Full Back and about 50 others-



Very sorry we cannot answer your question as to what trade or profession Daniels follows; but you are wrong in suggesting that he is a "Lion" tamer.


Busy Bee-

AN OLD OLDHAM FAVOURITE.

We notice that the followers of Rugby football in Cumberland are getting up a testimonial to that veteran player, Tom Fletcher, and we further notice that the O.F.C. have contributed a couple of guineas to the fund. What interesting memories Tom Fletcher's name conjures up. It is just over 30 years since Fletcher commenced his football career, and yet we noticed that he took part in a re-play cup last week at Maryport! Fletcher secured his English international cap against Wales in the season 1897, and the following season saw him assisting Oldham when we won the Northern Union Cup. Afterwards Tom was for a few seasons one of the most prominent professionals in the N.R.U. game. He last assisted Oldham in the season 1905 when he played at Watersheddings ou Easter Monday, versus Hull, the winning of which game gave Oldham their first League championship.

THE VISIT OF ROCHDALE HORNETS.

To-day, at Watersheddings, we warmly welcome "our old friends, the enemy" in Rochdale Hornets. 
