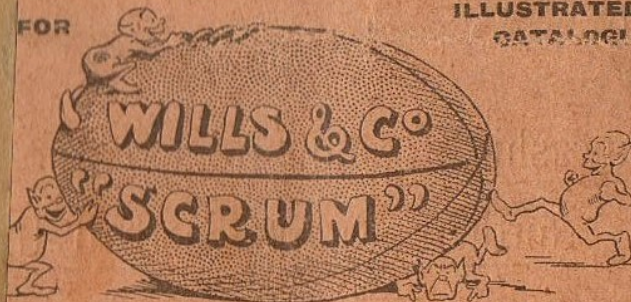

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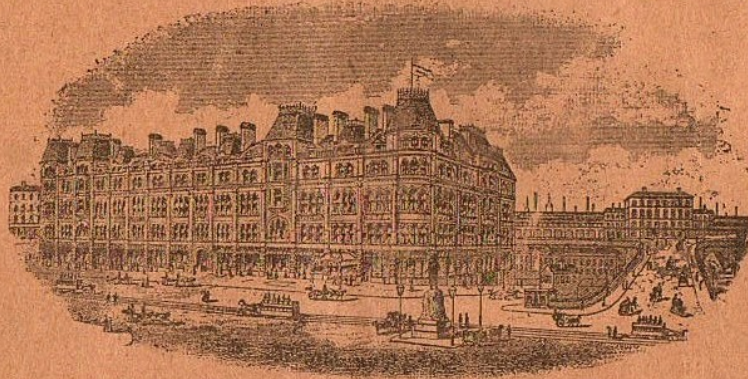

## MEN AND MATTERS.

**The League Tangle.** The unexpected finish in connection with the Northern League tournament came as a surprise even to the League officials, and the hurriedly called special meeting on Tuesday had to face a situation without precedent in the history of the League. But the officials could do no other but interpret the rules, in the way they did by ordering Wigan and Oldham to play a deciding game. Possibly, for next season, provision will be made for a similar situation.

**The Holiday Matches.** As usual, the holiday games have provided some surprising results, and all round, clubs have demonstrated superior scoring powers. Wigan have exceeded the sixth century, and Huddersfield have just passed their seventh, and it is worthy of note that six teams in the competition have scored more than a century of tries.

**Huddersfield's Fine Record.** Huddersfield have finished their season with a remarkable run of victories. Not since January 2 have they been beaten in a League match and during the three closing games of the season, the value of their attack has been clearly demonstrated. Forty-four points against Wakefield. Thirty against Warrington, and forty-seven against Broughton Rangers, is we should sav. a record for a week-end series. They play the game at Fartown.

**The Cup Final.** We are pleased to learn that present indications point to both the cup finalists being represented by their strongest sides next Saturday. Both Wigan and Broughton Rangers have during the last few weeks been obliged to leave out players of ability, but fortunately all the injured men are reported as progressing favourably, and all will be fit for the important contest at Salford next Saturday.

**A Great Goalkicker.** "Bunker" Carmichael, the Hull Kingston Rovers' captain, has put up a record, of which Hull is deservedly proud. Albert Goldthorpe had figures of 109 goals in one season, but at St. Helens, on Monday, Carmichael made his season's record into 117. This wonderful performance will, we think, stand for some time, but we would ask readers to note that goal-kicking appears to be a popular pastime of late at Fartown.

**Wigan v. Oldham.** The hurriedly arranged match to decide the leadership of the League, was played at Wakefield on Wednesday, but from a playing point of view was not a success. The game was of course a League match, and according to rule, each side must be a representative one. Probably more will be heard of the matter, but the offending team, Wigan, won by 11 points to 3, and the situation looks particularly interesting.

MY NOTE BOOK.

(By THE EDITOR).

TUESDAY last practically brought to an end the season. We have of course, the League final and the Cup final, but after to-day these games will probably only interest three clubs. That the season has been the most eventful in the history of the Union must be admitted. We commenced with the welcome home of the victorious team, which as events proved, fairly established our code in Australia and New Zealand. Then the Earl of Derby accepted the Presidency of the Union, and we finish up with a gracious act of Royal favour from His Majesty, the King.

