

Oldham Football Club Secretary's Report

I herewith present you the Annual Report and Financial Statement of Accounts for the twelve months ending 31st March, 1958. This shows a profit from football of £1,084 11s. 11d.

The Pavilion Account shows a profit of £146 12s. 6d.

The period under review covers 26 matches played by the first team against 21 matches at home for the period ending March, 1957.

The profit shown is after allowance of £800 for taxation. We have played 19 Northern Rugby League matches at home which has attracted 253,188 spectators, giving an average of 13,325 per match against 1957 average of 12,526 and 1956 of 12,180. We have also played at home 2 Lancashire Cup ties which attracted 30,007 and 2 Challenge Cup ties before 35,437 and 1 League play-off before 18,286. An increase in the average attendance is a tribute to our game and the type of football that has been given. The attendance at our "A" team matches shows a large decrease from the previous twelve months for in the 14 matches played only 10,823 have watched, showing an average of 773 against an average of 1,014. It is evident that more of our supporters have been travelling to watch our first team away from home. This is proved by noting when the first team travelled long distances (Whitehaven, Workington and Hull), our "A" team attendances have been up. We have defrayed once again the cost of private telephone lines for private radio broadcast to the following hospitals : Oldham Royal, Boundary Park and Strinesdale. The amount paid for this service is £53 and is considered money well spent. The appreciation of these broadcasts is shown by the letters we have received from patients, who have fallen temporary sick and also from the staffs of the institutions. Many thanks to the gentlemen who give the running commentary, which is a splendid service to suffering humanity.

Playing Record

The playing record of the first team during season 1957-58 speaks again for itself, and praise cannot be expressed in words for the wonderful games that our first team has put over. In a very few games this season our team has not been showing that great football expected, as consistency was the key word of the previous season, but then once again results prove that the team throughout the season is the best in the Rugby League. We cannot always win, and a comparison of the last two seasons shows that we have played 76 Northern Rugby League matches, won 66, lost 9 and drawn 1, points for 1,693 and points against 780.

This season we have just gone one better than the previous season inasmuch as we are one point better off. We have finished at the top of the Northern Rugby League with 67 points against 66 of last season. This is a record for the Rugby League table since its inception. One more record has been created also, that of the 19 matches played away we only lost 2 matches and drew 1 (St. Helens, Hull and Wakefield respectively). 2 matches were lost at home (St. Helens and Swinton). Every match we have played has been the equal of a cup-tie and every club we have met has pulled that little extra out to beat this famous team of ours. Our players have stood the test. It would be unfair to individualise the merits of each player but mention must be made of the record of our full back, William Bernard Ganley, on the great feat of scoring 223 goals and 5 tries (up to and including April 26th, Workington). This includes all matches he has played in. This is a world record and we are very proud to possess a player of this ability. Several times this season his goal kicking has won matches when all appeared to be lost. Although our scoring record is less than last season, points against this does not discount the class of football we have played. Possibly some teams we have met have improved their play and when two good teams meet that goes to make a good game. Taking our first team all round it is a comparatively young one, but the committee are fully aware that some of the players cannot last for ever and replacements must take place, and the right class of player must be secured or brought up through the "A" team. The past season has given us one of pleasure and thanks must go to the players that they have played the game. May we now look forward to next season being as great as the past two seasons have been.

Lancashire League Championship

For the second year in succession we are the Lancashire League Champions which naturally follows our good work against Lancashire teams. We are proud of this fact. One must realise that the opposition in Lancashire is considerably greater than in Yorkshire. A better style of football appears to be played, hence the greater honour in being styled Lancashire Champions.

In the semi-final we were drawn to play St. Helens away. In this match our team gave a great exhibition of football and before a record crowd we won the match by 29 points to 9 points. In the final we met mighty foes in Wigan at Swinton and there is no doubt we played as winners and ultimately landed the trophy by 13 points to 8 points.

