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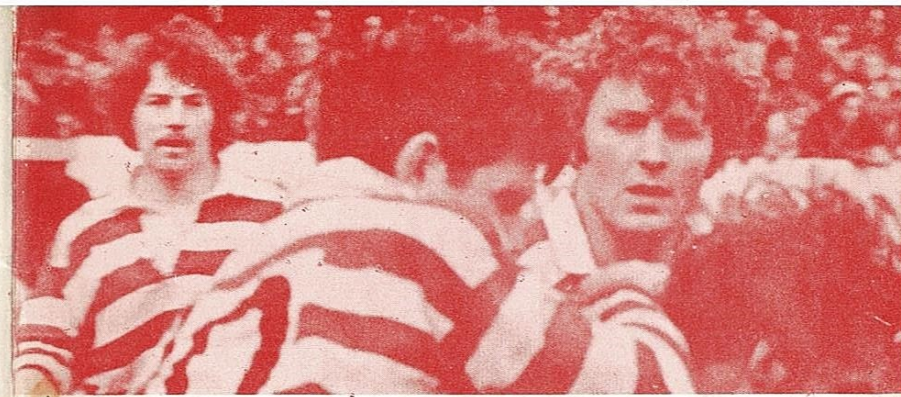

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REVIVAL

It was New year's Day, 1972. Barrow-in-Furness was deserted, almost like a ghost town save for the two or three thousand R.L. faithfuls who turned up at Craven Park to see their side do battle with an Oldham team perilously close to the bottom of the table.

Two weeks earlier, Oldham had shocked the Northern Rugby League with their win at Bradford. Though we didn't know it at the time that win at Odsal was to be the big turning point.

But back to Barrow. As it happened, Oldham chalked up their second consecutive away win to wipe away some of the gloom that had descended on the rugby scene in Oldham town.

That night's newspapers were bitter-sweet. They reported Oldham's victory, but on the inside pages criticised the club's administration for their failure to strengthen the side despite obvious weaknesses.

My own article, headed: "A trip to the moon that ended at Mumps", pumped home my view that the ginger group was dead, together with its aims and ambitions.

Yet as the sports editions hit the street, their newsprint barely dry, Oldham were going into action.

We didn't know it at the time, but as Bob Irving and I left Oldham's Craven Park dressing room together, there was a lot of significance in the fact that chairman Arthur Walker bumped into us walking from the opposite direction.

I thought it strange that the Oldham boss should be walking INTO the ground at a time when most officials are discussing, drinking, or debating in the boardroom.

Once outside Craven Park we knew the reason . . . one Frank Foster, a fearless fellow. He stepped from the ever-lengthening shadows, and in that Cumbrian accent greeted Irving, with whom he had played for Great Britain, with a: "Aye, Marra! I reckon I'll be with you next week".

I pricked up my ears . . . and, sure enough, an hour later, Mr. Walker made the official announcement: Oldham WERE negotiating with Barrow for the player's signature.

It's history now that the talks took around three weeks to reach a satisfactory conclusion . . . but every one of those weeks was worth the wait.

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For such was Foster's impact on the pack, the team, and the supporters that a team which was in the league's bottom four suddenly realised it had the ability to take on and conquer most clubs in the league.

Points, goals, tries—and pounds for the players. They rolled in like they have never rolled in since the second division days of 1963-4. Sadly the amazing rags-to-riches tale came too late to really have much of an effect on attendances, though the 3,000 or so who travelled to Wigan for the play-off gave an indication that interest had been re-awakened.

Now, we are on the verge of starting the second chapter in the big revival story . . . at least, let's hope so.

In the season coming I would like to see Oldham :

At least reaching the top eight, despite better, all-Lancashire competition.

Reaching a final of one of the several knock-out cups for which they will be competing ; the Lancashire Cup, the TV Cup, the John Player Cup and the Challenge Cup among them.

Continuing to please their newly-won Sunday supporters with the same sort of classy, speedy rugby which won over the faithful last season.

