





A NEW SEASON STARTS

Welcome to the opening of another campaign, one which the club approaches with the ultimate aim of regaining First Division status at the first attempt. Our initial season in the top flight was certainly eventful if not fruitful in terms of success and if through the guidance of coach Arthur Bunting, the side can learn from past experiences, there is no reason why the goal should not be achieved.

For our first home league fixture we welcome from across the Pennines, Oldham, who so narrowly missed promotion last season, having been relegated the previous campaign.

NEW SIGNINGS

.The close season has again seen the directors make strenuous efforts to strengthen the club's playing staff and after unsuccessful approaches for several players their devotion to the task eventually reaped rich dividends with the capture of Featherstone Rovers second-row forward Richard "Charlie" Stone for a fee of around £15.000 Castleford's second row forward and goalkicker Sammy Lloyd for £12,000 and Welsh R.U.

player Paul Prendiville for an undisclosed fee. Charlie is a powerfully built forward and whilst with the colliers gained International and County honours and I am sure his tireless work both in defence and attack will prove invaluable to the side.

Sammy is also an International and County player and a member of the Great Britain party which toured Australia in 1977. His powerful running should be exploited to the full by Steve Norton with whom he has played since he was 16, and as one of the best goalkickers in the game should solve a problem which proved so costly to us last season. 

In sharp contrast we have to record that David Marshall has decided to retire from the game having been signed from Leeds two seasons ago as a temporary solution to our goalkicking problems. Although David will be the first to admit that he has not always performed to his true ability, his goalkicking has proved the decisive factor on certain occasions particularly exemplified by his performance in the league victory at Craven Park last season. At the same time we have parted company with Peter "Flash" Flanagan and Nick Trotter. Having established himself as one of the best hookers in the game with Rovers, Peter was drafted out of amateur football three seasons ago as emergency cover for the hooking role and since has given magnificent service to the Airlie Birds. His vast experience played a major part in helping us to reach the Player's No. 6 final in 1976 and certainly his dedication and enthusiasm for the game are an example for any youngster to follow Nick Trotter is another player whose loyalty to the club has been invaluable. A good ball playing forward Nick never really established a regular first team place having had to compete for the loose-forward position with Joe Brown, Len Casey and Mick Crane. However, having now become associated with the newly formed Colts side, I am sure his knowledge of the game will be of great help to the development of these youngsters. May we wish all three the very best for the future.

must be made to centre Glyn Turner and loose-forward Steve Norton on their selection for Wales and England respectively for the International played at St. Helens at the end of last season and special mention for Steve on his fine individual performance in England's overwhelming 60-14 victory which duly earned him the man of the match award.

MATCH REVIEWS

Following the victory over neighbour Hull K.R. in the annual Eva Hardaker charity match, the side have made a most encouraging start to the season proper, progressing to the Esso Yorkshire Cup semi-final for the second successive season at the expense of Bramley and Featherstone Rovers where we will now meet Bradford Northern at Odsal on September 13th (Kick off 6 p.m.) This was followed by another hard earned victory at Bramley in the opening league fixture of the season. In the Yorkshire Cuptie at Bramley we at last laid the McLaren Field hoodoo which has dogged us over the past six years with an efficient display. After an auspicious start the side took a firm hold on the tie shortly before the interval with tries by Graham Bray and Sammy Lloyd and though they failed to press home this advantage afterwards the most encouraging feature was the marked improvement in our defence covering. Much of this can be attributed to new signing Charlie Stone who worked solidly throughout and with other newcomer Sammy Lloyd running powerfully off Vince Farrar and Steve Norton

the pack looked a formidable unit. Full-back George Robinson also had a faultless game.

The following week we visited Featherstone Rover where cupties do not come tougher. However, after a robust opening the forwards laid the foundations for victory with a magnificent display of stern tackling and powerful running. Our two former colliers Vince Farrar and Charlie Stone continually probed the Rovers defence and with great support from Keith Tindall and Tony Duke, Steve Norton was able to capitalise on the openings and spark off many bursts by the impressive Lloyd who involved himself in every aspect of the game supplemented by some superb goalkicking. Behind the pack Keith Hepworth was outstanding continually piercing the Rovers defence with unpredictable breaks which totally baffled the cover. Although the game was still in the balance up to three-quarter time we enhanced our dominance in the closing stages with tries by Wilson, Hepworth and Macklin.

Our return to McLaren Field brought us two well earned points in a dour and rugged affair. With overwhelming possession several chances were sacrificed through poor handling though inspired in particular by Keith Hepworth and Steve Norton we dictated play throughout whilst the forwards again dominated the exchanges, Brian Hancock and George Robinson also impressed with their attacking runs.

DOWN MEMORY LANE WITH OLDHAM

In recent years many exciting tussels between Hull and Oldham have been fought but two in particular immediately spring to mind. The 1950's again saw the Lancashire side dominant in Rugby League circles and in 1956-57 they headed the league table with a remarkable record of 33 wins and only 5 defeats and achieved a club scoring record of 893 points in league matches in doing so. The Airlie Birds were no mean competitors themselves having finished runners up six points adrift and hammered Barrow 45-14 in the Championship semi-final. The stage was set for an intriguing confrontation of Oldham's sparkling backs and Hull's tremendous pack led by Johnny Whiteley and including Tommy Harris, probably the finest hooker in the history of the game.

The game, as expected, was an incident packed thriller spectated by 62,233 fervent fans. The issue was still very much in the balance at the interval; Hull going in with a narrow 6-5 advantage and the optimism of the Hull supporters continued to hold firm as their side increased this to 11-7 midway through the second half. It was then that fortunes suddenly changed and Oldham found their true sparkle to

register tries through Denis Ayres and John Etty and a conversion from Bernard Ganley gave them a commanding 15-11 lead with only minutes remaining. However, the game took another remarkable transformation when Stan Cowan plunged over for a try only a couple of feet to the right of the goal posts and Colin Hutton was left with the seemingly simple task of converting to give Hull a one point victory. Incredibly, Hutton who had broken the club's goal kicking record that season, fluffed the chance and Oldham were champions for the first time in 46 years.

The following season the Airlie Birds visited Watersheddings for what proved to be a memorable championship semi-final play off. Having finished in fourth place the Airlie Birds returned to the ground where two weeks prior their top four hopes had been badly shaken by a 43-9 thrashing. Oldham were once again reigning champions having finished with 67 points to Hull's 56 and with perhaps the best team never to go to Wembley. Hull therefore had more than enough reason for producing a top class performance, but bearing in mind that April slamming and the fact that they had not had a game since in which to experiment, their hopes of a surprise looked very slender.

Those were the proud Airlie Birds who that day made the majority of the 23,000 spectators sit up and take notice for from the start they called the tune. The Lancastrians were taken completely by surprise as firstly Finn put Watts over after only four minutes; Bateson hit a penalty goal and then Sykes put Cooper through. The rout continued as Bateson landed another penalty goal and by half time Drake and Sykes had added further tries, Bateson a goal and Oldham trooped off 18-3 down, their reputation severely damaged and virtually out of the


Let's hope this afternoon's match leaves supporters with some more pleasant memories from the clash of these inter-county rivals.
