#### PRESIDENT'S PAGE

On this pre-Christmas Sunday, I extend a most warm and cordial welcome to Officials, Players and Supporters of the OLDHAM Club, they are having a good season. They were here last season and forced a draw 12—12, but their previous visit was as far back as 1964-65 season and this seems too long a gap really for two teams not to visit each other.

Having welcomed the visitors, I can tell you that last Tuesday the Committee gave their approval to a scheme for the improvement of the Social Club or Pavilion as some people prefer to call it. We are well aware that the amenities in the Social Club are not exactly attractive and it is our intention to make them so through the intigration of the small games room as part of the main members room, alteration and modernisation of the existing bars, new toilets, re-decorating, re-furnishing and the provision of proper catering. Its said that one has to speculate to accumulate, we are speculating and we are sure that the final result will make the Social Club very attractive, all thats required then is for the people to patronise it in a big way, that's when we hope we shall accumulate. At the same time I can also tell you, that the Committee have under consideration a scheme for the covering of the open stand and maybe including the installation of floodlighting.

Turning to the question of support, there isn't the slightest doubt that we need much, more support if we are ever to pay our way on football income alone. The total expenses of the football side of the club last season was £20,587 and that means we need between £900-£1000 each home gate to pay our way without the aid of auxiliary incomes. A tall order you may say, how many R.L. clubs get a £1000 gate these days, our total income from the football side last season including a share of the R.L. Levy Fund, Challenge Cup Pool, T.V. Fees, Members Subscriptions and £1000 from profits distributed by the R.L., was £16,400. The actual cash taken at the gate and that includes league, cup and second team games was £9737. From the last figure supporters will see plainly that without the Levy Fund, Challenge Cup Pool, T.V. Fees and our own auxiliary incomes we just wouldn't be able to cope and they will also see why I make a very strong plea for more support from the sporting fraternity of this area. In fact if everyone of our supporters were to bring a friend along we could almost double our gate receipts and bigger crowds would make even better the atmosphere generally around the ground which I'm sure the players would appreciate. So please spread the gospel and persuade your friends to pay us a visit, we'll do our best to improve the playing angle but we must have that extra support.

I end on a cheerful note, I can tell you that Nigel Stephenson is having a run in the "A" team this weekend.





#### **RUGBY LEAGUE FOCUS**

Clive Sullivan's service to Rugby League has never been fully appreciated in the past but his leadership of the World Cup winning side should now present a truer picture of this dedicated sportsman.

Clive has spent many seasons on the Great Britain scene—he visited Australia in 1968 with the World Cup side and again in 1970 with the record breaking tour team. He has been a favourite with Hull fans since 1961 but his popularity has reached a new level following his feats in France.

It is fitting that his benefit season at The Boulevard should coincide with what he describes as 'the proudest playing spell of my career in being able to skipper such a fine British side'.

When he was named as skipper that bitter Australian critic Sydney Barnes took a typical swipe from Down Under by claiming his appointment as an indication of Britain's feeble chances in the World Cup. "What hope have Britain got when they name a winger as captain?" asked Barnes. He has got his answer now.

Sullivan's personal reply was contained in those four matches when he began with a first minute try against Australia in Perpignan. He then scored against France and New Zealand but saved his most spectacular effort for the Final—that memorable 90-yards run that was more like an Olympic slow-motion race. "I thought it was never going to end but I knew I had to make that line to shake the Aussies at that stage of the game", he recalled.

It was a try that ranked with another Sullivan scoring effort that I will treasure for years to come. The other moment was in Carcassonne in 1967 when Sullivan took a Neil Fox pass and after a glorious touchline run curved inside to give Britain a last minute 16—13 success.

But Sullivan's best work in the World Cup was not merely in attack. His cover tackling was supreme throughout and he drove and inspired his teammates in every game.

He was the perfect leader off the field, lending his experience to keep the side in the best of spirits. I for one hope that he is blessed with a bumper testimonial—and not merely because of his World Cup feats.

The game and its followers are indebted to the Clive Sullivans of this world and I only wish there were a few more to follow in his footsteps in future years.

#### **Coaching Tips**

#### THE ADVANTAGE LAW (continued)

9. The Advantage Law can be applied to all aspects of play, e.g., play-the-ball, scrimmaging, etc., and it is again referred to under the appropriate headings. Referees probably experience most difficulty in applying it to the knock-on and the examples given below will offer a guide both to Referees and to players.

#### Knock-on gathered by opponent

A Red player in attempting to catch the ball knocks it forward and it is immediately caught by an opposing Blue player. As possession of the ball is an advantage there is no difficulty in seeing that the Referee must allow play to proceed.

#### Played a second time

A Red player knocks-on and retrieves the ball before an opposing player can get to it. There is no advantage to the non-offending side and the Referee is correct in ordering a scrum. If the Red player, after knocking-on, touches the ball again it does not follow that play is immediately stopped. This is an important point because it has been the subject of misinterpretation in the past. An example of this past misinterpretation is when a full back fails to catch a kick, knocks-on and in spite of advancing opponents makes no effort to gather the ball but touches it with his foot under the mistaken impression that play will automatically stop because he has played the ball a second time. If the opponents take the ball then the Referee will allow play to proceed whether the full back plays the ball a second time or not.