And what's more, I reckon the team has the ability, the fitness, and the ambition to do it.

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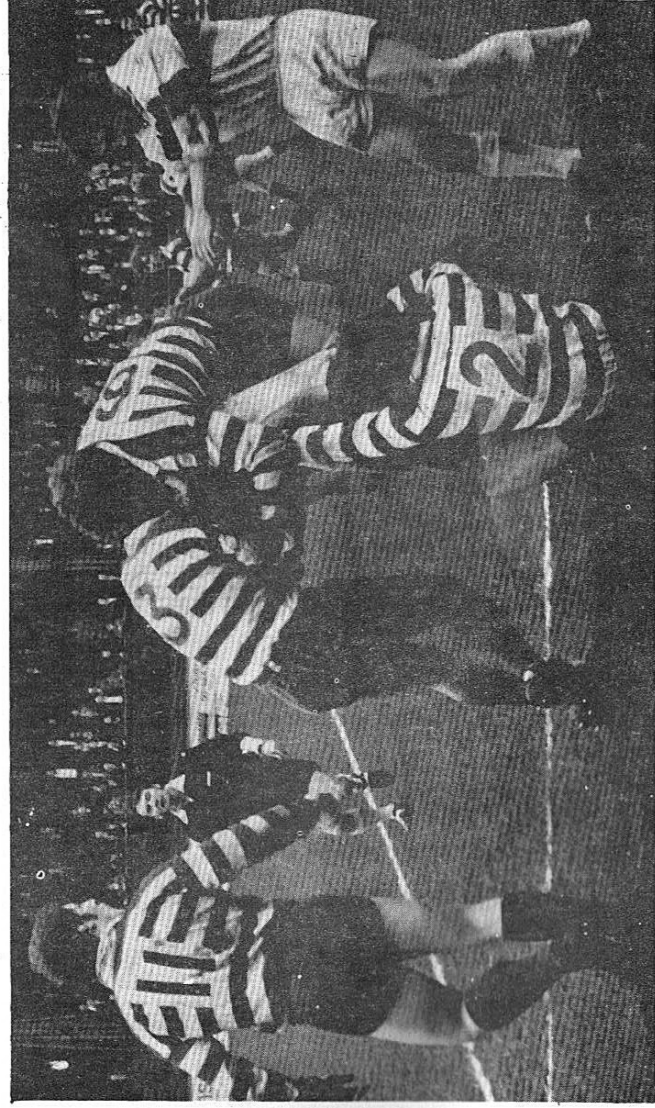
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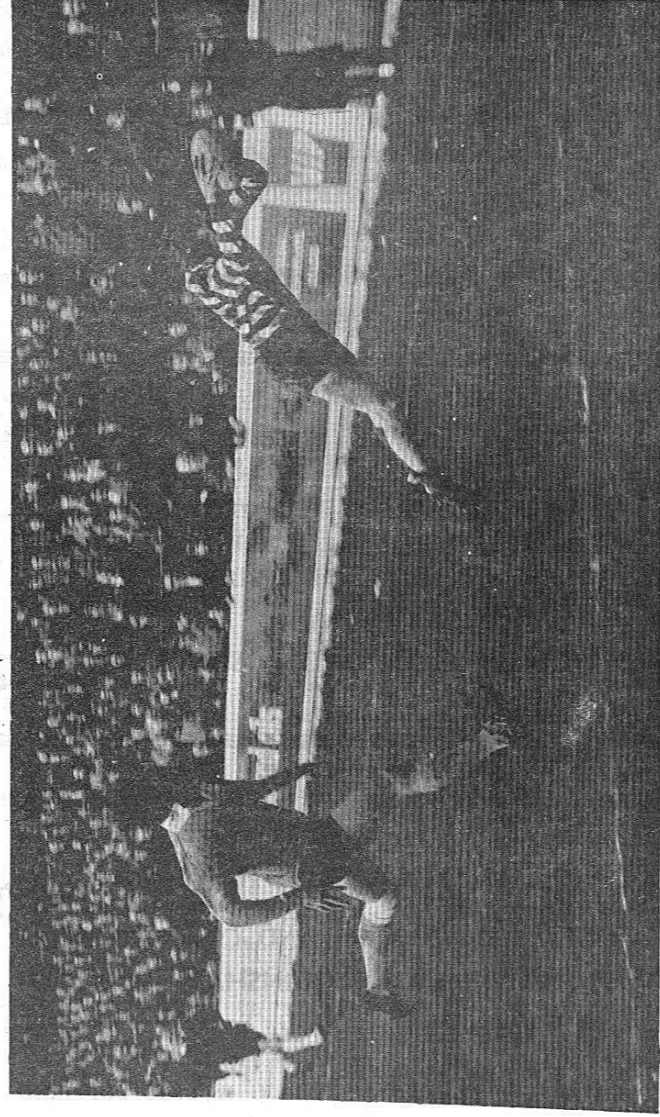
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OLDHAM v WHITEHAVEN : McFarlane tackled.



