Since that game, we have played Oldham twice, both at Watersheddings. Last season, we were defeated 18-2 and earlier this season we lost again, collapsing in the second half to a 25-5 defeat.

Perhaps the most famous Oldham player is full-back and captain Martin Murphy. Sound in defence and adventurous in attack, Martin has not achieved the representative recognition he deserves. Elsewhere in the back division, Oldham have long-serving Welsh winger Mike Elliott and ex-Bradford stand-off David Treasure, who represented Wales in the last World Championship. Dick Evans, our Welsh international hooker, joined Swinton from Barrow in 1971 for a fee of £5,000 and has since been capped at county and international level. One of the most consistent hookers in Rugby League today, Dick is married and lives in Formby, where he is employed as a Works Study Engineer.

Q. How did you become interested in Rugby League?

A. As a boy, I watched St. Helens Town play soccer but, at the age of 9, my cousin took me to watch the Rugby League team. With St. Helens being such a Rugby League stronghold, it was a natural step for me to start playing the sport and I began to play at school when I was about 11 years of age.

Q. Have you modelled yourself on any particular player?
A. I cannot really say that I have modelled myself on any particular player but, at one stage in my career, I was greatly influenced by Vinty Karalius and Austin Rhodes.

Q. Who have been the greatest influences on your playing

career?

A. Probably Bill Payne and Jackie Broom were the greatest influences on my career when I was a youngster at Huyton. To a lesser degree, other coaches and players have helped me and I find that I am still learning with every game I play.

Q. Did you enjoy playing at Huyton?

A. I was very fortunate in that I was gaining first team experience at Huyton whilst many other players of my age were still playing "A" team rugby. I was also lucky to have Bill Payne as my prop, from whom I gained a lot of experience.

Q. Who do you consider to be the best hooker you have played

against?

A. Don Close (Huddersfield) and Bob Dagnall (St. Helens) are the best hookers I have played against.

Q. What were your impressions of Rugby League in Australia? A. The Australians are very fit. I only played three games out there but my impressions of their game was that it was very fast. Whereas we try to slow the pace down and work moves, they seem to pass the ball for the sake of it, sometimes at the cost of a try.

Q. Why are you always the last player on the pitch?

A. It has become a superstition of mine but it originated because Vinty Karalius did it and, as a youngster, I copied everything he did on the Rugby field. I find that I cannot break the habit although I once missed a team photograph,

Q. Many people wonder why you use the Cumberland hoist tackle.

A. This is a perfectly fair tactic providing I put the player on the ground with one hand on him. I have only been criticised for the use of this tackle since I came to Swinton but I only use it on big forwards.

Q. What do you consider to be a hooker's main function?

A. At one time, hookers were picked merely for ability in the scrums but I do not think this is the case nowadays. I think a hooker should be able to attain 50% of the possession from the scrums and also be a reasonable player in the loose. Obviously, if you keep the ball from the opposition, you prevent them from scoring.

Q. Are you in favour of two divisions?

A. I am in favour of the old system of one division as I feel the present fixture set-up will, in the course of time, kill off the lower clubs. I do not think it is fair for these clubs to be pushed into oblivion by the bigger, richer clubs.

Q. Have you any ambitions in Rugby after you have finished playing?

A. I would like very much to do some coaching and pass on some of my experience to others.

Q. What are your main interests apart from Rugby?

A. I like to go out for a meal with my wife and enjoy pottering about in the garden. I also like doing improvements to our house.


