Kevin Humphreys is proving a worthy successor to the late Bill Buckley, who was so highly respected as the Australian League President. Like his predecessor president Humphreys is a popular figure at player level and has, I feel, over the last two years surprised English players with his higly approachable manner. It is a healthy sign for the game in Australia where the crowds have flocked back at the club matches this season and two ground records have already been broken.

The leadership that Humphreys has provided is one of the reasons. For besides managing the Sydney club Balmain, he devotes an amazing amount of time to the sport as president. With the world championships programme demanding his presence in Brisbane on three occasions he had, along with the representatives of other countries, to fit in the International Board meeting in Auckland, But it was typical of the man and his remarkable energy that he found the time to return to Brisbane for England's last game in Australia when he admitted he was disappointed he could not fly on to New Guinea for the game there.

His excuse was acceptable for he was committed to fly to Alice Springs to support a rugby festival in aid of the badly hit Darwin Rugby League. Humphreys may be a hard man to deal with over a boardroom desk at club and international level. But there is no doubt where his heart lies, and he was sporting enough to admit Australia had been lucky to draw in the game against England. He is always prepared to talk rugby into the late hours and his main regret when we were in Sydney was that English League chairman Brian Snape had been unable to spend the fortnight Down Under that he had planned.

"I think it would have been a great opportunity had Brian been able to make the trip at this particular time, but I shall be out for the second phase of the world championship in Europe", promised Humphreys. He was, of course, over here for the Ashes-winning trip by Australia 18 months ago and is hopeful his country can take the new-style world championship. More important, he is anxious to see the competition succeed as a whole and remains enthusiastic despite the disappointing gates in his country. "If we can break even financially I think the competition will have proved itself", he told me. "The main thing is that we have players being brought into competition at this level, giving them a challenge and incentive. The game has got to have this type of competition and we have got to learn from any mistakes that may be made this time".

I share his views to a point but I do feel that fans will find themselves overfaced with this competition if played annually. We must continue with the highly profitable Great Britain tours, whatever the share-out in receipts.

Accept the Challenge

It is a sad fact of life that Rugby League has more than its fair contingent of Dismal Jimmies who, annually at this time of the year, prophesy that this will be the last season.

Strangely most of them contradict themselves by turning up, wet or fine, to cheer on their favourite team but their pessimistic outlook is enough to scare off many of those tempted to come along and see what this Rugby League is all about.

It is also strange that these prophets of doom will confess that Rugby League is the best sport in the world but . . . the play is not as attractive as once it was; the legislators are men of straw; the rising costs have made it too expensive a hobby, and so on.

The League Secretary, Mr. David Oxley, was right when he said recently that too many sell the game short and fail to project the right image. If Rugby League is the best of all team games—and I for one believe it is—we should be "selling" it by emphasising all its many strong points.

Some of the more sensitive complain that certain parts of the media give Rugby League a "cloth cap image". That doesn't disturb me for after all you see more cloth caps at Twickenham or in the Royal Set at show-jumping than at half-a-dozen Rugby League matches but I do get upset when legislators, at league or club level, "sell the code short".

Emphasis should be placed on the good things—and they are many—and we could all accept as our motto this coming season "Bring a new friend each match". If we go to the trouble to "educate" these friends into the apparent mysteries of the game most of them will be sufficiently impressed by what they see to become enthusiastic fans.

There are outside problems and not the least is the ever-rising cost of living and travelling, especially for the man who has one or two young sons in tow, and so the first need is to concentrate on home support. Some clubs are going to find it hard going but despite airy-fairy talk of "super-leagues" the strong can not afford to let the weak go to the wall.

The way the newly-formed Commercial Managers Association is cooperating and passing on ideas is an encouraging sign. We, too, must do our best.