Challenge Cup

Everybody thought that this was going to be our Wembley Year, even the National Press without exception wanted our team to grace the holy turf at Wembley, to play the game as it should be played. There is no doubt that the Challenge Cup is a nightmare: there must be a hoodoo around it. Never had we a better chance of going to Wembley. In the first round we met Hull Kingston Rovers at home and won by 23 points to 6 points. The second round we had to travel to Blackpool and won a hard game against our opponents by 12 points to 5 points. The third round we had Wigan as visitors to Watersheddings and they created a surprise by winning 8 points to nothing (this is the only match we have failed to score in this season). In this match our forwards for some reason came off second best, and the whole team appeared to lose confidence after the unfortunate injury to Alan Davies which left him a passenger for three parts of the game. This match was the biggest disappointment of the season after promising so much. Our exit from the Challenge Cup is the one black mark on a great season and a great team.

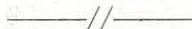

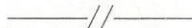

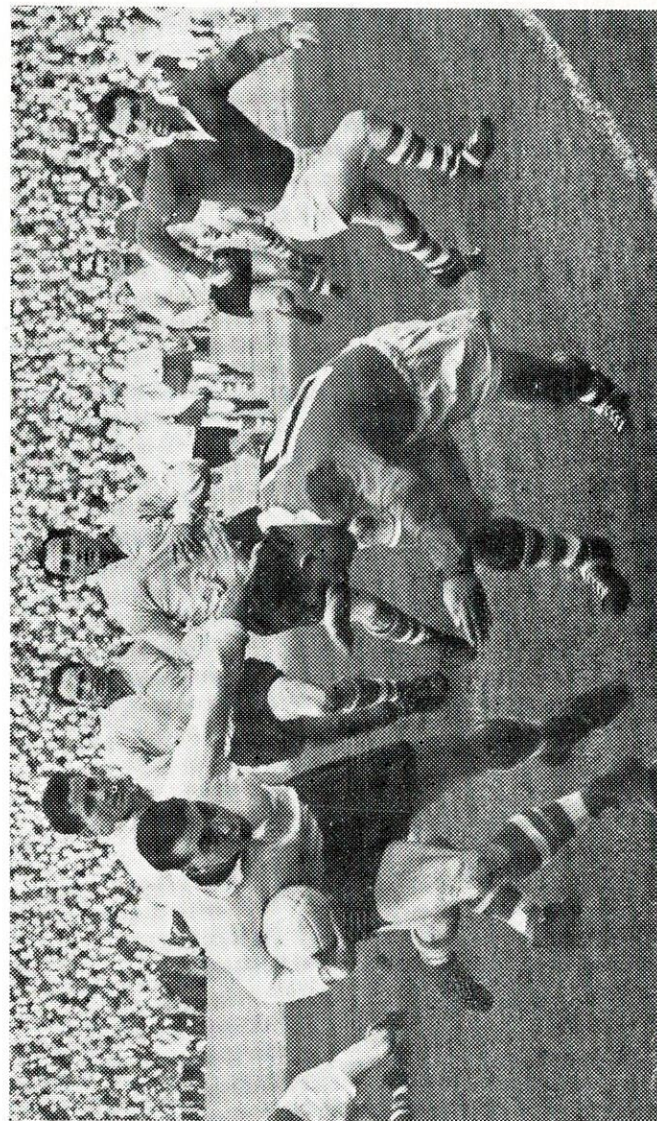

Yet another season Oldham have been the big talking point of Rugby League. They earned the same praise, writers poured out the same superlatives — but far from getting more trophies, they couldn't even keep the ones they won the season before.

Once again this was to be Wembley year. Oh, how everyone was so sure and even the most luke-warm fans wrote off for tickets to sit around the precious turf and watch Oldham.

But there was no Wembley . . . again. It was swallowed up by a combination of mud and Wigan power that left Oldham breathless, broken and beaten.

