#### OLDHAM v. HULL

#### WATERSHEDDINGS NEWS AND VIEWS

The match against Hunslet was an enjoyable one to watch and the Hunslet players never gave up trying even when twenty-three points behind at half-time. In the second half they treated us to some really good football and caught our team on the wrong leg with three good tries. The Hunslet players must be congratulated upon the open display they gave and for giving full value for money to the good crowd of spectators.

# WHAT WILL BECOME OF THE AMATEUR MOVEMENT?

Season after season we hear suggestions about re-organizing the amateur section of the Rugby League game. And season after season we hear grumblings about this or that scheme having misfired, and that junior organisations and teams are in difficulties.

But many people who are active Rugby League supporters are often guilty of a misconstruction of the present position of the amateur clubs. Here I want to give points "for and against" in order that the picture will be perfectly clear. Here is the official viewpoint. Secretaries of local leagues and those who claim to be secretary-organisers are paid accordingly by the Rugby League. The fee is not a large one, but after all most league officials (secretaries and treasurers) are paid by their leagues.

#### ON THE PUBLIC PARKS

Help to individual clubs is given by the R.L. They assist in ground rents wherever possible, although in certain places the City or Borough Corporations allow teams to play on the public parks without fees. Here I should point out that there are certain parks which don't present a pretty picture as far as pitches are concerned. Dressing room accommodation is also far from satisfactory. Yet in quite a number of areas the changing rooms, and washing facilities are extraordinarily good with hot and cold water showers laid on besides the baths.

Then again in about eight areas the R.L. own grounds which are for junior football only. There would be far more grounds of this nature if the property could be bought. Remember here that the British Playing Fields Society, which in effect is a "pup" off the R.L. is very well off. There are demands for other grounds to be bought, but unfortunately in some industrial areas suitable sites cannot be found.

#### THOSE PRE-SEASON GAMES

Most clubs in the league allow amateur teams to use their grounds for occasional games, but there are cases where juniors have either to pay for the use of the senior pitch, or pass over part of the gate. In certain instances the pre-season games, which at one time were run exclusively

for charitiable purposes, have now been given over to help junior football. But there are some clubs who refuse to allow these curtain raisers to be played. Here I think that the R.L. should order all the senior clubs to play pre-season games so that the gates could be devoted to junior football funds.

#### £5 PER SEASON

In one area the senior clubs retains the money from the pre-season match and then doles out the cash when it is required for amateur league purposes. The scheme appears to work quite well and each junior club secretary receives £5 per season so long as his club completes its fixtures. The money is for expenses such as telephone calls, bus fares, stamps and shoe leather!

This idea gives adults an additional interest in juniors. It is ex-players who are required in large numbers to instruct the amateurs in the various points of the game and also to help with team selection, training and also to treat injuries. This may seem to be a tall order, but all the same there must be men who are prepared to do this job. However they must be well recompensed for their efforts.

#### RUGBY UNION THREAT

I think that an additional drive should be made for the amateur movement and possibly a series of meetings held to see how the juniors can be helped. At the moment Rugby Union is a threat to the amateurs of the Rugby League. In some schools the boys are trained in the art of the R.L. game. Then after leaving school many of them join up with the local Rugby Union clubs which are springing up here and there and have as many as half -a-dozen teams.

These boys claim that the social side of Rugby Union is far superior to R.L. They also prefer to play occasional matches in other towns rather than figure in local parks. A change of scenery is what they desire It is not a case of snobbery. At one time there was a full time official organiser for R.L. amateurs. But I felt that his territory was too extensive. It would be better, I think, if there was a paid organiser, and a full time one at that, for each county. Much has to be done for the amateur movement and I think complete re-organisation, plus new policy would bring about the desired effect. After all, the amateur movement is the lifeblood of the professional game. A better deal for the juniors will produce all the players that are required by the senior clubs. And clubs would save a lot of hard earned cash. Remember too that all converts from the 15-a-side game are not a succes in our code.