A General Advance.

There will be of course, isolated cases of depression and disappointing returns. The poor we shall always have with us, but I think on the whole the club reports will reveal a most striking increase in public patronage, and that at home, as abroad, real progress will be found to have been made. Clubs who are in low water need only look to Widnes, as an example of what can be accomplished if their teams will only play the game in a proper spirit.

Junior Development.

Another point which gives me pleasure is the great increase in the number of junior clubs, both in Lancashire and Yorkshire. Our club officials are at last turning their attention to the encouragement of local talent, and in this respect I think the outlook for next season is particularly bright. The code has not caught on as yet in Wales, but this temporary failure is in no sense due to the game itself. Against this we are able to report the possibilities of new ground being broken in North Lancashire, Cumberland and Westmorland.

Possibilities for Next Season.

And next season we are to have a visit from those players who have done so much for our code in the Colonies. The

reports which are to hand as to the probable constitution of the side, point to a brilliant combination, which should thoroughly test the best side which any Northern Union club can place in the field. The prospect of stirring struggles for next season between England and Australasia, will, we think, attract many new adherents to our game.

A Bomb for Fartown!

I have been somewhat amused by the "lessons" which many respected Association friends have drawn from the great gate of 13,000 at Huddersfield, on Tuesday, when Chelsea opposed the local Association team. At Fartown, Broughton Rangers, with a depleted side, and in a match, the result of which had not the slightest bearing on the records of either club for the League tournament, only 9,000 spectators were present. Thus the moral is plain. Even at Huddersfield, Rugby must give way to Association. Well they do not think so at Fartown, where "gates" of 13,000 are so common as to pass without comment. And evidently Huddersfield have no idea of "going under" during the summer months, else surely the committee would not have passed plans for the erection of another covered stand, the cost of which will, I think, be met out of the capital in hand.

In reply to yours.

In reply to R.H.B. (Huddersfield). The question of Merthyr Tydvil and unplayed matches was really decided when Wakefield made a similar application to that made by Hull Kingston Rovers. Clearly the League committee could not award points for a match which had never been played or make allowance for a problematical result. It is, of course, a stroke of ill luck for the Rovers that they should need to meet Merthyr, and Widnes meet Ebbw Vale. But luck is a part of the game, and these events cannot be foretold. In any case I cannot see that Widnes have been favoured at all, for their percentage is gained on matches actually played

## Notes and Notions.

### Notes and Notions.

I question whether anyone, even including the League committee, had foreseen the possibility of a tie for the top place of the Northern League table. I must admit that I hadn't. But it did arise, and of course according to rule, a deciding match was necessary.

### The Committee's Decision.

A good deal of controversy has arisen in both Wigan and Oldham, anent the management committee's decision that the match be played at Wakefield. On the face of it, no doubt it does appear rather strange, but personally I think they were acting in the best interests of all concerned. The match must have been of more interest to Wakefield enthusiasts, than to any other followers, outside those of the clubs concerned. Widnes and Wigan would probably have preferred the match to have been played in West Lancashire, but in face of recent events this would hardly have been a wise move, and Oldham would have had cause for complaint. To have played in Broughton or in Manchester at all, was—in view of the possibility of the final being played in that district—out of the question. If the same clubs are in the last tie it must—had the deciding match been played there—have spoiled it of practically all the interest. It was rather peculiar that although by losing at Broughton, Oldham rendered it unnecessary for them and Wigan to play off for the Lancashire League cup—yet it should necessitate a play-off for the Northern League top position.

### Lancashire Combination Final

The two clubs, Oldham and Wigan, are certainly bound up in the doings of each other, for whilst the senior teams are struggling for supremacy in their League, so are the reserve teams in the Combination. As the table stands it is impossible for any other club to oust either of them from the top two positions. But it is now a question who will figure at the head, and so claim the right to have the deciding match at home. If Wigan win their remaining games this right falls to them, but should they lose, it reverts to Oldham, and this right will no doubt have a great bearing upon the result of the play off. The date fixed for this match is the date of the League final, May 6.