If some people went home that tragic afternoon in March and said: "What the hell's the use of good rugby when nobody wants to play with you?" — you just cannot blame them.

Oldham's clear cut policy of speed play, open play and attractive play never got a chance to materialise in the Challenge Cup and it was just as absent in the semi-final of the League Championship play-off.

But while I am ready and willing to place some of the blame on a system where teams can still win without even trying to play the game to the book — and in memory of the bright legislators of yesteryear, I will not totally exonerate them on that count.

There was more to those defeats. Oldham were not a fit team and far from matching robust tactics, they couldn't produce their well known football ideas that break opponents.

I fear that in the back room at Watersheddings there tends to be a star complex. Too few chances are given to unknown lads. There is a quiet fear of team changes.

There are so many powerful names at Oldham — names that ring round the Rugby League and cause gasps of admiration. But even the most powerful name is nothing with a pulled muscle to worry about.

But take away those two disappointing matches and you have left an Oldham side that without one shadow of doubt has thrilled crowds up and down the North. We can find fault in our lads, but in the words of club president, Bill Howard: "They did us proud."

Despite so many set-backs the game at Watersheddings stayed open and the policy of fast ball-moving play was persisted with. Closing up the game for safety sake was never the policy — even when it should have been.

Find of the season must surely have been 19 year-old Alan Kellett. He hit the team like a storm and I am sure we have still to see the best of this former Huddersfield junior.

Bernard Ganley Reaches 2,000 points

by BILL WEBB

In season 1950-51 Bernard Ganley kicked 6 goals, not such an enterprising start to an illustrious career. The following season his total was 106, which analysed as follows : 92 league goals, 11 cup goals (Rugby League and Lancashire Cups), 3 against tourists.

Season 1952-53 brought a grand total of 147 goals to Bernard although seven of these were kicked in friendlies. He kicked 124 league goals, 14 cup goals and two goals against the tourists who that year were the Australians with whom Oldham drew seven points each. Also during that season Bernard scored 2 tries.

The next year brought Bernard 14 friendly match goals, including 5 against Leigh at Blackpool, 93 league goals and 27 cup goals — a total of 134 goals. In the following season, however, Bernard was hampered by injury and his grand total was 93 goals and 1 try. In that total were 66 league goals, 18 cup goals, 4 Law Cup goals, and 5 goals for Lancashire. Playing for the county against Cumberland, Bernard scored 3 goals and he also scored 2 against Yorkshire.

Season 1955-56 produced 75 goals for Bernard, 64 league goals, 7 cup goals and 4 Law Cup goals, also 1 try against Barrow. In the next season Bernard scored 194 goals and 2 tries. This total would have been even greater but for injury. The analysis showed 169 league goals, including 4 versus Leeds in the championship semi-final and 3 at Odsal in the final, 14 cup goals, 6 goals for Oldham against Australia and 5 in the Law Cup against Rochdale Hornets.

However there were greater events to follow — to the tune of 224 goals, an almost incredible total, seemingly impassible, but one which should be broken soon by Bernard himself. This record was created last year in the 1957-58 season. Bernard's record was 168 league, 32 cup, 19 for Great Britain and 5 Law Cup.

Bernard's career record is 979 goals, which includes 39 in friendly games. He has also scored 14 tries. **THUS HE HAS SCORED EXACTLY 2,000 POINTS DURING HIS CAREER.**

