

JUNIOR MOVEMENT

Much activity is now taking place with reference to the Junior League movement in Lancashire. At an informal meeting of the representatives of Leigh, Oldham, Warrington, Widnes, St. Helens and Wigan, held at St. Helens headquarters on November 4th, 1953. The discussion at this meeting was focussed on the Amateur Junior Leagues, and it was felt by the Clubs present that something must be affected very quickly if the decline of the Junior Rugby League is to be halted. There is a further meeting to be held on November 25th, and an invitation has been extended to all Lancashire Senior Clubs to attend. The suggestion to be made is that Senior Clubs must make a greater contribution to the organising of the Junior Leagues, and to its financial commitments. Also it is suggested that a Lancashire Junior League of all Amateur Clubs be formed to give greater variety of fixtures, and more glamour to the organisations.

This is a step in the right direction, as the Junior Leagues and the juniors are the life blood of our game. The future international is a boy somewhere in junior football to-day. We shall be represented at this meeting on November 25th, and we shall go forward with suggestions that are constructive for the Junior Movement, and which must be good for the GAME we represent.
