packs. If the weather conditions are favourable there should be another high scoring game, and I have sufficient confidence in the Englishmen to say that they will give a vastly different display to that of the corresponding game last year. All the same I am inclined to think Wales will win. There is a something about Ebbw Vale which works detrimentally for England.

The First Four.

It appears somewhat paradoxical to find only one team in the cup competition interested in the League championship. But it assures the League of a really hard finish, for apart from Wigan, the ambitious clubs are now able to devote their whole attention to qualifying for the supplementary tournament. The all important game between Wigan and Oldham, postponed last Saturday through the cup-ties, has been fixed up for next Wednesday, and the Rochdale Hornets' match with Wakefield, fixed for last Wednesday, will also be played on the 29th inst.

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Notes and Notions.

(By A. S. M.)

THE meeting of the St. Helen's club to discuss the question of the conversion of the club into a limited liability company, which was dealt with by a colleague last week—raised a subject, which I have for some time had in my mind, and one which I purposed dealing with when opportunity arose.

An Important Question.

Now I do not think there is a club in the Northern League which has not been at some period of its history, confronted with this very question. Mr. Houghton, at a meeting of the St. Helen's club, raised very strong objection to the suggested course being taken. It was argued that it would provide the club with additional funds to secure first-class finished players. And it was on this point that Mr. Houghton based his objection. I am quite prepared to support his line of action, but from a different standpoint. Much has been said for and against imported players, and also local talent.

Limited Companies and their Effect.

There is however, another aspect of the case, which to my mind is very often lost sight of, and it is one which has as great, if not even greater bearing on the future of a club, than the question of "foreign" or local talent. And that is the financial side. Several clubs have in the past been converted into Companies, but I cannot recall a single instance in which a club has received any real lasting benefit from such conversion. I may be wrong in saying this, and am open to conviction, but it is my opinion. What then is the cause of the ineffectiveness of the conversion? It strikes at, and weakens the principle support of the club, the main prop as it were—the membership.

That the members are the backbone of a club, yea, even the very essence of the life of a club, will not I think be questioned. The greater the membership, the greater the success of a club. Such being the case, it only stands to reason that if a club is converted into a company, it is to be governed by a body of directors and shareholders. The members have not the same voice in the management. They may have a vote at the meetings of the club, but they cannot appoint its committee, or rather directors. They begin to feel they are in

the club, but not of the club. They begin to feel that instead of it being the club—as it were, they have degenerated into mere ticket holders, and their enthusiasm for the club commences to wane. They may still be as keen for the game, but they feel they are outside the pack. Their members begin to diminish and with the diminishing membership comes the gradual falling away of the "gates."

An Instance.

I could give many instances in support of my contention. But I will confine myself to one, and that of a club not above 100 miles away from where the "News" is printed. The members of that club, at one time used to look forward to their annual meeting. It was the event of the year. Long before the time of opening they were waiting. Large numbers even used to come without tea. Hundreds were present at each meeting, and very often the number present used to exceed four figures. The club was then turned into a limited company. Do the members regard the meetings with the same interest now. No! Where there were hundreds prior to the conversion, now they can be counted in tens, and the membership roll has correspondingly decreased year by year. The club has had its ups and downs, but I question whether it ever was in as serious a strait, as it was at the commencement of the present season. The result of a conversion may show an immediate improvement, but it is not of a lasting nature.

County Qualification.

The Lancashire County committee, at their meeting held on Tuesday last, had the question of qualification of County players before them. Nothing definite was done in the matter and it was decided to defer further consideration to the next meeting.

A Claim for Cadishead.

The claim of the Cadishead club for the full amount of the guarantee in respect to their friendly match at Pemberton was dealt with at the same meeting. It will be remembered that the latter club protested against paying the full amount, as their opponents arrived with a depleted team, and they alleged their "gate" suffered in consequence. Their protest was upheld. Cadishead will therefore have to accept the terms offered by Pemberton club, which to my mind were fair and reasonable.

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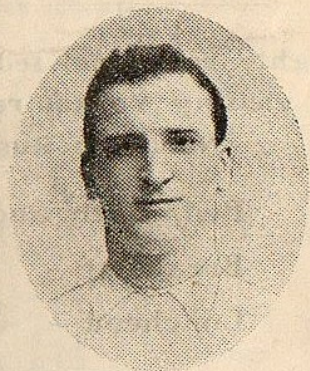

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Play and Players.

No. 15—GEORGE MARSDEN (Bradford).

(By OBSERVER.)

THE revival in the fortunes of the Bradford Northern club is one of the features of the present season. And perhaps to one player more than any other in a persevering side, the fact gives pleasure to "Garge" Marsden, whose name has so long been associated with Bradford Rugby football.

He was, in his prime, a half-back, of more than ordinary ability. And to-day one detects flashes of the brilliance, which secured Marsden, at a very early age, his International cap for England.

He is yet a striking personality, even if his movements shew advancing age; and his attempts at opening out the play for his three-quarter backs reveal the genius. Marsden is by no means an orthodox half-back. His great reputation was not built up by movements which were easy of imitation, and he had no set rules to work by.

Always on the Alert.