OLDHAM v YORK : Hodgkinson leaves the opposition standing and dives over for a try

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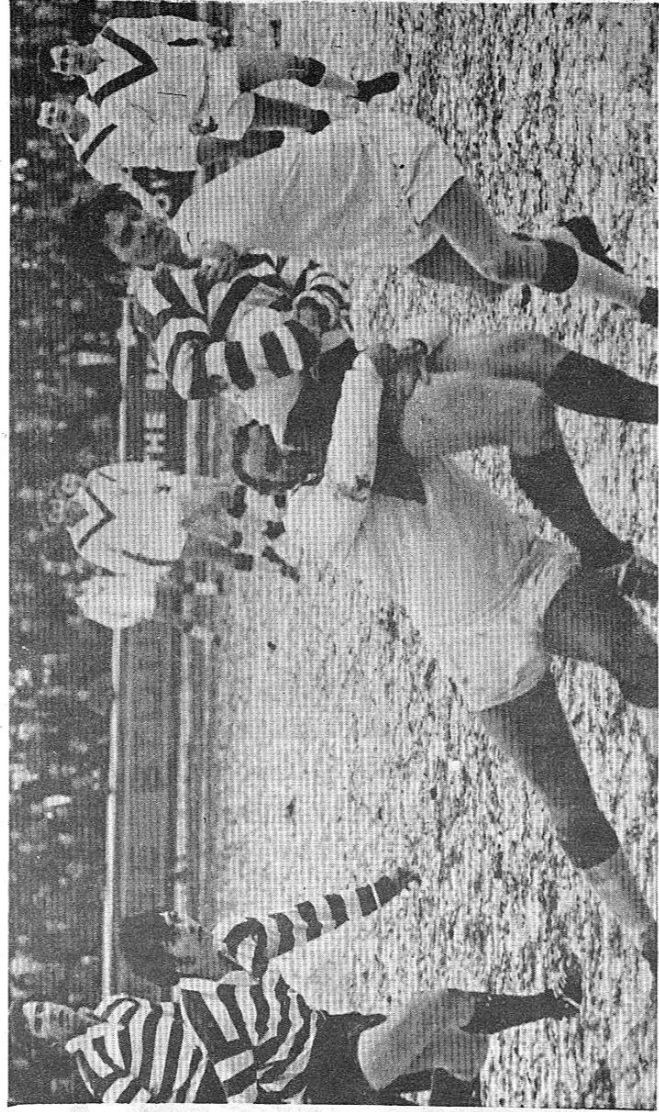

