### Our Visitors.

They scored a very good try in the last few minutes, and had they kicked the goal victory would have been theirs, but they failed, and Oldham won by one point.

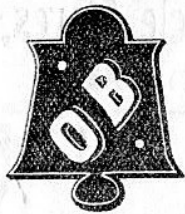
