

Most Rugby League Clubs, and also many Soccer Clubs and County Cricket Clubs have had great difficulty during the past few years in making ends meet — in fact most of these Clubs are owing money to the banks.

Splendid efforts have been made in running Pools, and Suppporters Clubs' ventures to help to keep the game alive.

Attendances and revenue has dropped seriously, and if the game is to survive new ideas will have to be applied, in an attempt to get the fans back on the terraces.

Why have gates fallen? Some think the game is not as attractive as formerly, whilst some believe it is due to the changes in the rules. But most Club officials are convinced the real reason for the dwindling attendances is the fact that Rugby League matches are televised live on Saturday afternoons. This, together with International Rugby Union matches and Horse Racing on T.V. is keeping many of our supporters from coming to our game on Saturday afternoons.

To counter this situation, many Clubs have installed Floodlights to enable them to play matches in the evenings in midweek. This has not been an overwhelming success, because Floodlight matches are usually staged in the very worst of weather during the winter months.

It is also a fact that on Saturday afternoons a number of our old supporters are using their cars, to join their wives in shopping in town centres and markets.

My own Club was one of the first to suggest we try a match on a Sunday afternoon, when the difficulties referred to above do not exist. We were the first Club to arrange a Senior match on a Sunday, and with another Club, the first to play on Sunday. We played Dewsbury in December last and Blackpool and Workington this month, on a Sunday afternoon. We also played at Dewsbury on a Sunday, and they were well satisfied with the attendance.

I congratulate the Oldham Club on their enterprise in trying the experiment of Sunday Football, and hope the public of Oldham and District will help to make the experiment a big success.

Like every other club which has experimented with Sunday football, Oldham will be closely scrutinising the attendance figures after today's game—the first Sunday fixture at Watersheddings.

It is always difficult to assess crowd potential or otherwise on the strength of just one match. If Oldham really wanted to test public reaction, they would have to experiment with a series of Sunday games.

But at least, there are early indications from other clubs to show that Sunday could be a useful ally in the fight against drifting Saturday afternoon attendances.

My own view is that, while Sunday games bring a multitude of problems, they should at least be given a chance.

That appears to be Oldham's view, too, and as far as next season is concerned, I suppose a lot will depend on the crowd figures today.

Generally, players are not keen on having their normal weekend routine shattered by the switch from Saturday and, rightly I feel, they expect extra renumeration for giving up their Sunday afternoon.

As far as Oldham's players are concerned today, they will receive a bonus dependent on the size of the crowd over a certain minimum—a fool-proof plan.

It is also another major reason why the attendance will have to be bigger than average. If the players find they have nothing extra in the wage packet, they may feel inclined to be against further experiments in the future.

With no interest left in either the Challenge Cup or the top-16, fans may feel there is little to play for in the remaining four games this season.

On the contrary, Oldham are anxious to pick up as many points as possible from Leigh, Warrington and Swinton to boost their position in the Lancashire League so as to stand a better chance of attractive Yorkshire fixtures next season.
