



Talking point

So far so good. There is still some distance to go to make sure that promotion is achieved. In welcoming Oldham today, we must make sure that 2 points are obtained. When we went to Oldham earlier this year, we were leading right until the end when we allowed Oldham to come through on our left-hand flank and score an equalising try. Looking at the Second Division table it is quite interesting to note that three matches were stolen from us (if you understand the expression) in the last few minutes. At York, in the first league match of the season we were in the lead with two or three minutes to go, and unfortunately were without a regular goalkicker and Tony Dean took over the role and missed one near the post and alas we went away empty handed. At Halifax, we were cruising along to a win, for the home team did not look like breaching our defence, when just under our posts in a tackle the referee ruled that one of our players had stolen the ball from a Halifax forward and gave Halifax a penalty which was only a formality and gained them two points. We have referred to the visit to Oldham where we should have won quite comfortably. but only came away with a point. The only time throughout the season when we have been comprehensibly beaten beaten was the day the strong Hull team came to this ground and indicated their power with a convincing victory over us. We still have to go to Hull and as both teams are clear at the top of the table there will be no quarter given. Hull are undefeated and are

going all out for a Rugby League record, in going through a season without losing a League match. The men from the Greyhound Stadium are anxious to prove that they have matured and developed since the Hull victory at this ground and are determined that even though we cannot be outright winners of the Second Division championship, Hull will not get the 100% record for which they are aiming. Everything points to a really good match at Hull. We are tremendously envious when we see the crowds that are going along to Hull and indeed at York the other day when Hull were the visitors. If we could average 3,000 - 4,000 spectators per week, we would be delighted. The players would be delighted because there is atmosphere when there are people. The directors would be happy because it would put the club on a better financial keel and allow us to compete with other clubs for purchasing players when they became available. To be brutally frank the directors are embarrassed and ashamed to record the small crowds that have been coming to the Stadium to see the team that regularly wins and has been playing a great deal of attractive football.

Why are we not getting the crowds? Admittedly there has been some poor weather but that is not the real reason because we have as much covered accommodation as is necessary for 2.000 -3.000 spectators. There must be other factors and we are conscious of the possibility that we may not be playing Rugby League Football at a time of the year which meets the wishes of the public. We notice with interest that managers of Football League Clubs have unanimously agreed to recommend the playing of summer soccer. We also know that in North America, where temperatures are extremely high in the summer and low in the winter, the

establishment of soccer was founded on the summer season. We also know that countries that have a hot climate all the year round, as do certain parts of Australia and South Africa, play in their winter, which has temperatures greater than our summer, with a great deal of success. We have spoken to players and to many spectators who say that they would not wish to move from the winter months arguing that Rugby has always been played in the winter and that the summer would be inconvenient because of holidays and also that the ground would be hard. We have to say that it is not the spectator who attends the matches that has to be canvassed, but those who stay away. Those who are faithful and come to see the team play, irrespective of the weather, will, we venture to suggest, come in the summer months. But those who are missing from the grounds may well be attracted by coming out, on a summers evening with the family to watch a game of Rugby League Football. Could you tell us what competition would be in existence at the moment? Speedway is a summer sport, but there is no Speedway in this area. Cricket is certainly the traditional summer sport but appearances of top class cricket in this area are extremely limited. In any event there are very many people who go to Rugby who would not dream of going to cricket and vice versa. We take the view therefore, that the debate about summer Rugby must be continued and further dialogue with the players. There are sophisticated ways of keeping grounds in soft condition throughout the year and we feel sure that the mind, thinking of hard concrete grounds in the summer could be alleviated with the assistance of the groundsman. One thought comes to mind and that is if we played a match

in the summer evening with a kick-off

at 8 p.m. we could prior to that match

have two or three junior matches

played, so creating greater interest

and making the evening one for the entire family. We will be interested to have your views. The grass grows in the summer, the weather even though it rains in England is invariably warmer and furthermore we feel that the public's demand for outdoor entertainment in the summer has not yet been satisfied with any sport having mass appeal. Rugby League could be the first sport to take this step by moving into the warmer climate and away from the heavy dark and distressing months of December and January. Supporters who attend matches and those who do not are entitled to air their views and we would welcome them. Players who have been to Australia know the rigours of playing on hard ground and would tell you how difficult it can be. They will also tell you that there is protective clothing that can be worn that avoids the grass burn. Let us explore fully the possibilities of summer Rugby before dismissing it merely because it has not been tried here.

This afternoon we have pleasure in greeting the players, officials and supporters from the Oldham club. Oldham, currently 8th in the Division Two table, are still in with a slim chance of gaining promotion. Earlier this season, we made the trip across the Pennines to Watersheddings, eventually coming away with one point from a hard fought 15-15 draw, settled in the last couple of minutes by an Oldham try. Our scorers were, tries: Peter Muscroft, Stuart Smith and Ken Endersby and three goals by John Hay.

The Oldham club is now nearly 103 years old, it's centenary year was in 1976. The first ever game played by the club was on October 21st 1876 versus Stalybridge F.C., who were the victors by two goals, two tries and three touch-downs to one try and three touch-downs. The club played at two grounds, Goldwick Lows and Clarksfield before moving to their present home, Watersheddings in 1889. 


