We then had the somewhat unusual experience of an early season evening match (mid-week) and on Wednesday, September 17th, we defeated Keighley by 11 points to 3. a great goal and bring about a draw with the score 18 points all. The replay at Mount Pleasant the following Tuesday, ended in our defeat by 13 points to 3. Our defence was weak and the Batley forwards—Gallagher in particular—proved too tough a proposition for us. A visit to the home of the Rochdale "Hornets" resulted in our giving a woeful exhibition, and the "home team" taking advantage of our all-round weakness, put on 18 points without reply. Xmas Day brought the return fixture with Halifax at Fartown, and, though we won the game by 9 points to 3, our rejoicing was tempered by the injury to Watts, who at this time was playing football such as we had often longed to see from so naturally gifted a man. We were without a fixture on Boxing Day, but the following Saturday, December 27th, we once more visited Wigan, and on this occasion the Central Park arena presented a never-to-be-forgotten sight. It was, literally speaking, a sea of mud, and the game resolved itself into a trial of endurance and a reliance upon a fair share of fortune's favours. 

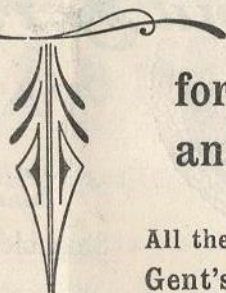
