M. Thomas and N. Harris who are on International duty at Wigan.

Our opponents will also miss the evergreen Tommy McCue, their scrum half, who is on the injured list, having received concussion whilst playing against Salford on August 30th, 1947. We shall be pleased to see McCue back in the game, he has received every honour the game could offer to him, a gentleman both on and off the field.

We are hoping that George Woods will be assisting our "A" team at Widnes to-day, this will depend on the doctor's sanction. Woods is anxious to show his paces and has expressed a desire to have a first run out with the "A" team.

This clever centre from Barrow has started out of luck, but we hope that the future has something bright and no doubt we shall be able to judge his capabilities in the near future.

It is hoped that our hooker, W. Frost, will be fit for our match against Workington on Tuesday evening next, 23rd September, 1947, and please make a note of the kick-off, 5-45 p.m. Enclosure (Pavilion Side) and "E" Stand Seats are on sale at the office, price 3/6 each, each seat is reserved.

THE NEW ZEALAND TOURISTS

Our Colonial visitors are now nearing this Country and should be installed in their headquarters at Ilkley within the next ten days. Up to to-day they are five matches behind schedule and this will require some bringing up, having made a list of 28 fixtures which will have to be played in fourteen weeks, possibly their stay will be extended to permit the programme to be completed.

All the league sides will be met with the exception of Featherstone, Keighley, Rochdale and Liverpool Stanley; and "Tests" against England at Leeds, Swinton, and Bradford, and a match with Wales at Swansea.

This will be the first time an overseas team has played on the famous St. Helens ground at Swansea, but it is not the first occasion a New Zealand XIII has played in South Wales. The 1907-08 "All Blacks" under the captaincy of "Bumper Wright" played at Ebbw Vale, and the 1926 tourists visited Pontypridd, but a Welsh International Side has never played a team from the Dominion on Welsh soil.

As previously reported we play the **New Zealanders at Watersheddings on Saturday, 25th October, 1947, kick-off 3 p.m.** so please make a note of this.
