

OUR VISITORS. A FEW BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCHES.

FRANK McMILLAN, Captain, New South Wales. A brilliant full back; and a player who has accomplished a remarkable "come back". Age, 33 years; stands 5ft. 8in. and weighs 11st. 0lbs. Has a most comprehensive knowledge of the game. Played in all the Test games when our last team toured Australia, and in those games Jim Sullivan had nothing to give away. He toured this Country in 1929-30. An exceedingly popular player.

ALAN RIDLEY, wing three-quarter, New South Wales. Age, 22 years; weight, 13st. 4lbs.; height, 6ft. lin. Toured in 1929-30, but was handicapped by injuries. A great scoring man, and a player who showed considerable improvement last season.

FRED GARDNER, wing three-quarter, New South Wales. Age, 23 years; weight 10st. 13lbs.; height, 5ft. 9ins. A brilliant attacker with a very effective side-step. Has great speed and a keen eye for an opening.

CLIFFORD PEARCE, centre three-quarter, New South Wales. Age, 25 years; weight 13st. 10lbs.; height, 5ft. 11in. Played for Australia last season. Good all-round player, noted for his determination. Is the type of a player who is likely to improve on the tour. A member of the famous sculling family.

FRANCIS DOONAR, stand-off half, Queensland. Age, 24 years; weight, 10st. 7lbs.; height, 5ft. 6½ins. First represented Queensland in 1930. Learned all his football at Ipswich. Is capable of rising to great attacking heights, and is always a sound defender.

VIVIAN THICKNESSE, half-back, New South Wales. Age, 22 years; weight, 10st. 8lbs.; height, 5ft. 10ins. Has had a wonderfully meteroic career since coming over to the League game from the Rugby Union. Possesses exceptional speed and can side-step either way. Is expected to be one of the successes of the tour.

PETER MADSEN, front row forward, Queensland. Age, 29 years; weight, 14st. 7lbs.; height, 6ft. Toured in 1929-30 and played against England in Australia last year. He is considered the finest hooking forward in the world.



WALTER JOSEPH PRIGG, back forward, New South Wales. Age, 24 years; weight, 13st.; height, 5ft. 1lins. Toured here in 1929-30, and played for Australia last season. A brilliant loose forward and a keen spoiler when it comes to defence.

VICTOR HEY, five-eighths, Sydney Western Suburbs, was one of the last players selected to make the tour, but is certainly not the least interesting. He is only 20 years of age, weighs 11st. 11lbs., and stands 5ft. 8½ins. Has a great future to look forward to.



Well, we went under, good losers to brilliant winners. On this occasion our players have an idea that they can just about wipe out that defeat. Of course the Kangaroos will be very keen on maintaining an unbeaten record like ourselves. We look like witnessing a fine game.
