

WATERSHEDDINGS NEWS AND VIEWS

Leaving Bolton however we ran into some glorious sunny weather and arrived at Keswick at 11-50 a.m. There the boys enjoyed the usual large grilled steak and poached egg, which disappeared in no time. Afterwards they set off on a leg stretching walk and the coach picked them up some two miles outside Keswick on the main road to Whitehaven, arriving at the ground at 1-40 p.m., in ample time to prepare ourselves for the match. We must congratulate our coach proprietors, Messrs. Barlows Ltd., upon their arranging of the coach, some seats being taken out and tables brought in. Some of our players are card manipulators and from observation, should secure honours in shuffling and sleight of hand !

OUR VISITORS

THE SECOND TEST

We must congratulate the Australians upon winning the 'Ashes' at Swinton on November 9th. Whilst we acknowledge that the present Australian team is good fast and strong, their latest victory must be discounted somewhat by the depleted forces of the Great Britain team. Put the boot on the other foot and suppose that the Australians had to play 11 men for the majority of the game, key men like their out half and a centre, we consider that a different tale would be unfolded and less mud slinging at officials and selection committee of the Great Britain team. It is easy to grumble but not many bouquets are handed out when a victory comes along, oh no, it is the players then. There are 13 selectors on the international committee and whether this is too many is a problem which we cannot comment upon.

However, there is one thing, that the Australians play the type of football which is a delight to watch, their speed and handling should give encouragement for the home clubs to put their house in order. We should say without contradiction that the average Australian player covers twice as much ground in a match as the average British player.

POSTPONING MATCHES

The President of the Australian Rugby League Board of Control, Mr. W. G. Buckley, who is at present in this country, discussed with the Rugby League Council at its last meeting, Australia's reaction to English League Clubs playing League matches in CLOSE PROXIMITY to Test matches. The Rugby League Council will now give every consideration to the postponement of games scheduled on the day of the Third Test on Saturday, 30th November.

We are due to play Barrow at Barrow on this date and we see no reason whatever why we should postpone this match, it is a far cry from Leeds to Barrow.

At the Second Test, at Swinton, we consider that a crowd of 30,883 was an excellent one considering the great counter attractions within a radius of 5 miles, such as the Manchester November Handicap (and the last day of racing ever to take place on this course) and Manchested United playing Tottenham Hotspur at Old Trafford.