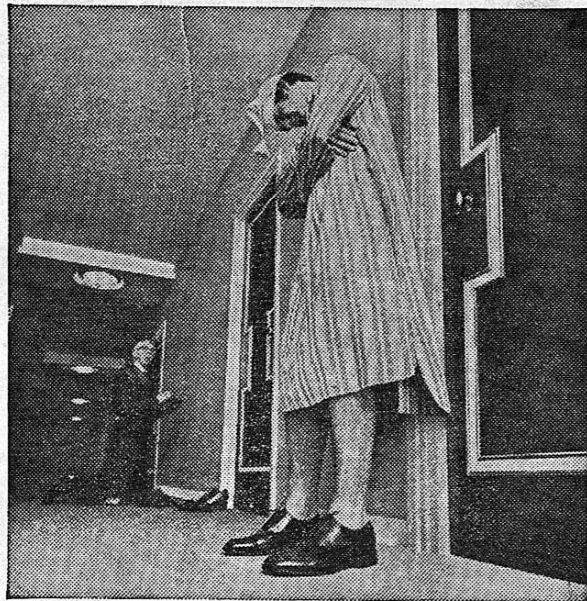
OLDHAM v HUNSLET : Elliot scores.

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BRITAIN IMPROVE AFTER DISASTROUS START

Great Britain looked anything but 'great' during the first test of 1971-2 when they fell 18-13 to New Zealand. To make matters worse Britain led 8-0 at one stage but they then frittered away their chances whilst the eager Kiwis snapped their's up. Best for New Zealand were skipper Christian, and Phil Orchard. Scorers for New Zealand were: John Whittaker, Phil Orchard, Dennis Williams and Robin Orchard tries, with Henry Tatana kicking three goals. Derek Whitehead kicked two goals for Great Britain whose try scorers were Bill Benyon, Chris Hesketh and Bill Ashurst.

Britain were unlucky to lose the second test although once again they let the Kiwis off the hook, this time they were leading 11-0. Following the injury to Bob Haigh, however, Britain began to falter and once the Kiwis realised that victory was within their grasp there was no stopping them. With the score 17-14 Britain had a try controversially disallowed but whatever comments were passed about what could or should have happened the record books will always show a 17-14 win for New Zealand. Great Britain scored 4 tries to New Zealand's 3, (Clive Sullivan, Joe Walsh, Roger Millward, Mike Coulman) but David Watkins only kicked one goal. On the other hand Henry Tatana kicked four goals for New Zealand as well as scoring a try. Phil Orchard scored their other two tries.

Britain won the third test 12-3 and so continued their improved form although the Kiwis, with the test series stitched up, played

as if they were not too bothered about the final score. John Greengrass scored the Kiwi try whilst John Atkinson (2 tries) and John Holmes (2 goals and 2 drop-goals) were the British scorers. The Kiwis became the first all New Zealand side to win a test series in England and with encouraging results in Australia and France they will be a difficult team to beat when the World Cup visits France next autumn.

Before taking on France, Britain played Leeds in a match for the benefit of Mike Shoebottom. Although this match was played under difficult conditions it proved to be a lively affair which ended in a 12-12 draw. The British forwards played well whilst Ken Kelly and Syd Hynes impressed in the backs. Brian Hughes and David Ward scored Leeds' tries and Terry Clawson landed 3 goals. For Britain, Ken Kelly and Bill Ashurst scored tries with Bill Ashurst also kicking 2 goals. A goal from Steve Nash completed the British scoring.

In Toulouse, Britain looked far from a successful side when they trailed 7-0 after 6 minutes but they recovered magnificently. In the second half the British tackling was tightened up considerably and the handling and running was first rate. This improvement made for an exciting match with plenty of good rugby. Capdouze's tactical kicking was a feature of the French team but the British teamwork gave them a deserved 10-9 win. Capdouze kicked 2 goals and 2 drop-goals for France, Ruiz scoring the French try. Clive Sullivan and Bill Benyon scored the British tries whilst John Holmes obliged with 2 goals.

