SPOTLIGHT ON THE VISITORS

We open the second half of the season with the attractive opposition of our old friends from Oldham.

Our visitors have experienced varied fortunes this season, for excellent performances have alternated with unaccountable defeats.

We have, of course, already had the satisfaction of inflicting two home defeats on the men from Watersheddings. The first in the league encounter on 21st August, and the second in the Lancashire Cup semi-final on 10th October, but the closeness of the scores, 8—7 and 5—0 respectively, shows just how keen these two games were.

Indeed it is safe to say that our boys will have no harder games this season than these two.

Bearing in mind the form then displayed by Oldham, some of their later defeats have been hard to imagine, and they cannot afford any more lapses if they are to make anything like a challenge for a place in the "first four" play-offs.

Their record to date is: Played 20; won 11; drawn 2; lost 7; points 24; which gives them eighth position in the league table.

We may be sure therefore that we shall see a rousing game to-day, for in addition to our visitors not wishing to drop any ponts, they will be more than anxious to prove to their enthusiastic followers that they are capable of reversing the Watersheddings results.

If to-day's game proves as exciting as those two engagements, there should be little cause for complaint.

In recent seasons Oldham have had more than their fair share of injuries, and this season has been no exception, but with all men fit, there is an abundance of talent available, most of whom are seasoned players and well known to our followers, and we therefore focus our spotlight on two young members of the side who are staking a claim to future fame.

17 Years Ago

Season 1933-34, by R. F. Anderton

We started this season with three good wins—over Wigan (22-6), Broughton (14-8), and Halifax (17-11)—but lost the following three matches, including St. Helens Recs. in the first round of the Lancashire Cup.

From September 30th to November 5th we recorded double victories over St. Helens Recs. and Huddersfield, and wins against Dewsbury, Australia, Wigan, Oldham and Keighley. making a draw at Keighley in the first round of the Challenge Cup we won the replay at Wilderspool, but received a nasty knock when we were beaten by London Highfield, at White City, London, in the second round.

Jack Miller had the honour of playing in all three test matches against Australia. He was also selected to play for England against Australia, in Paris, but could not turn out owing to injury.

Billy Dingsdale played in one test match against Australia, and also played for Lancashire.

Bob Smith also played for Lancashire and was reserve for one Test match. Candy Evans and Dai Davies played for Wales v. Australia.

We had the honour of staging the first representative match against a French Rugby, a Treize team, captained by the late Jean Galia. Jean was one of the best sportsmen I have ever had the pleasure of meeting.

History was made at Wilderspool when the Northern Rugby League honoured us by playing the League Final on our ground. The contestants were Salford and Wigan, and all records were broken when 31,565 people paid £2,117 to see the game.

Councillor Austin Crowe, J.P., who had been President of the Warrington F.C. from 1926-27 to 1933-34, resigned at the end of this season.

The Warrington and Wigan clubs introduced the Rugby League game to Ireland by staging a match in Dublin.

Owen Toole, who formerly resided in Warrington, was instrumental in arranging this match. We had a grand time in Ireland, and the organisers did us really well. What do you say, Austin?

In those days Warrington Football Club had a club membership of 3,735.

Mr. Albert Holbrook, of Warrington, refereed the Wembley Cup Final when Hunslet beat Widnes 11 points to 5.

Charlie Seeling, the Warrington loose forward, was transferred to Wigan on March 15th, 1934.

There were 28 candidates for nine places on the Warrington Football Club Committee.

Mr. John Y. Hughes was appointed Borough Surveyor of Warrington, and although he came from Walsall, a Soccer stronghold. John is an out and out Rugby Leaguer nowadays and seldom misses a Warrington match.

Warrington Gymnasium had an Unemployed Gymnastic Champion Eight, and they were: J. Carter, J. Higham, P. S.

In order to provide for those who were unable to make the journey to London to see the London Highfield v. Warrington cup tie, which was played at the White City, the Warrington club booked a telephone land line for two hours direct from White City to Wilderspool, by means of which messages were sent continuously throughout the game.

This was the first occasion on which such an experiment had been attempted. It was certainly a success, except in one direction, and that was that the spectators at Wilderspool had to listen to Warrington being out-played. Highfield won by 19 points to 5.

Jack Oster, Warrington's stand-off half, was transferred to

London Highfield.

Warrington signed on Jack Woods from Barrow.

The Mayor of Warrington (Councillor A. M. Crowe) opened the new dressing-rooms under the stand at Wilderspool on January 20th, 1934.

Mr. William C. Sprunt, one of our supporters, was appointed

Director of the Warrington Museum.