Rather did he take the opportunities as they were presented. Always on the alert, his typical dash, his graceful breakaway, and his "drawing" of his opponents, enabled Marsden to rank as a player, both feared and respected by opponents.

He possesses a great reputation for defensive play. His native doggedness stood him in good stead, and I have recollections of a great match in which he was especially prominent, when fortune had apparently deserted his side.

He was here, there, and everywhere. He tackled in a style which made heavier men green with envy, an never once during an exciting and strenuous struggle, did an opponent shake off George Marsden.

On the home side, they had in this particular match, one of the most famous wing three-quarter backs who ever played for a Lancashire club. He was noted for his flying dashes, and he had seemingly evaded every Bradford defender. With only twenty yards to cover, before crossing the line, the try seemed inevitable, and the crowd were preparing to celebrate the event in the usual manner.

A Shock for Fish.

But suddenly a wearer of the Bradford jersey sprang up, apparently from the ground, and the flyer was captured. The sudden check caused something more than mere surprise, and when the tackler arose, it was seen that the Yorkshire player was Marsden.

"Ah," remarked a Warrington supporter, "only George Marsden could have done that!" Need I say more than the Warrington "flyer" was John Fish.

Marsden was a player of repute before he joined the Northern Union. He played thrice for England under Rugby Union rules, and has had every football honour possible to a player of either code of rules. His abilities were by no means confined to the half-back position, for he has played at centre three-quarter back for Yorkshire in County matches. He was born at Morley, near Leeds, in 1880.

The Challenge Cup.

Semi-Final Matches.

ALTHOUGH the departure of Oldham from the cup competition has taken away one of the most attractive teams in the Union, the qualified four for the penultimate stage are sides capable of providing attractive football. Lancashire will have three, and Yorkshire one team, and again has the fortune of the draw, gone against the Tykes, for Batley will need to oppose Lancashire's strongest side.

The meeting of Wigan and Batley will be at Huddersfield, and is a contest which appeals to every Yorkshire enthusiast, who expects "Wattie" Davies and his colleagues, to amply avenge the disaster at Headingley. One cannot make comparisons from League games, for the semi-finalists have not met in this tournament. And the doings of the sides so far in the cup competition is not helpful for the critic. Both Batley and Wigan have accomplished much, and the form of the Yorkshiremen at Salford was a veritable eye-opener to the local crowd.

Batley's Brilliance.

Unquestionably are Batley a talented team. They do not possess perhaps the combination of Wigan, but as I have many times pointed out cup-tie football is vastly different from ordinary League displays.

The cup means, that every player in a contesting side, plays with a purpose. Individualism is predominant, and Batley's team contains many men with big reputations. "Wattie" Davies is yet a tactician to be respected. He has willing colleagues to follow his lead, and behind him is Lyons, one of the most promising full-backs in the Northern Union.

The powers of the forwards are well known, and at the present time Batley are playing well. But so are Wigan, and as I said of the match at Leeds, if the Wigan scrummagers hold their own, and give Gleave and Thomas their share of the ball, then I think Batley will find

in Wigan, a much more formidable opposition that was put up by Salford.

But the match will only be decided after a most strenuous struggle. There should be a record crowd this season for Huddersfield, for the meeting of two such sides promises a feast of football.

Hornets of Renown.

Rochdale Hornets have proved themselves well worthy of inclusion in the last four. To hold their own at Watersheddings, and then to triumph in the re-play is a performance which their most optimistic supporters never dreamt of. But they persevered, and are now to have their reward. In Broughton Rangers they will have worthy opponents. Like the Hornets, the Rangers possess a smart set of forwards, and there should be a great struggle for supremacy in this important feature of the game. Behind the scrummage, I regard the backs as most evenly matched.

In the League tournament, Rochdale have won both matches at home, by two points to nothing, and at Broughton by 21 points to 10. But since these disasters the Rangers have improved wonderfully, and I consider the result most open. But the Hornets, after Tuesday will be the popular favourites.

W. Willis, the new forward at Park-side team, has already given great satisfaction to the Hunslet officials. Hailing from Ryton-on-Tyne, he is 18 years of age, and scales 13 stones, 3 lbs.

"Wattie" Davies, the Batley three-quarter back, and Gath, their veteran forward, took part in the semi-final, with Salford, at Watersheddings in 1898. Both played on Saturday last at Salford.

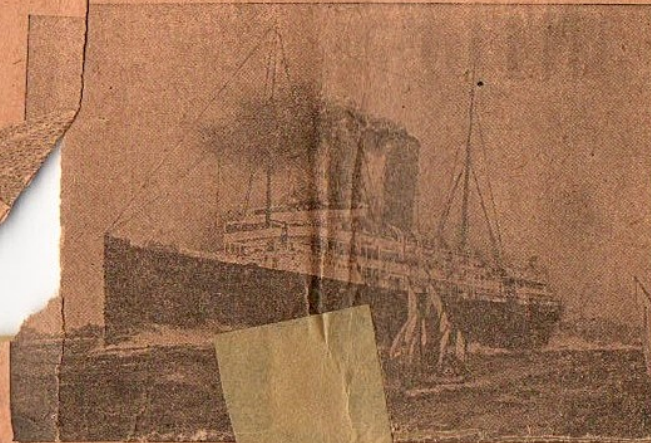