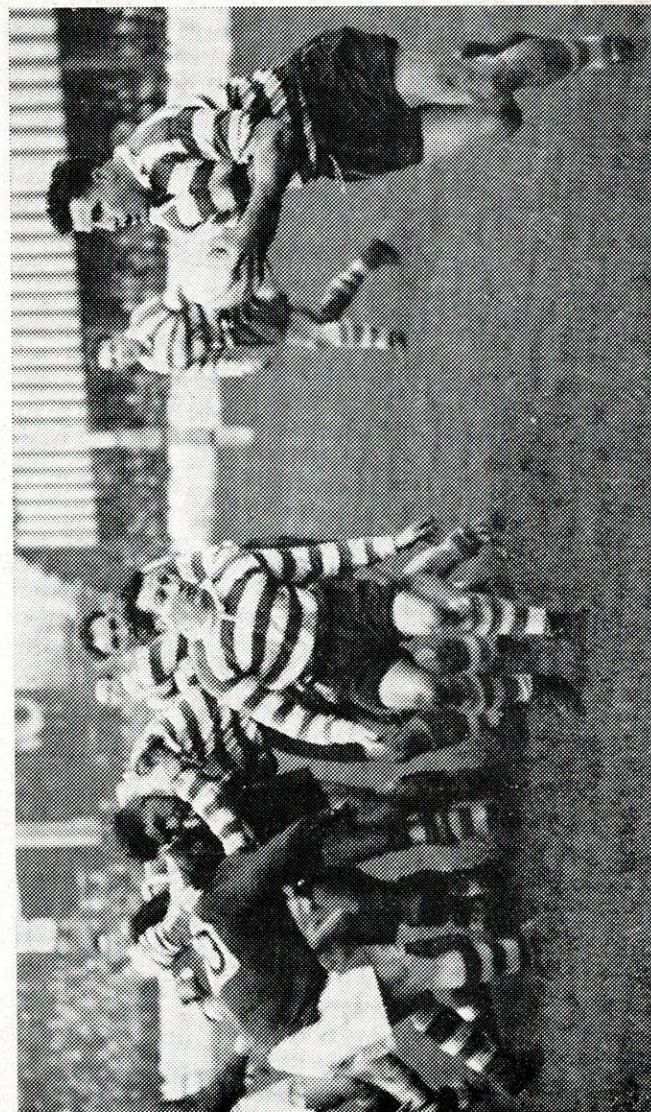

Where do we go in making progress for Rugby League in this coming season of 1958 and 1959? No overseas teams grace our playing fields.

And the Frenchmen, on their showing of last season, do not look like creating more than ordinary interest. The Australian Kangaroos do not come until a season later, and the present officials of the code do not look like attempting anything unusual in propaganda games outside the Northern Counties.

On top of all this both the Council and the Northern League have rejected proposals for (1) a new play-the-ball system and (2) a highly competitive two division scheme.

Thus it will be left to the club players, and the referees, to try to reveal an attractive and enterprising system of play that will rouse the interest of club supporters to the highest possible level.

Who can bring something new in tactics, and develop a system of play that will defeat the modern style of "spotting" and dour play that is so nauseating?

When I had been through four English tours with the Kangaroos of 1921, 1929, 1933 and 1937, and been associated with so many great teams that had played open football, the Wigan club decided to invite me to come and take charge of their team. I did not seek this invitation — at first I declined the offer.

That was twenty years ago. Wigan repeated their offer when I got back to Australia, and eventually I came to Lancashire. But fate decreed that all top class football should be halted before I had been here a year. The outbreak of war in September, 1939, stopped regular games.

Wigan paid all players off and gave me my fare back to Australia. I did not go. I wanted to see England face up to the crisis. I stayed here, and I have never regretted it.

After some service for the Forces I came back into journalism and broadcasting. It has been enjoyable, and I have been around the entire Rugby League territory with every touring Kiwi and Kangaroo team since the war. Over ten years ago Hunslet offered

me the job to take charge of Parkside — but journalism and broadcasting was too lucrative for me to cast it aside and risk things with Hunslet.

Since then I have had every opportunity to see the ebb and flow of Rugby League status. I saw the late John Wilson vacate the League Secretaryship after 25 years of service, and this modern product of Cambridge University (Mr. William Fallowfield) reveal his capacity for the job.

I have seen our code rise to the heights of drawing 96,000 spectators to a Wembley final and then drift back to last season's attendance of 66,000. Why the decline?