### The Yorkshire Combination Final.

This competition is of course worked on the same lines as the Lancashire competition—on the percentage system—and the two top clubs play off for the championship. Considering the number of clubs in the competition it seems rather unnecessary that a deciding match should be played, as all the clubs play home and home matches with each other. But in future there will probably be a greater number of clubs participating. The two clubs concerned in the play-off to-day are—also like Lancashire—the same two as are at the head of the senior Yorkshire League, Wakefield and Halifax. The former having choice of ground.

### The Position of Hull Kingston Rovers.

The Kingston Rovers' club appealed to the League committee for the two points in respect to their match with Merthyr, which had to be cancelled owing to the latter club's inability to complete their programme. The committee could not of course accede to their claim, but at the same time it cannot but be admitted that the cancelling of that match has been a great loss to them, and they are to be commiserated with. It is distinctly hard lines, but the League committee could not do any other. Rules are rules and must be adhered to. To be debarred from participating in the semi-finals by a few decimal points, and this through the disbanding of a club, must be a sort of disappointment to the Rovers, and had they been in the four—judging from present form, their chances would undoubtedly have been rosy. The same question also threatened Wakefield, and although it may not have caused them to drop out of the first four, yet it might have lost them the right of choice of ground for the semi-final. This they have now lost through their recent defeats.

### The Exhibition Match at Kendal.

It was arranged at the last meeting of the Union committee that an exhibition match be played at Kendal to-day. But some hitch occurred in respect to the ground upon which to play the match. It has, however, been decided to play at Morecambe, and this will meet the wishes of North Lancashire people, who were debarred from having a match at Lancashire on Easter Monday, through the same difficulty of securing ground.

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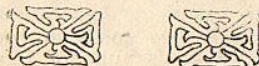

## STRAY THOUGHTS ON THE LEAGUE SEMI-FINALS.

(By OBSERVER)

### Will Wakefield Win?

A couple of months ago I could have written in a much more eulogistic tone of Wakefield Trinity. But unfortunately I was at Huddersfield a week ago, and there I witnessed, as far as Wakefield were concerned, a particularly weak display, even after making every allowance for the enforced absence from the team of three or four stalwart backs.

Unlike Wigan or Oldham, the Trinity officials have not unlimited reserves to fall back upon. When at full strength, they are unquestionably a brilliant combination who support each other in that typical style which one associates with a purely local side.

But they have fallen on evil days in regard to injured players, and only the remarkably consistency of their earlier displays has brought them the honour of appearing in the semi-finals.

At their best, Wakefield give magnificent displays. From the veteran full-back, Metcalfe, to the youngest forward, the football provided is in thorough keeping with the reputation of the gallant team, which two years ago, so deservedly won the challenge cup.

The men adapt themselves to the prevailing conditions, or perhaps a better description would be to the moods of their opponents. If it is to be hustle and bustle, then Crossland and his colleagues are equal to all demands.

If the modern open game is to be played, then will the forwards secure possession, and Newbould and Slater, supported by those two centres of ability, Lynch and Poyton, indulge in play which kept Wakefield so well ahead for many months.

Recent results have spoilt a good record. But Wakefield need not be ashamed, for they are a good third, and but for their misfortunes, I feel confident that their finish would have been in thorough keeping with their earlier performances. As it is I cannot predict their appearance in the final tie.

### Wonderful Wigan.

That Wigan have well earned the right of appearing in the League semi-finals, is apparent to the most casual observer who glances at their League record.

True they have been beaten by Huddersfield in the race for the aggregate record, but the fact must not be overlooked that the Yorkshire club play more matches,

And when we come to consider the defence, Wigan's superior figures entitles them to the first place, in what is after all a most remarkable season, even for such an accomplished side as that at Central Park.

