FOR our traditional Good Friday fixture it is once again a real pleasure to welcome to Station Road the supporters, players and officials of Oldham.

These days the Watersheddings outfit are coached by Graham Starkey who took over from Dave Cox almost immediately after Oldham had beaten Swinton on Boxing Day.

This season Oldham have emerged as one of the big spending clubs of the Rugby League, particularly of late. They have completely rebuilt their pack with the signing of four very experienced and capable players costing a total in excess of £20,000. The first of these four was Bob Blackwood, the back row forward who was signed from Workington Town for a fee in the region of £4,000. Blackwood, a Cumbrian by birth, has also seen service with Widnes, St. Helens and Wigan. Their next sortie into the transfer market was to obtain the signature of Jim Fiddler, who played in Leigh's Cup winning side of 1971, before moving on to Salford and Bramley who received a substantial vee from Oldham.

There then followed some feverish activity on the day of the transfer deadline. At the end of it Oldham emerged with two more experienced packmen. Clive Jones, originally with Warrington, was signed from Leigh where he was transfer listed at £4,000, and of course, Oldham signed Denis Ashcroft from ourselves. Denis had asked for a move four days before the transfer deadline and it was with great reluctance that the Swinton Board placed him on the transfer list. However, it has to be said that to receive a five figure fee for a player who cost £2,000 six months previously is very good business, although we know that Oldham have bought a player of great quality who will prove to be value for money.

With all this activity in the pack Oldham haven't completely forgotten the backs. They paid ourselves £1,000 for Jimmy Arnold. Then we were just pipped in an effort to sign Tony Newall, a centre, who was a Great Britain Colts colleague of Ken Roberts. He signed for Bradrord Northern before going to play in France. On his return we tried to secure his signature but were just beaten to it by Oldham, his home town club. We also understand that "The Roughyeds" are about to sign highly promising junior who again has been interesting ourselves.

Of their established players three in particular are known throughout the Rugby League. Martyn Murphy, a full back of the highest class, who has been to Oldham what Ken Gowers was to Swinton, which is praise indeed. Free-scoring winger Mike Elliott seems to improve with time and no doubt will be causing us problems yet again. Centre Phil Larder has just commenced his benefit year and no doubt he in particular will be hoping for a big improvement in Oldham's fortunes.

In conclusion, we hope for an entertaining game and that Oldham arrive home tonight with "Roughyeds" caused by a defeat and not by celebrating a victory.



THE 75th Anniversary of the most prestigious local-league competition came to a climax this morning when Mayfield of Rochdale took on Oldham St. Anne's in the Final of the Oldham Standard Challenge Cup at Watersheddings.

THIS magnificent silver trophy, which stands over 3ft high—and which the winners can fill with 14 pints of beer—was presented to the Oldham Amateur Rugby League at the beginning of the 1903-04 season by the "Oldham Standard News", which was the forerunner to the present "Oldham Evening Chronicle". Although the trophy was originally purchased for a mere 30 guineas, it is now valued at well over £1,000, and is without doubt the finest in the Amateur Rugby League world.

THIS season celebrates threequarters of a century of Standard Cup competitions, and the Oldham League are hopeful of boosting the records of both the Cup Final attendance and receipts. The largest crowd ever to attend a Standard Cup Final was in 1949 when over 6,000 spectators were present, while the biggest "gate" was in 1977 with £731.25p being taken at the turnstiles. This season, hopes are high of topping the £1,000 mark.

MAYFIELD and St. Anne's, this season's finalists, are two of the most renowned cup-fighting sides in the amateur game, with both teams also currently challenging strongly for the Pennine League 1st Division Championship. Mayfield's passage through to the Final began with a bye and then victories over Saddleworth Rangers (15—9) and Ferranti (12—2). St. Anne's, who have won the trophy for the past two seasons and who are hoping to become only the third ever side to win the cup on three consecutive occasions in its 75-year history, had to play three games on their Cup Final passage. Round 1 saw a victory over North-West Counties League side Langworthy Juniors (16—7), before they received two fairly comfortable matches against teams from lower divisions Salem Hornets were beaten 27—0 in Round 2, and then Shaw, a new team in the Pennine League's 5th Division, went down 25—2 in the semi-finals.