Obviously I have my own views about things that seem to be lacking. But let's avoid going into them in detail.

The one big need that I can see is for the development of the Youth movement, and an opportunity given to the teenage lads to play on good grounds with the best possible dressing and bath facilities.

Would the creation of a Sunday Rugby Football League give a chance to cater for these youths? Would games of 30 minutes each way (two matches on each good ground on one afternoon) give playing opportunity to over 1,500 boys every Sunday afternoon?

Quite recently, at the annual banquet of the National Federation of Supporters, I gave 40 delegates present a ballot paper on which they could record a vote of "Yes" or "No" on Sunday football for amateur youths. When the votes were counted they revealed 36 "for" and only four "against." That was a very impressive expression of public opinion. Will something develop from it?

In concluding, may I express the view that the Rugby League is very sound and solvent. Most of the clubs like Leeds, Oldham, Wigan, Hull, Warrington, St. Helens, Swinton, Salford and Workington own their own grounds. Clubs like Huddersfield and Bradford Northern possess good agreements from their local Councils for their grounds. It would take more than a million to provide their like again.

On top of that, the recent annual meetings of the League at H.Q. in Leeds showed, on the balance sheets, that the Council has accumulated assets of over £50,000, the Playing Fields Fund over £41,000, and the Northern League over £13,000 — an accumulated surplus in all the League funds of well over £100,000. Some of this, of course, is tied up in bonds, or loans to aid clubs, or grounds for juniors, but it is all "good asset." It reveals solvency and solidity — even if we are not "alive" in Wales or London, but confined to Yorkshire, Lancashire and Cumberland.

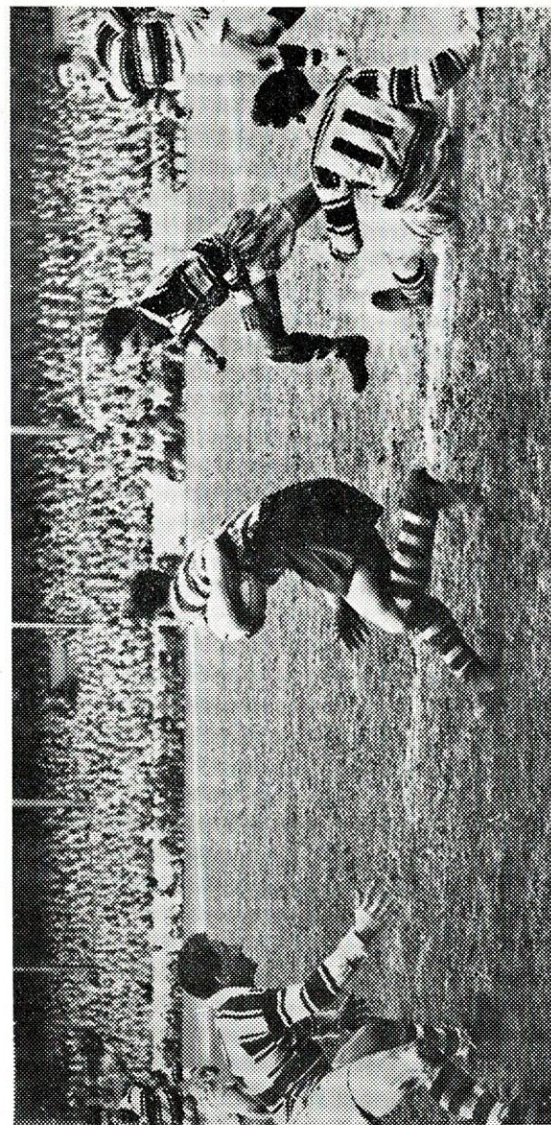

Oldham and District Continuation Rugby League

For 37 years the above League has catered for players who on leaving school desire to continue playing Rugby League Football, hence the name of the League.

