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OLDHAM—A GREAT CLUB

The post-war rise to the heights of the Oldham club is indeed one of the highlights of the R.L. code. The team had shown great improvement and therefore it came as no surprise when there was exceptional progress in the Lancashire Challenge Cup tournament.

After success in 1956, the club gained a "hat trick" of cup successes in 1958. The Oldhamers twice beat St. Helens and there was a victory over Wigan, which is an indication of the calibre of the Watersheddings outfit.

But while the club has done quite well in the Northern League "play off" (once winners and once runners-up) in post-war seasons, the R.L. challenge cup has escaped them.

Perhaps the club will be able to show some progress this season seeing that they are drawn at home in the first round against Huddersfield. Apart from that hard game, Oldham have a very good record in the challenge cup tourney in pre-war seasons.

They have won the challenge cup three times and been runners-up on four occasions. In one period they were finalists for three consecutive seasons.

MANY STAR PLAYERS

The Oldham team of the present day contains many players who have made their mark in the game. There is Alan Davies, one of the best centre threequarters of our time and who has gained many honours in the code,

A strong and speedy player, he is always a threat to the defence when in possession. Then we have Ike Southward, who like Bobbie Chisnall has had the honour of playing in Service Rugby Union games and occasionally on the sacred turf at Twickenham.

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When Southward moved from Workington Town (he is a relative of "Fergy" Southward who played for Salford for many years) he cost Oldham the record fee of £10,650. That record still remains because Eric Ashton (£13,000 was the value placed on his head by Wigan) and Bobbie Greenough (£12,000 was Warrington's value) have decided to remain with their clubs.

FINE GOALKICKER

Then there's Bernard Ganley, who like Alan Davies, is the son of a noted R.L. player of the past. Ganley kicked 192 goals in 1958-9 and 224 the following season. Last term his total was 197. That's consistency for you.

Bernard has won many games for his side by his accurate place kicking

and in the 1957-8 season he beat Jim Sullivan's world record.

Frank Pitchford and Alan Kellett are always a half back combination to be reckoned with and it looks like being a thrilling tussle between this pair and Brian Keavney and Frank Myler. We sincerely hope that the four will be on duty today.

Geoff Sims who plays on the opposite flank to Ike Southward is one of the many fine signings Oldham have made from the Leigh district. Sims is a

very fast winger.

KEITH DEPARTS

The pack may not be so devastating as it was some time ago. Veteran Jack Keith, the master of the "dummy" pass, has gone to Halifax and the important job as No. 9 is now held by Len McIntyre who was previously with the Saints and Barrow.

Wakefield Trinity collared two great Oldham forwards in Derek Turner and Don Vines. We also note too that John Etty, another player who did great

service at Watersheddings, is with the Belle Vue club.

However, Ken Jackson, another tourist, Charlie Winslade, Roger Dufty and Geoff Robinson remain. Geoff also cost a huge sum when he left Whitehaven for Oldham. Last week against St. Helens, he played in the second row to allow Gordon Haynes (ex Swinton) to come in as loose forward.

Haynes a former Birkenhead Park R.U. player, assisted Orford Tannery in the Warrington and District Amateur League and figured against many of our

junior players.


With Oldham fighting hard to get a place in the "top four," and our boys keen to return to winning vein, spectators look like having plenty of thrilling

The Wires will be here in the first round of the Challenge Cup and we feel that this is an excellent pairing and one which will be welcomed by supporters of both clubs.

There have been some stirring encounters between the respective clubs in the past, even in cup ties. We feel sure that there will be a fine crowd to witness what should be a thrilling fixture. We take encouragement from that 9-9 draw at Wilderspool on Christmas Day.

GET YOURS EARLY

We will not be able to fulfill all the demands for stand tickets. Naturally, the prior call goes to the stand ticket holders. They will be accommodated at this afternoon's game.

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by that particular team. The 1956 touring team played only nineteen games and were watched by 225,620.

The three Test Matches in 1959 yielded gross receipts of £22,061 as against

£13,400 in 1956, £20,883 in 1952 and £21,597 in 1948.

When comparing current figures with previous years is should be remembered that in the 1948-52 period the attendances at League games were at a peak. As goods were rationed and there was no Hire Purchase the public had plenty of money to spend on entertainment. The public nowadays spend less on sport and have become more selective but they will turn out to see good games as is shown by the 1959 tour figures.

NEW LAWS OF THE GAME

Of the two new laws which came into operation on Saturday last the one relating to the penalty is simple and straightforward and needs no further

The removal of the advantage law as applied to scrimmaging has not been quite so trouble-free according to preliminary reports received on Saturday's games. Spectators are perplexed and irritated because another scrimmage is ordered although the ball has been quickly got away from the first scrimmage. The public have not observed the infringements committed by forwards of both sides and the ire of the crowd has, therefore, been focused on the referees.

The present laws now stipulate that the ball must come out of the scrum behind the front row after being inserted fairly and struck for correctly by the hookers. If it does not come out in the proper manner then the Referee must either order it to be put in again if both sets of forwards are offending simultaneously or alternatively award a penalty where one player offends before the other. He cannot now allow the advantage to the non-offending side by letting play proceed if the non-offenders get the ball.

Referees must be extremely alert to detect the first offender otherwise there

will be endless scrimmaging.

The clubs can play their part by pointing out to their forwards the consequences under the new rule of incorrect scrimmaging. If players are not prepared to scrimmage properly there will be numerous penalties.