ONE of the main attractions of the Standard Cup Final is the excellent preparation which is organised by the Oldham League officials, and especially their hard-working secretary John Burke. Several weeks before the Final, which every year takes place at Watersheddings on Good Friday morning, the League sell "Timed-Try" competition tickets, with £60 being awarded in prizes and with teams in the Oldham League benefiting to almost £50 each,

IN the past ten years Swinton have had eight coaches, only one of them had never played for Swinton. He was Dave Mortimer and he was appointed prior to the commencement of the 1971/72 season.

Although only coach for a season and a quarter, Mortimer was extremely successful. He took over a side which had finished 23rd in the league, and who had lost players of the calibre of Dave Robinson, Derek Clarke and Bob Fleet. In addition he lost the services for the entire season of Bill Holliday, Kevin Whittle and Mick Philbin through injury and other reasons. To cap it all he also lost the services halfway through the season of Billy "Daz" Davies who, along with Terry Cramant, was transferred to Wigan.

Despite all of this Swinton finished a very creditable sixth in the league table. They were beaten 12—2 by Wigan in the semi-final of the Lancashire Cup and lost by the narrowest possible margin(8—9) to Halifax in the third round of the Rugby League Cup at Thrum Hall. A match that stands out in the memory of all true Swinton supporters. Also they scored over 250 points more than the previous season, and scored more points in a season than any Swinton side since the late 50's including the double Championship winning team.

One of Mortimer's best decisions as coach was to switch Ken Gowers back to scrum half, his original position. Not only did Gowers have an excellent season with his skilful play, he also had his second best-ever season as a goalkicker, kicking 119 goals. The third occasion he had reached his century.

In 1971/72 Swinton signed Stan Gittins from Batley giving Cliff Williams in exchange plus a cash adjustment. Gittins, a player of immense promise, had his career tragically cut short by serious injury. Although this season after seven seasons out of top class rugby he has rejoined the Lions and played for the first team at New Hunslet a few weeks ago.

Another player of great promise whose career at senior level barely got started was Billy "Rufus" Hill who played only a handful of first team games before injury put him on the sidelines for a lengthy period. However, we are pleased to say that "Rufus" is alive and well and these days is still turning it on for crack amateur outfit Pilkington's Recs. who of course are coached by former Swinton favourite Kevin Whittle. One of the most astute signings Swinton had made for a long time was made in 1971 when Gordon Lewis was signed for a nominal fee from Leigh. Although his stay at Station Road was to last a mere 20 matches he played a large part in the early development of Bob Fleay.

Whatever happened to ...

Bill Holliday

BILL began his career with renowned Cumbrian amateurs Wath Brow Hornets before joining his home town club Whitehaven. He later transferred to Hull K.R. and in 1965 he became Swinton's most costly signing

when the Lions paid Rovers £6,000 to bring one of the great post-war forwards to Station Road. Today Bill still lives in Pendlebury and is employed as an electrician at Salford Docks. He is coach of local amateurs Folly Borough and guided them to the final of the Manchester Championship which they won for the third successive year. On the odd occasion that Folly have faced an injury crisis Bill has turned out and still produced those amazing 50 yard touch finders. In one such game Bill dropped a goal from a similar distance and rumour would have it that the ball has not been seen since!



Brian Gomm ... Insight

BRIAN joined Swinton as recently as the start of the 1977/78 season, but his rugby career began in the hot bed of schools rugby union where he represented Manchester, Lancashire, North of England and also made the final England trial. Despite playing schools rugby twice a week he was simultaneously having successful trials with Rochdale Hornets at weekends!



Hornets invited Brian to sign on, but as their games were played on Saturdays at that time it would have clashed with his job as a journalist. A couple of years ago Brian travelled to Featherstone to cover their match with Leigh for the local paper. After playing for both Leigh "B" and Leigh Colts Brian signed for Huyton where he teamed up with Terry Gorman. He later turned down the opportunity of joining Blackpool and followed Terry to Station Road.
