.MAHOLO COLNE UP UP IN A TET SEVEN CEYS

Circumstances have changed completely since January 7th, 1961, when we should have played Oldham at Thrum Hall. Then the League positions of the two teams were practically indentical. Only a slight disparity in the scoring records distinguished the two sides. Both teams were Top Four candidates. Now, however, both are out of the running and no longer have any interest in any competition. All that remains is the improving of League positions so that better inter-county fixtures can come their way in the forthcoming season.

Perhaps, at this stage of the season with only two matches remaining to be played, this can be a good thing. With nothing at stake players should endeavour to give the public full value for their money by playing entertaining football. Both sides should be capable of doing this. Oldham certainly have always been an attractive side to watch. There are many outstanding personalities in their ranks. In Kellett and Pitchford they have a potential Test half-back pairing, while the two centre positions are in the capable hands of Test star Alan Davies and Holden who was signed this season at a £6,000 fee from Wigan. Once these players get on the move they should be a delight to watch.

With so many backs of Test standard in their ranks a must for the Watersheddings side is a good pack of forwards. The Oldham six have shed some of their lustre and cannot be compared to the men behind them. Efforts have been made to strength the forwards. Robinson was signed from Whitehaven at a big fee, Payne from Liverpool City, while Dave Parker was signed from Lancashire Rugby Union and Parker T. came from Lock Lane. The forwards have plenty of potentiality but they need experience and blending before they can become the force that's necessary for a Top Four team.

Although the season is coming to its lean finish nevertheless it is always a pleasure, no matter what time of the year it is, to welcome the Oldham team, officials and supporters to our midst. Our relations with the Oldham Club have ever been most cordial and we trust that this evening we shall have a match that will be in keeping with the excellent spirit that exists between the two clubs.

Noon, now on Oldham's right wing, was sent off in the match against Blackpool. His case came up last Monday and on the outcome of this meeting will depend whether he plays tonight or not.

Another Oldham player was sent off the field last Tuesday evening against Warrington. This was Robinson, their second row forward. His case, however, will not come up until after seven days have elapsed since he was sent off.

Replacing Ganley at full-back is Sims who came to Oldham as a wing threequarter and was signed from a Leigh Junior club.

For their final game of the season Oldham play Keighley at Oldham.



YORKSHIRE CUP DRAW.

The Yorkshire Cup Draw was made at Featherstone on Wednesday evening last. We are paired with Castleford at Castleford. By all accounts, we have not met them this season, Castleford are a greatly improved team and are developing a young side on the right lines. They endeavour to play football at every opportunity. Already we are looking forward to participating in this match. The last time we played at Castleford was in the last match of season 1959-60 and suffered defeat by 20 pts. to 14 pts. We have this defeat to wipe out and believe that by the time August comes around we shall be capable of winning our first round Yorkshire Cup tie.

AWAY MATCHES.

It is amazing that we have not won a single League match away from home since we defeated Keighley at Keighley on December 10th, 1960, and yet in the Challenge Cup Competition our away record has been exceptional. Prior to our defeat by Wigan at Swinton we had not lost a cup-tie away from home since we lost to St. Helens at Wembley in 1956. How to explain the difference between winning cup matches away from home and losing League matches away from home is entirely beyond me, unless it points to the fact that a supreme effort is made to win cup matches and that reaction sets in in the case of League matches. A young and inexperienced side is not capable of maintaing a Top Four and Cup challenge. Experience and strength are vital factors in being able to withstand the rigours of keen competition. This we had in small measure this season but next season we shall have it in greater measure. Our sojourn in the Lancashire League will hold us in good stead when we return to the Yorkshire League.

Despite the drop-out happenings the team did exceptionally well at Warrington and deserved a better fate than the defeat by an 18 pt. margin.