Prior to the war, 1939/45, the age limits were 14 to 16, and when the Junior League ceased its existence in 1939, the Continuation League carried on. In 1940/41 Season the age limits were raised to 19 for certain teams who formed the "War Emergency League." These teams were not allowed in the early stages to compete for the Continuation League Trophies, but in 1942/43 this rule was waived and Belle Vue Juniors were worthy winners of the Howell Cup and League Championship (Summerscales Cup). The League carried on right through the war, and when the Junior League restarted six teams were ready for open-age football. In 1940 Oldham could not field an "A" Team, and asked the Continuation League to provide 16 players for a "Colts" Team.

The sixteen players were named and trained at Watersheddings under the supervision of Mr. E. Watkins. The Oldham Club benefited from these "Colts," securing Harry Ogden, Jack Taylor, Frank Wilkinson, Arthur Ogden and Billy Flanagan. Another of the "Colts," Billy Webb, signed for Halifax and at the present time his experience has helped Royton Junior Club to attain their high standard.

Looking back over the years since 1921 some grand players have made the grade. Billy Bush (Higginshaw) signed for Huddersfield, being one of the first players from the League to make the Senior Grade. After him came players like Sammy Bardsley (Salem Hornets, Oldham and Lancs. County), Wilf Whitworth (Wakefield), Edgar Brooks (Oldham and England), Billy Mitchell (Oldham) — all the above "Colts" players. Laurie Platt (Oldham), Reg. Bailey (Oldham), Jerry Wilde (Rochdale), Brian Heap (Austerlands and Huddersfield), Roy Smith (Austerlands and Huddersfield), Stan McCormick (Hey St. Johns, Belle Vue and England), Terry O'Grady (St. Mary's, Oldham and England), Des McKeown (St. Patrick's and Oldham), John O'Brien (St. Mary's and Oldham), Allan Taylor (St. Mary's and Rochdale), Ken Jackson (Oldham and England), George Kershaw and Harold Kershaw (Beever Street, Wigan and Oldham), Louis Lavery (Ex-Schoolboys and Oldham), Ken Payne (Strinesdale and Blackpool). There are numbers of others who have had trials and at present a few of last season's players are training at Watersheddings.

The World Cup at present is confined to the big four, Great Britain, France, Australia and New Zealand. Possibly if we set out to capture the world by making the cup truly international we could make a very brave show. I realise that finance is a difficulty but other sports have to overcome this difficulty and so could we.

If in addition to the big four we were to invite the countries with small Rugby League organisations to enter we could make a very presentable list of nations. Possibly the next but one World Cup will be played in Great Britain and here is the chance that we should take.

We could enter England, Wales and possibly a team of say either Ireland and Scotland combined or teams drawn from those countries. Just as the original New Zealanders were captivated by the idea of making the first tour, surely there are enough adventurous men from Scotland and Ireland willing to make history by being the first to play Rugby League in their respective countries. Then Yugoslavia, Madagascar, Italy and perhaps Spain could swell the ranks, and possibly America and Canada.

Just imagine the effect on the country if we could have the World Cup organised with international games played in Glasgow, Edinburgh, Belfast, Dublin, London, Birmingham, Newcastle, Cardiff, Swansea, Leicester, Derby and elsewhere.

Played out of season, say in late May and June when there would be no other serious competition, we should be able to draw the crowds in. Newspaper publicity would be best since our early days.

Certain other countries seeing such a world competition would be seriously tempted to organise the game because the sporting approach is the best way of developing international friendship.

Maybe this idea is no more than a pipe dream, but I sincerely hope that it will commend itself to the Rugby League powers. We sadly need some idea that would bring back the crowds to Rugby League for like soccer our attendances are dropping compared with earlier post war years.

A really world wide cup is something to strive for and I look forward to seeing the Rugby League World Cup become as important as the association World Cup and the Davis Cup.

Oldham Changed Their Fixtures in 1895-6

by TOM WEBB

When the Northern Union was formed in 1895 the Oldham Football Club had arranged fixtures as a Rugby Union Club and there was quite an ambitious programme.

