### **CLUB NOTES**

CUP WIN IN CUMBRIA. Derwent Park has been the graveyard of visiting teams' cup hopes for a number of years, and after Salford had gone the way of many other teams before them, when they lost in the second round at Workington two weeks ago, a lot of people inside and outside Rugby League felt sure Leeds would become the next victims in round three. It was all the more encouraging to see from the outset, therefore, that this was a view which had certainly not been entertained by the Leeds players. The Leeds forwards took a firm grip on the game from the first whistle, and after the ball was won from scrum after scrum in the opening quarter, and Workington were being starved of possession, it became obvious that the reputation of the powerful Cumbrian pack held no terrors for the Leeds forwards. Driving in with relentless determination on attack, and tackling every reply in defence, David Ward and his colleagues up front took on their Workington counterparts at their own game and won handsomely. It was from this base that the foundations of a notable victory were established and the Leeds backs responded to the lead given with some equally sound defensive work, and some attacking football which would have led to more than Alan Smith's solitary fine try, had not Workington too defended well on the many occasions when they were required to do so.

This was a match in which the tackling of both sides proved to be the dominating feature, and the rugby was not always so open as in many other games this season, but at all times it was a match which held the attention of the biggest crowd for years in Cumbria, and may be counted among the best cup-tie victories by Leeds, at home or away, for many seasons. Congratulations go to all the Leeds players on a magnificent success, for everyone played his part in a cup win which will be talked about with pride for a long time by Leeds followers who enjoyed the game and the victory so much.

OUR VISITORS. A damaging crop of injuries during the past few weeks has caused difficulties for our visitors, Oldham, whom we welcome tonight, and these circumstances have brought about the introduction of a number of young players earlier than intended.

Inevitably, it has not been possible for Oldham to get the results they have been seeking, in order to stave off the threat of relegation, and they come to Leeds tonight after a run of seven successive defeats. From twenty-one League games they have won six matches and they have spent most of the season among the lower clubs, though a spell in the Autumn brought a few wins for the Lancashire side and a promise that they could break out to move up among the leaders. The list of injuries since has prevented fulfilment of the promise, however, and one of the players missed most has been goal-kicking three-quarter Phil Larder, who has enjoyed a long and outstanding career at Watersheddings. Phil fractured an arm before Christmas and has been absent ever since.

Oldham have a number of players in their side who have been with other clubs, on both sides of the border, and in this category are former Featherstone and Hull forward Barry Kear, ex-Bradford Northern half-back



David Treasure, and speedy and skilful stand-off half Glen Knight, who began his career with Castleford and then moved on to Huddersfield and later to Warrington before joining Oldham earlier this season. Our visitors have a dependable and stylish full-back in Martin Murphy, a courageous player who tackles fearlessly in defence and links up well with his three-quarters on attack. Another long serving player, wingman Mike Elliott, is leading try scorer with thirteen and he is followed by opposite wingman, Steve Lund, who has scored ten tries this season. Barry Kear is only one of a well-built pack of forwards with Oldham, and one young player who has been prominent in this department is Steve Herbert, who came on as a substitute in the match when Leeds won at Watersheddings by 18 points to 10 last September. Steve is the son of former Workington Town forward Norman Herbert, who won Cumbria County and Great Britain International honours during his career, which included the Australian Tour of 1962.

Oldham played some very good rugby on their last visit to Headingley, and were only beaten by 18 points to 15, in October, 1975. In the return game at Watersheddings one month later, the winning margin was even

narrower, for Leeds completed the double with a 12-11 victory.

LATEST SIGNING. We are pleased to welcome to Headingley goal-kicking three-quarter Willie Oulton, who joined Leeds from Wakefield Trinity, just two weeks ago, and had the unusual experience of playing for the Leeds first team within twenty-four hours of signing the transfer forms. He is a member of a Rugby League playing family from Castleford — a brother of Trinity's Henry and Castleford's Arthur Oulton — and Willie has already shown good goal-kicking ability, since coming to Leeds, in the matches against Widnes and at Barrow, where he was successful with five attempts. A former Association Footballer on York City's register, he is an all-round sportsman and we wish him a long and enjoyable career in the Leeds colours.

POSTPONED MATCHES. The Salford v. Leeds fixture, due to be played next Friday, 18th March, has been postponed because of calls on Salford players for the International match in France next weekend. The new date for this game will be announced as soon as it is agreed upon with Salford. One other match postponed this weekend is the Leeds "A" v. Hull "A" match, due to be played at Headingley next Saturday, 19th March. The new date for this game will also be given in the Press when it has been arranged.
