LITTLE Huyton, who finished next to bottom of the Second Division last season with three wins and three draws out of their 26 matches, come to Watersheddings today with one of the smallest professional playing staffs in the Rugby League.

"I have only 12 available professional players", says player-coach Geoff Fletcher, the former Oldham player, "but we will do our best to battle on bravely".

Fletcher has just completed a two-year contract at Alt Park and has been offered another contract for another 12 months.

At the time of writing these notes he had not signed it - but he was still carrying on in his player-coach capacity.

Fletcher is obviously worried at the shortage of players at Alt Park, but that does not stop him singing the praises of his men for the brave fight they put up in the first round Lancashire Cup defeat at Barrow.

Though Barrow won 44-11, the score in no way reflected the game, he said. "We arrived late, had to take the field in a hurry, and Barrow ran up 25 points in the first 25 minutes.

"After that, we fought hard and did well considering all the circumstances".

Towards the end of last season, the Oldham club allowed prop. Peter Frodsham to go to Alt Park on loan, but the move did not work out and Frodsham played only twice before leaving.

His departure was another blow to Fletcher, whose squad was reduced considerably by the sale of Keith Wills to Barrow, Arthur Daley to Leigh and Jimmy O'Neill to Whitehaven.

Injuries to Doug Reynolds, Mike Shee and Mike Smith have crippled the Huyton camp and the men from Merseyside look like enduring another long battle for survival.

They face another gigantic task to keep the flag flying on Merseyside - and all at Oldham wish them well in their efforts to succeed.





Hence, many of those boys from the Oldham area left town: Nicky Kiss, Martin Foy, Martin Burns Mick Coates and Dale Wharton to name but a few.

It was a real tragedy and a course of events which Oldham had to change if they were to ever obtain the benefits of a sound youth policy and a steady flow of the right type of boy to Watersheddings.



Almost overnight, it seemed, Oldham could challenge any club in the game in the quest for the top boys - and they did not waste time in proving it!

First came Ray Ashton, a stand-off half from Widnes who had captained the county youth side and been substitue for Great Britain.

Next followed Mike Cowley of St. Helens - a Lancashire and Great Britain centre.

Third came hooker Les Cook from Widnes - another member of the county side.

Oldham were on their way. But that was only the start.

Gartland and his right-hand man, Derek Foy, spotted the talents of a hard forward from the Redhill, Castleford amateur club and it led to the signing of Andrew Goodway.

Nearer "home", too, was not neglected and within 48 hours of his finishing his A-level examinations, Saddleworth scrum-half Paddy Kirwan signed the forms that made him an Oldham professional.

A young giant from Leigh Miners and yet another member of the county side - Mick Coombes - was snapped up thanks to the foresight and timing of the club's new assistant manager Terry Gorman.

And on a hot night just before Wakes in June the biggest "fish" of all was in the net - Terry Flanagan, one of the most sought after youngsters in Rugby League, and captain of the Great Britain under-18 side.

No longer could anyone accuse Oldham of being left behind. Indeed, they were now leading the pack!

For every top club in Lancashire had been in the hunt for Flanagan, including Warrington, Salford, St. Helens, Wigan and Widnes.

The influence of Gartland was a major factor in the decision of several of the boys named to throw in their lot with Oldham.

All along the line, it seems, Oldham are now gearing up for something big.



RUGBY LEAGUE NEWS By Brian Batty

(Daily Mail)

At last it looks as if tours Down Under are to start the right way round - in New Zealand.

For years I have been advocating that it would be far better for Britain to use New Zealand as a stepping stone on the way to Australia for a number of sound reasons.

But the Aussies have always resisted this sort of move on the grounds that they felt that it could harm a tour of their country where the fans might feel they are getting second best.

There is so much more in favour of a move that I am convinced will benefit all three countries in the long run.



Britain would be able to seek the blend and understanding needed in a big tour squad and sort out a Test side in New Zealand ready for the crunch series with the Aussies.

I believe there is every case for streamlining trips to New Zealand for a month has proved to long in the past on top of the two months spent in Australia.

I know some people will feel there is the danger of losing players with injuries before they get to Australia but with 30 players and the chance of reinforcements these problems can be overcome.

Then again there are usually English-like conditions in New Zealand that will suit our boys more and give them the chance to settle in easier than in Australia.

In fact on the four trips I have made to New Zealand the grounds have been far heavier than those over here with Park scarcely fit for Test rugby at times.

The Officials in that country have maintained that going there in July is a mistake because of the tremendous amount of rain they get compared to the better months of May and June.

It seems sense to limit this part of a tour to about a fortnight with around four matches, excluding the country games.

Two tests - one in Auckland and another in Christchurch should be enough but if the Kiwis insist on a third then perhaps extra games against the Maoris and the Auckland club side would be anough to complete the programme.

Given the right results then Britain could move on the Australia wheere I would trim out many of the country games now and concentrate on a six-week programme.

With a nine-month season here I reckon two months' extra rugby is enough for the fittest of our players who are facing too many matches already.

AMATEUR R. L. NEWS By Alan Burke

The chase for this season's Pennine League Championship honours began yesterday with almost 70 open-age amateur teams from Oldham, Rochdale, Huddersfield, Halifax and Bradford, hoping to win one of the seven divisional awards. This weekend has also seen the opening matches being played in the 1979-80 BARLA Lancashire-Cumbria Cup competition, although this season's tournament has yet to produce any local interest, with Oldham's four entrants, Ferranti, Saddleworth Rangers, Saint Anne's and Waterhead, all having received byes in Round 1.

The County Cup, which like the respective professional competition is sponsored by Forshaw's Burtonwood Brewery, is effectively the qualifying rounds for this season's Rugby League Challenge Cup, as the eventual winners of the amateur tournament will join the thirty senior clubs on their trek to Wembley, as will the victors in the amateur Yorkshire Cup. The second round draw for this season's Lancashire-Cumbria Cup is due to take place this afternoon, and it is hoped to be announced on this evening's "Rugby League Special" programme on BBC Radio Manchester (6.15p.m.).

The local radio station's weekly Amateur Rugby League news programme begins its new season this coming week although with a change of title, time and day. The 15-minute broadcast, re-titled "BARLA Reports", and which will include news of the Pennine League and the North-West Counties League as well as interviews with local personalities, can now be heard every Friday at 6.30p.m.

The British Amateur Rugby League Association have recently decided to bring forward the 1st Round of their Inter-League Youth Cup, which for the first time will be played at Under-19 level, and also to play each round at fortnightly intervals instead of the usual monthly periods. The opening matches will now take place on the weekend of September 29-30, and it is hoped that the competition will be completed prior to the Youth County Championship matches in November. The County Under-19 games are also being played earlier than usual so that the International selectors can view the country's top players in action against each other before they choose the Great Britain side to meet the touring Australian Youth team in January.

The Australians' last tour to this country in 1972 provided them with a clean sweep of all opposition, including the English Schools side who they defeated on three occasions. Since then, however, the formation of BARLA and the upsurge of interest in schools rugby has greatly improved the ability of Britain's young players, and it is certain that the tourists will find their games more of a contest.

A brand new Amateur Rugby League tournament begins next weekend when 32 of the Country's top sides compete for the John Player Sevens Trophy. Each game will kick-off 30 minutes prior to a professional Player's No.6 Trophy match, with Ealing (London) facing National Dock Labour Board (Hull) before the Oldham-Leeds encounter. The Oldham League's representatives, Waterhead, take on Moldgreen (Huddersfield) at The Willows, Salford this Friday (7p.m.)
