OUR GAME

Discussions are still taking place regarding the effort to improve attendances at Rugby League matches, and a meeting of Lancashire club directors and committeemen was held at the Grand Hotel, Manchester on Wednesday last, for the purpose of each club airing its views on the matter and we hope some good will come of it. Attendances at the second round Challenge Cup matches on Saturday last, in our opinion, reached rock bottom. Ignoring the game between Wigan and St. Helens, which attracted 39,318 spectators, the attendances at the remaining seven ties totalled only 51,092, giving an average of 7,440. The weather was fine but cold, and the ties warranted better 'gates' than those recorded. The attendance at the Warrington v Salford match was only 8,559. This game was televised and we must leave the guess to the reader as to how it affected the 'gate'. From an advertisement point, this match had received much publicity from the Manchester Press, but it is obvious that the fans went elsewhere on Saturday afternoon. If the show is good enough the fans will roll up, as shown by the attendance of over 39,000 at Wigan, but here again, from people who attended the match, it was far from satisfactory.

Numerous supporters have made suggestions explaining the decline in our game. Some say that wages are too high and that makes teams win at any cost and neglect the entertainment for the customer who pays. A basic wage should be introduced. Revert to the old play-the-ball rule on a five or even ten yards basis. Some blame the standard of refereeing, but here let us state that the referee does not stop the players from playing the game, that is if the players are good enough. A further retirement of five or ten yards would prevent the old cry "offside", an infringement that holds up the game and which is one of the most annoying.

May we thank all members and supporters who have written regarding improvements, the letters have been handed to Mr. Jack Errock, one of the seven legislators representing the Rugby League.
