OUR VISITORS


OUR visitors today need no introduction to the supporter of R.L. football, for the achievements of Oldham over the past few seasons have brought fame and trophies to their door. Such outstanding playing success must naturally mean that the side is studded with stars, and a glance through their line-up vividly illustrates this. Etty, Cracknell and Turner complete the White Rose county contingent. Ganley, Davies, Pitchford and Jackson are all well-

From the record book, our last League encounter against Oldham was on 25th February 1956, when after a battle with the snow, the ground was declared fit by referee Appleton, and the Rovers obliged with a 14-4 victory, the stars of which were the Fox brothers and Jack Fennell. Of the encounters played at Post Office Road since the war, the score is level, both sides having registered two victories. It will therefore be third time lucky for either team today, and although we naturally hope that our lads will rise against the odds as they have so often done, at the same time we hope that we shall see a worthy game.

we are "also rans," nevertheless we can say that our home record against the Red Rose challenge is certainly one of the best held by a Yorkshire club.