Already two cups have gone to Wigan, for Oldham's defeat at Broughton, on Monday, made Wigan the winners of the Lancashire League. But they are more ambitious. To-day they expect to advance another stage towards the League cup, and of course next Saturday they do battle for the Northern Union Challenge cup.

Brilliant back play, efficient combination, and wonderful resource have been the features of the majority of their matches. Occasionally they have had lapses, and there have been times when the forwards were not doing their duty. But making every deduction, the plain fact remains, that of the first four clubs in the Northern League, Wigan excel their nearest rivals for the scoring of tries by 152 to 113. Even the mighty men of Oldham have finished one short of the century. Wigan have passed the half-way mark towards the second century.

The task of defending the position they have attained has been doubly difficult during the last few weeks. Players have been injured and there was indication apparently of staleness. But a wonderful defence eventually triumphed, and a finish of the League season, thoroughly in accord with the sides glorious traditions has to be recorded.

Right well have Wigan won their entry into the brief tournament which is to decide the League championship.

## Stray Thoughts on the League Semi-Finals.

### The Rise of Widnes.

Few, very few, Northern Union supporters would have ventured to predict last September that Widnes would to-day be engaged in the fight for the League championship.

Whilst other teams were announcing with the usual flourish of trumpets, the "capture" of this, or the other star, Widnes were quietly gathering together that stalwart band of local lads who have brought honour and glory to the town.

I admire the spirit which has prevailed at Widnes. True, the side has been well coached, but I give greater credit for the many magnificent displays to the enthusiasm which has prevailed amongst the team since the beginning of the season.

If the side has not scored tries with the freedom of some teams even lower placed in the competition, the defence has proved absolutely the best in the Northern League. The backs have neglected no opportunity to improve their scoring aggregate, but at the same time they have tackled surely, and looked well to the more accomplished attackers, perhaps who have been operating on the other side.

Candidly I do not expect them to progress further to-day. But they have demonstrated to all interested in the development of Northern Union football, that it is possible to bring up local players who will play the game as it should be played.

They owe much to Lally in the backs, and Aspey, in the forwards. These two veterans, have by their kindly words of advice, encouraged their younger colleagues, and I expect much from Widnes in the future. Like another team who have surprised everyone by a remarkable display of gradual improvement this season, Widnes are a young side, and will naturally improve.

They have had a particularly hard struggle to qualify, but that the painstaking efforts have been rewarded is apparent by the fact that never in the history of the club has so much interest been taken in the doings of the team, than during the present season.

This means financial gain, and all records for "takings" were beaten long ago. And I remember a few short years back the outlook was particularly gloomy. Well done, Widnes, and may other struggling teams follow your lead.

### Are Oldham Stale?

Like their Yorkshire rivals, Oldham have of late paid the penalty of greatness. Every opposing side—and the description, of course, applies to the other three semi-finalists, is anxious to defeat Oldham, and this close attention, in addition to making victory doubly difficult, oftentimes results in minor injuries.

But Oldham have finished with a percentage equal to Wigan, and superior to any other team in the Northern League. And they are not strangers to this distinction, for they were the champions last season, and the fact also should not be overlooked that they are the holders of the Lancashire County cup.

And but for the slip at Broughton on Monday, they might have added to their stock of trophies. But Oldham as I said before, are now paying the penalty of their greatness.

However, few will deny their right to appear in the deciding tournament of the Northern League. They have, particularly at Watersheddings, a brilliant record of successes, and what is more to the point, these glorious victories have been attained by bright and glorious football.

Defence has been maintained not at the expense of attack, but the two essentials have been interspersed in a manner which has proved disconcerting to opponents, and delightful to supporters.

I have distinct recollection yet of these great cup triumphs against Hull Kingston Rovers and Wakefield Trinity. The Yorkshire teams were out to win, and I doubt the ability of any side in the League to have successfully stood the test in defensive play as did Oldham on those two memorable occasions.

Like their great rivals, Wigan, they have had their ups and downs, but their wonderful record this season is such that thoroughly entitles them to once again appear in the great games to-day.
