ALL ABOUT "THE WIRES"

Those people who have been associated with the Oldham and Warrington clubs for a long while, will recall the many battles between the respective teams. Warrington gained the better of Oldham in a Northern Union final; in 1921 they beat the Watersheddings team at Broughton Rangers' ground, the Cliffe, in the Lancashire Challenge Cup Final and also struggled to win the League Championship on a mud heap at Maine Road, Manchester, after a cloudburst.

Warrington also won a famous cup tie when Brian Bevan made an interception when it seemed certain that Oldham would succeed and get a place at Wembley. But it has not always been like that, as Oldham have gained some good wins over the Wires. Warrington folk remember such fine players as Sloman, Ferguson, Rix, Farrar, Hall, Rees, and in recent years Ganley, one of the best goal-kickers we have seen in the game.

Then again, Warrington have signed a few of Oldham's stars. We recall Gerry Donovan, the scrum half back who could head a rugby ball as skilfully as some of the men who have played for the Latics, Charlie Winslade, Keith Holden and Geoff Sheldon. I think that full back Bobbie Scott, who eventually played for Swinton, was signed from Oldham, but that point seems to be arguable.

Warrington these days have not the pride of place as they had when Brian Bevan, Harry Bath, Jim Featherstone, Bill Riley, Bill Derbyshire and Harold Palin were playing. But there are some highly promising players — Parry Gordon, scrum half, and his partner Warren Ayres. Tom Conroy, who is in the centre, was having one of his first matches here when Mervyn Hicks was also in his early days at Wilderspool.

Unfortunately, a broken nose keeps international Billy Aspinall out of action, and Ken Parr, the ex-Rochdale forward, is also an absentee. You have seen Len McIntyre in action before! He just will not say he is a veteran and the way he is going on, he will be playing well into the seventies.

Dave Cotton is the son of the Warrington ex-hooker, and Barry Briggs is the brother of Wilf the Oldham player. So they will be keen rivals this afternoon.

Brian Glover, the County three-quarter, is still a forceful player although he has been at Warrington for about twelve seasons. Jack Melling, the centre, has had more than his share of injuries. He is a resourceful player. Keith Affleck, the full back, has regained his place in the side and is a useful goal-kicker.

You all know the capabilities of Arthur Hughes, your former loose forward. This should be his favourite pitch. Over the past few years you have had very good service from that brilliant half back Gerry Helme, who did wonders at Warrington.

All fans at Warrington hope that he will have much better health and that fortunes will improve at your club, which has many proud traditions.

Finally, if you hear a lot of chanting, it will be the Warrington Junior Supporters' Club who are making things really hum at Wilderspool. Formed only a few months ago, they are recruiting new members and doing an excellent job in whipping up enthusiasm. Perhaps you can start a similar club at Oldham!

CUP LUCK—NIL

Our exit from the Lancashire County Challenge Cup Competition on Saturday last was, to say the least, a great disappointment, especially as we got to the final last season and it was hoped to go one better this term and take the trophy.

The performance of the team, however, was marred by some atrocious luck. The dismissal of Whitehead and McCourt and the injuries to Crellin and Clark in the second half did not help matters and the task for the nine fit Oldham men on the field was far too great.

But how hard they tried and credit must go to each and every one of them for a fine effort. To lose by only four points against a team like Swinton and with the odds stacked heavily against you is indeed a fine effort.

My own view is that Whitehead particularly was exceptionally unlucky to get "marching orders" on the intervention of a touch judge who saw the Whitehead incident but seemingly saw very little else.

For instance he failed to see a vicious attack on Whitehead by young Kenny, the Swinton No. 7, when Whitehead had kicked downfield. Kenny continued to run despite the fact that the ball had gone. He felled Whitehead with what could be termed as a "forearm smash" and a couple of times earlier the touch judges had overlooked attacks on the former Swinton player.

However, it's no use crying over spilt milk, but surely this Swinton win must go down as a luck-inspired win against a luckless Oldham side.


