"AFTER YOU, CLAUDE"

A Personal View by BOB PEMBERTON (Former Daily Telegraph R.L. expert)

SOME people think that Rugby League is too tough. That referees should help clean up the sport. What nonsense! Save us from these squeamish prigs who can't bear to see a little bit of devil put into the play. Take the brawn out of Rugby League and we might as well be left with watching the girls of St. Trinian's playing netball. Have YOU ever seen an exhibition game of Rugby League played in the "After you, Claude" manner? Awful, isn't it?


Rugby League is a man's game. If you play it, you must be prepared to have an ear torn, lose a few teeth, receive the odd black eye, have a broken jaw (you won't eat solid food for a couple of months), dislocate your shoulder, crack a few ribs, fracture a finger — any of a hundred-and-one aches and pains that don't let you sleep nights.

No-one worries about such trivialities! What really worries a Rugby League player is the fear of receiving an injury that will put him out of the game for ever, an injury which would send him back to a normal life in which he can use a knife and fork without twitching, a life in which his wife would have no worries about her "gladiator" getting home in one piece. One or two players have been successful all-in wrestlers. I love that sport — but I love a tough Rugby League match that much better.

Internationally, the game is even tougher than our own domestic competition. You don't win the World Cup wearing kid gloves and doing a soft shoe shuffle. There are some mighty tough guys playing in Australia, New Zealand, France and here in Britain. The Australian Press didn't name Vince Karalius the "Wild Bull of the Pampas" for nothing. Vince always played hard and fair, and he passed this on to his Widnes team when he took up coaching.

Some critics of the game point to the large number of dismissals every season. But the early bath is as much part and parcel of Rugby League as a scrum or a drop goal. If you go on the field with the intention of throwing your weight about — and it's all part of the game — then someone, sometime, somewhere is not going to take it lying down. Would you?

Some "naughty boys" are for ever before the Disciplinary Committee. Personally, I have no time for rugby "thugs" who should be banned from playing. But for the rest: keep up the good work, play the game hard and fair. We love every minute of it!

THE SAXTON PAGE

STEVE NASH

ALTHOUGH Steve is, in my opinion, the best scrum-half in rugby league, it is a fact that his first five games in the Rovers first team were at stand-off and his chance came because of the 1967 cup run to Wembley. As is usual in these circumstances key players were left out of the games before the cup-ties, and Steve stood in for Mick Smith. Allan Watts was the scrum-half stand-in for Carl Dooler, as he was during the early part of 1967-68, but sometime during that season Steve Nash made the transition from No. 6 to No. 7, because on Boxing Day against York he made his first appearance in the first team at scrum-half.
