





STRAY THOUGHTS ON THE LEAGUE SEMI-FINALS.

(By OBSERVER)

Will Wakefield Win?

A couple of months ago I could have written in a much more eulogistic tone of appearing in the League semi-finals. of Wakefield Trinity. But unfortunately is apparent to the most casual observer I was at Huddersfield a week ago, and who glances at their League record. there I witnessed, as far as Wakefield were concerned, a particularly weak display, even after making every allowance for the enforced absence from the team of three or four stalwart backs.

Unlike Wigan or Oldham, the Trinity officials have not unlimited reserves to fall back upon. When at full strength, they are unquestionably a brilliant combination who support each other in that typical style which one associates with a purely local side.

But they have fallen on evil days in regard to injured players, and only the remarkably consistency of their earlier displays has brought them the honour of appearing in the semi-finals.

At their best, Wakefield give magnificent displays. From the veteran fullback, Metcalfe, to the youngest forward, the football provided is in thorough keeping with the reputation of the gallant team, which two years ago, so deservedly won the challenge cup.

The men adapt themselves to the prevailing conditions, or perhaps a better description would be to the moods of their opponents. If it is to be hustle and bustle, then Crossland and his colleagues are equal to all demands.

If the modern open game is to be played, then will the forwards secure possession, and Newbould and Slater, supported by those two centres of ability, Lynch and Poyton, indulge in play which kept Wakefield so well ahead for many months.

Recent results have spoilt a good record. But Wakefield need not be ashamed, for they are a good third, and but for their misfortunes, I feel confident that their finish would have been in thorough keeping with their earlier their appearance in the final tie.

Wonderful Wigan.

That Wigan have well earned the right

True they have been beaten by Huddersfield in the race for the aggregate record, but the fact must not be overlooked that the Yorkshire club play more matches,

And when we come to consider the defence, Wigan's superior figures entitles them to the first place, in what is after all a most remarkable season, even for such an accomplished side as that at Central Park.

Already two cups have gone to Wigan, for Oldham's defeat at Broughton, on Monday, made Wigan the winners of the Lancashire League. But they are more ambitious. To-day they expect to advance another stage towards the League cup, and of course next Saturday they do battle for the Northern Union Challenge oup.

Brilliant back play, efficient combination, and wonderful resource have been the features of the majority of their matches. Occasionally they have had lapses, and there have been times when the forwards were not doing their duty. But making every deduction, the plain fact remains, that of the first four clubs in the Northern League, Wigan excel their nearest rivals for the scoring of tries by 152 to 113. Even the mighty men of Oldham have finished one short of the century. Wigan have passed the halfway mark towards the second century.

The task of defending the position they have attained has been doubly difficult during the last few weeks. Players have been injured and there was indication apparently of staleness. But a wonderful defence eventually triumphed, and a finish of the League season, thoroughly in accord with the sides glorious traditions has to be recorded.

Right well have Wigan won their entry performances. As it is I cannot predict into the brief tournament which is to decide the League championship.

Stray Thoughts on the League Semi-Finals.

The Rise of Widnes.

Few, very few, Northern Union supporters would have ventured to predict last September that Widnes would to-day be engaged in the fight for the League championship.

Whilst other teams were announcing with the usual flourish of trumpets, the "capture" of this, or the other star, Widnes were quietly gathering together that stalwart band of local lads who have brought honour and glory to the town.

I admire the spirit which has prevailed at Widnes. True, the side has been well coached, but I give greater credit for the many magnificent displays to the enthusiasm which has prevailed amongst the team since the beginning of the season.

If the side has not scored tries with the freedom of some teams even lower placed in the competition, the defence has proved absolutely the best in the Northern League. The backs have neglected no opportunity to improve their scoring aggregate, but at the same time they have tackled surely, and looked well to the more accomplished attackers, perhaps who have been operating on the other side.

Candidly I do not expect them to progress further to-day. But they have demonstrated to all interested in the development of Northern Union football, that it is possible to bring up local players who will play the game as it should be played.

They owe much to Lally in the backs, and Aspey, in the forwards. These two veterans, have by their kindly words of advice, encouraged their younger col-leagues, and I expect much from Widnes in the future. Like another team who have surprised everyone by a remarkable display of gradual improvement this season, Widnes are a young side, and will naturally improve.

They have had a particularly hard struggle to qualify, but that the painstaking efforts have been rewarded is apparent by the fact that never in the history of the club has so much interest been taken in the goings of the team, than during the present season.

This means financial gain, and all records for "takings" were beaten long ago. And I remember a few short years back the outlook was particularly gloomy. Well done, Widnes, and may other struggling teams follow your lead.

Are Oldham Stale?

Like their Yorkshire rivals, Oldham have of late paid the penalty of greatness. Every opposing side—and the description, of course, applies to the other three semi-finalists, is anxious to defeat Oldham, and this close attention, in addition to making victory doubly difficult, oftentimes results in minor injuries.

But Oldham have finished with a percentage equal to Wigan, and superior to any other team in the Northern League. And they are not strangers to this distinction, for they were the champions last season, and the fact also should not be overlooked that they are the holders of the Lancashire County cup.

And but for the slip at Broughton on Monday, they might have added to their stock of trophies. But Oldham as I said before, are now paying the penalty of their greatness.

However, few will deny their right to appear in the deciding tournament of the Northern League. They have, particularly at Watersheddings, a brilliant record of successes, and what is more to the point, these glorious victories have been attained by bright and glorious football.

Defence has been maintained not at the expense of attack, but the two essentials have been interspersed in a manner which has proved disconcerting to opponents, and delightful to supporters.

I have distinct recollection yet of these great cup triumphs against Hull Kingston Rovers and Wakefield Trinity. The Yorkshire teams were out to win, and I doubt the ability of any side in the League to have successfully stood the test in defensive play as did Oldham on those two memorable occasions.

Like their great rivals, Wigan, they have had their ups and downs, but their wonderful record this season is such that thoroughly entitles them to once again appear in the great games to-day.
