WIGAN WERE ONE OF A DOZEN TOP R.L. CLUBS WHO PRIVATELY MET LAST WEEK TO DISCUSS THE CURRENT SITUATION IN THE GAME.

This was the meeting which has been described in some circles as 'a move towards rebellion'. Once again we stress to our supporters that it is nothing of the sort.

Why did the thieves miss the brown paper parcel of Cup Final tickets? 'They almost certainly realised the tickets would be no use to them. Each one could be traced, and had the tickets been stolen the League would have cancelled every one of them'. Mr. Sutcliffe explained. 'They probably knew what they were doing.

Whatever the reason the tickets, still at Central Park because the semi-final was drawn, were safely handed over to Wednesday's replay winners. The tickets were the Cup Finalists' allocation normally handed over to the semi-final winners as soon as they have won.

The intruders came in through the ground, via the Ambulance Room windows. Annoyingly, the Burglar Alarm which is so sensitive that it has had staff out on more than one occasion for false alarms, did not this time respond.

The clubs are interested only in making their feelings known through official channels. They hope to make progress legitimately, and talk about 'rebellion' and 'breakaway' are both premature and inaccurate. If this were not so, Wigan would not have been

As a leading club Wigan must be concerned with what other leading clubs are thinking and doing. That is why we have been represented.

All the leading Rugby League clubs concerned about the state and condition of the game. They feel that necessary progress is being stifled by smaller, less progressive clubs who are three-fifths the using majority to bar voting progress. So do we.

Wigan, like most of the other clubs who attended the meeting last week, and the meeting scheduled for Wednesday of this week, are hoping that a solution can be found. If not we hope for a compromise between the opposing factions.

As far as we are concerned, there is no complaint against the Rugby League administration, who can only make decisions within the framework of the present Constitution.

STRANGE WORKINGS OF R -OFF THE PITCH legislation projected either against

RUGBY LEAGUE is still strange to me, a Southerner who loves my adopted north, but who considers this 13-a-side professional rugby is as good an entertainment as you'll find anywhere.

Like all ball players, and ball-game lovers, I find myself at a loss to really understand the finer points, the subtle techniques, of a game I have never played. Which only makes my enthusiasm for R.L. the more surprising, I believe. Rugby Union, for example, leaves me cold.

But I am even more confused by the Rugby League game off the field How ever anyone allowed the present administrative muddle to come to pass is beyond my imagination.

Background

I do not speak without some knowledge of the inside workings of professional sport. For nearly four years I was employed by the Football League as Public Relations Officer and editor of the magazine Football League Review, which I founded as Soccer Review and developed over the first 5½ years of its existence.

So I think I may clain to know something of the problems facing the Rugby League game . . . and I

remain mystified how it is that small clubs with scant support, and even less resource, can financial over-rule the wishes and even the well-being of the larger clubs.

Basically, the problem is in that rule which demands a three-fifths majority vote on any issue. The Football League has a similar restrictive majority but, at least, they do not adopt the principle of -club-one-vote. If they had to suffer that, all hope for progressive legislation would be muffled by the small clubs as it is in the

The soccer people do not offer full League status to the 48 clubs in the Third and Fourth Divisions—only Associate membership with a mere four votes between the lot of them.

It means that the bigger 44 clubs in the First and Second Divisions have one vote each, the 48 clubs in the lower two divisions just four votes between them. Even so, the really big fish find some of their aims thwarted, but it is true to say that the Football League balance is about right, that the either the very big or the

Necessary

Rugby League needs two divisions, with Second Division clubs allowed only Associate Membership, and a collective three or four votes...and then the three-fifths majority bogey would assume far less fierce proportions.

The private club meetings referred to on page one are seeking to implement the two divisions plan, resurrected by the now sacked Marketing Consultants, but their ultimate aim should be to work for a changed Constitution within which the smaller clubs could not block progress necessary for the future prosperity of The League as a whole rather

than a section of its clubs. Within that Constitution the vexed question of the 15 per cent Levy would then, surely, solve itself. The imposition on the bigger clubs with larger wage bills, and administrative costs and overheads, of such a deduction from gate receipts which are tending to diminish anyway, is short-sighted. There can be no argument about that.

A fairer method would be a five or ten per cent deduction, but if the Football League method was adopted then some of



the smaller clubs would go to the wall.

There, if the percentage of the visiting club's share of the gate does not reach £200 then the home club has to make the amount up to that figure.

In R.L. terms that would mean no visiting club would leave after the end of a game without a £50 cheque from their hosts. IMAGINE HOW THAT WOULD SORT OUT THE SHEEP FROM THE GOATS ...

Oldham go into their Championship play-off match without their skipper Cliff Hill, a former Central Park favourite. He received a 'Bennetts' fracture of the thumb in a league match with Warrington just over a fortnight ago.

Oldham are prepared to find their Halifax-based centre Mick Siddall employment as an engineering draughtsman in Oldham after he told the club this week he was being made redundant. Also redundant at the same firm in Halifax are Salford's former Great Britain back-row forward Colin Dixon, Laurie Hinchcliffe, Bradford Northern open side prop forward, Stan Kielty, Bradford Northern 'A' team coach and Geoff Crowther, former Oldham, Rochdale Hornets and Salford three-quarter.

Joe Collins, Oldham's centre at the start of their great 1972 revival, has become disgruntled about not being a regular member of the side and has told the club he will not train or play again this season.

Another Oldham centre who was on loan to Huyton, John Mullarkey, who joined the Watersheddings club some three seasons age from Widnes Junior football, has cabled the club from Australia asking for a clearance. Oldham are to ask £1,000 from any club requiring his services.

Ray French, former St. Helens and Widnes international forward, now a master at the Rugby League-Rugby Union hotbed school, Cowley Grammar School, St. Helens, is taking a party of schoolboys to Argentina in July for a month long