It proved a tough game in which a rather depleted British XIII had to work hard in order to defeat an enthusiastic York team 28-22. In this high scoring encounter the York scorers were John Maloney 5 goals and Danny Sheehan, Rich Horner, Bryan West and Johnson tries. For Britain John Holmes kicked 5 goals whilst skipper Clive Sullivan led the try scoring with 3, the other try scorers being Phil Coupland, Les Dyl and Ged Dunn. The match was marred slightly by the dismissals for technical offences of hookers Peter Dunn and Mike Stephenson.

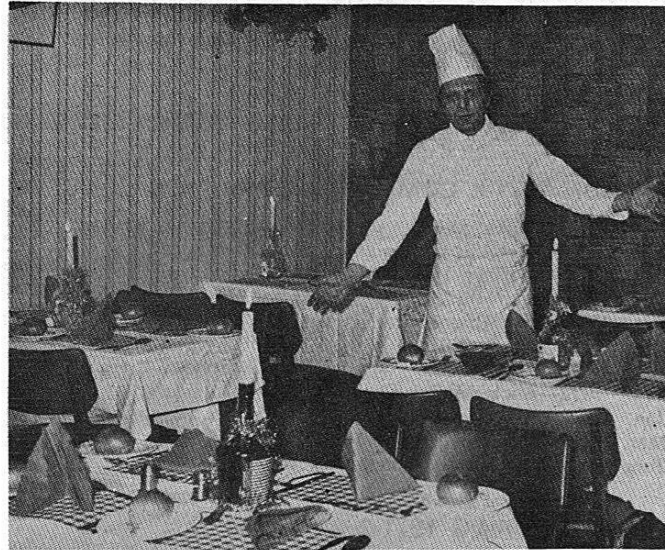

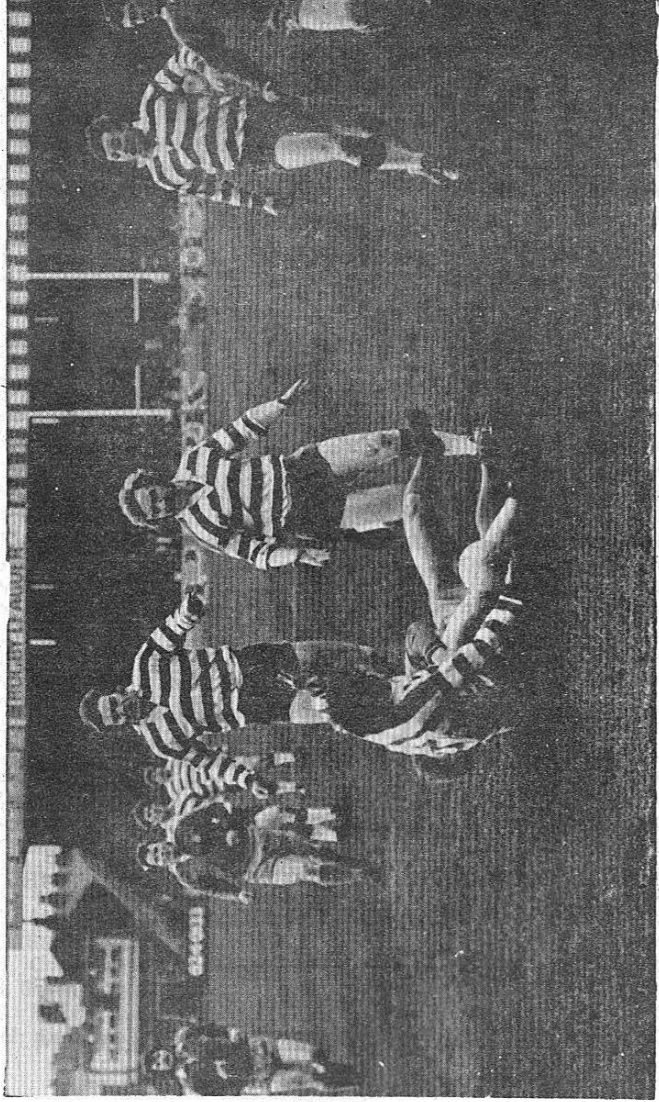
