



Keith's powerful running makes him a danger to any opposition. Further news on the injury front is that Ralph Calvin has had specialist opinion on the troublesome knee injury he received early in the season and will be returning for a further check-up this coming week, when it is hoped that Ralph will get the go-ahead to resume training. #### THE RUGBY FOOTBALL LEAGUE

"Rugby League has inspired a modern "Doomsday Book". The pages are packed with woeful forecasts of the game's extinction . . . . the day when Rugby League would be kicked into touch.

The final chapter will never be written. The kiss-of-life, not death, is being

administered to Rugby League.

Historians will look back at 1974 and herald the season as the turning point in the game—the year when Rugby League sidestepped the threat of extinction.

For the past decade the "knockers" have had a field day. Their uninformed opinions spread like wildfire. The death wish was put on the finest game in the world and the voodoo almost worked as attendances dwindled and optimism waned.

Today, Rugby League is being revitalised. For the first time in years, a new wave of optimism is sweeping through the game, washing aside gloom and despondency. From the chairman to the gateman, the international to the schoolboy, the aim is identical—to make the "knockers" eat their words ... and choke on them.

The game is not blind to its faults. Nor is it shortsighted. The grass roots of Rugby League are being nurtured by B.A.R.L.A, and the brand new National Coaching Scheme. My appointment is part of the determined bid to polish the game's tarnished image.

At every level, a new pride is being cultivated. The sport's future is being

shaped . . . Rugby League undoubtedly has a great one.

In an age ultra-keen commercial competitiveness, Rugby League had to put itself in the shop window. Everyone in the game has to play a part in selling the game. Each supporter must become an ambassador, spreading the gospel, decrying the forecasts of extinction.

Public Relations is a new dimension in Rugby League administration, already recharged by go-ahead Secretary David Oxley and ambitious Chairman Brian

Snape.

The top priority is to boost the game's much maligned image. Maximum publicity is vital, exposure that will mirror the game to its best advantage. Rugby League has lost a lot of coverage in national newspapers, especially in the Sunday editions. We have to prove to sports editors that it is wise to invest in Rugby League because of the interest, which is not always reflected by match attendances.

My hopes are that personality features will once again grace the pages of our top daily newspapers, whose Rugby League writers, all dedicated to the sport, battle for space. The game could also be taken off the sports pages and made of general news interest, thus reaching new potential supporters.

Television, probably the most sensitive topic in the Rugby League world, must be harnessed to project the true image to millions of viewers, who would

otherwise never enjoy our game.

Rugby League must move with the times, following the pacesetters such as Salford and Warrington. Leisure is an industry today, and Rugby League is just one of many alt matives open to a working man—and his family. Social facilities have emerged as one of the strongest drawing points for a man's time and money.

Plans to help create a new image for the game include the improved build up of prestige matches, especially Wembley, the introduction of player of the vear awards, culminating in one of several too flight dinners, more sponsorship bringing increased prosperity, a general uplift in the presentation of the game, and in the long term the establishment of a top class Rugby League magazine.

The game has given itself a vote of confidence. The ultimate aim is to prove

that Rugby League is the name of the game".