Among other clubs it was anticipated that Broughton (as distinct from Broughton Rangers), Kendal Hornets, Swinton, Salford, Walkden, Rochdale St. Clements, Swansea, Crompton, Watsonians, Rockcliff and Tudhoe would be met. This was completely upset when the Northern Union was formed and a fresh programme was adopted which gave forty-two games with each Lancashire, Yorkshire and Cheshire club in the Union on a home and away basis.

In spite of the upheaval fixtures were retained with Runcorn, Broughton Rangers, Warrington, Leigh, St. Helens, Rochdale Hornets, Wigan, Tyldesley, Batley and Stockport.

Fixtures were then arranged with Widnes, Halifax, Manningham, Bradford, Huddersfield, Hull, Wakefield Trinity, Leeds, Hunslet, Liversedge, Heckmondwike and Brighouse Rangers.

In the Northern Union League Oldham finished fourth and in the Lancashire League the club was second to Runcorn.

Sam Taylor was the club secretary, and Harry Varley, the old Liversedge, Yorkshire and English R.U. International was the captain.

Oldham's Early Internationals

The first international game to be arranged should have taken place at Watersheddings on New Year's Day, 1904. This was to have been a twelve a side game. Spottiswoode and Ferguson were chosen for England and Phil Thomas and Frater for Other Nationalities.

When the re-arranged game took place Oldham supplied five players — Spottiswoode, Ferguson, Lewis, Frater and D. Thomas. Frater captained Other Nationalities.

Whilst with Oldham, Tom Llewellyn captained Wales and Joe Ferguson captained England. Thus Oldham provided the captain for three international combinations.

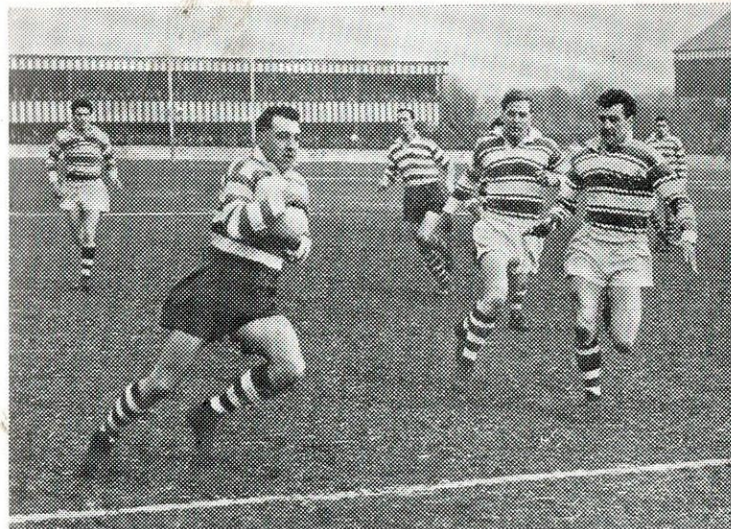

A Solution

The lack of games for our Lancashire clubs' "A" teams has rendered the second teams of the clubs virtually hamstrung. Here then is the easiest way that I can see after much thought as to how to obviate the difficulties. I have discounted the prospects of reviving the Northern Rugby Combination on account of the unwillingness of the Yorkshire clubs to co-operate in this respect.

The solution is to commence a subsidiary competition, say for a new trophy or to alter the Lancashire Shield to a competition played on the one round basis, that is, each team meeting each other team once only. Thus with fourteen clubs meeting in the present Lancashire Combination on a home and away basis, which gives twenty-six fixtures, an additional round would give another thirteen games, making thirty-nine in all. That should be a satisfactory programme for second teams. Seven clubs in the subsidiary league competition would play seven home games and seven would play six home games. The subsidiary competition could be played the following season with reversed venues so that clubs would have an equal number of home games over the two seasons.

That appears to be the solution, or is it too simple?
