DO YOU KNOW OUR VISITORS?..

OLDHAM WERE ALWAYS "TOUGH"

Like Halifax, Oldham are one of the old time Greats of the Rugby League, come of late into rather hard and difficult times. I can go back with Oldham, to the times of Joe Ferguson, that mighty man of football and famous kicker of goals from all angles and distances. Joe finished (I think) as a Committeeman, but had played till well into his 'forties.' They like old famous players to join the Committee. Fred Ashworth — a splendid forward — and 'Guardsman' Tom Rees — an international full-back were serving till recent years, and may still be. Oldham's most famous Chairman was Fred Hutchens, a great man on the Council of the R.L., a 'Tour' manager, and a man of integrity, respected by all. In the great and gallant years (and they were many and long) Oldham produced, or purchased, some splendid players, with great personalities. Albert Brough may be forgotten now, but he was 'another Albert Fildes' in looks and build, and an international and Touring star. He was only one of a tremendous Oldham pack which also had internationals Bob Sloman and Hermann Hilton.

Fifty years ago, they developed, locally, three brothers, of Italian family origin, into star players — the Corsi brothers. Joe became an honours man at centre, Louis was a tearaway winger (he once scored an 80 yard try at Knowsley Road, partly by sidestepping, partly by cannoning off defenders) and also won R.L. Representative Honours. Angelo was good, but not, perhaps, as successful as the other two. In a team very 'Lancashire' in looks and speech, the Corsi's were dark, swarthy, acquiline faced and 'foreign,' but they had a 'Lanky' accent just the same, as no doubt, some coloured players to-day, also have. After all, the Karalius brothers are 'Lanky' enough, but they are of a family of Polish origin — as other Widnesian players have been. Of course, you have only to mention 'Fitzpatrick' in St. Helens (and in other clubs that felt the fury of that meteor of Rugby) to set the Fans — at least the older ones - grinning. He was it was said an old 'Black and Tan.' He was only medium in Height and barely more than 131 stone in weight. And a good, fast second row man and a tigerish sort of attacker and defender, he was all energy. But he used to go berserk, and would go into a tackle with such fury that he 'laid em out.' Ben Halfpenny once laid him out, and he suffered a temporary jaw dislocation, but Oldham eventually had to put him aside as a player. Great hearted, yes: but he caused too much trouble and had too many suspensions.

Not was he any sort of illiterate Irishman. He studied for and gained a degree, and after many years as a first class full-back, he joined the BBC as a sports commentator, and has done well there.

Oldham have still retained a few stars, and Bob Irving is one in particular. Though a Yorkshireman he plays like a traditional Lancashire second row forward, fast, elusive, good hands and a fine distributor. I hope they can assemble more like him, and secure, or develop centres like Sid Rix who once graced their team, and many international teams.

I could mention dozens more: but, above all, I remember their powerful challenge in other days and I want to see a formidable Oldham side once

again challenging our very best defiances.


