We Welcome our Visitors — LEEDS by DON YATES

Cup football returns to Watersheddings this afternoon in the shape of the John Player Trophy with attractive visitors from Leeds providing the opposition. The Headingley club has a glittering history of cup-tie success and they visit Oldham today as current holders of the Premiership Trophy whilst next Wednesday they visit Wakefield Trinity in the semi-final of the Yorkshire Cup confident of maintaining their proud record of having appeared in at least one major cup final during each of the past 12 seasons.

In view of that amazing record, it is surprising to recall that during the past two seasons Leeds have been eliminated from the John Player Trophy at the very first hurdle. Their overall record in this competition, nevertheless, is something about which they can be justifiably proud for since the trophy was inaugurated in 1971 Leeds have won it once, in 1973-74, were semi-finalists the previous year and have been beaten quarter-finalists on three other occasions. Oldham, alas, have never got past the second round.

Although this afternoon's match is the first between Oldham and Leeds in this particular competition, these clubs have, of course, met several times in the past. Leeds will be happy to recall their last meeting with Oldham in March 1977 for it resulted in a 56-10 victory for them as Oldham slithered down the table and out of Division One. The Headingley outfit, in fact, have not lost to Oldham for almost 13 years with one having to go back to the autumn of 1966 and a 16-13 league triumph for Oldham's last victory over Leeds although they almost snatched a win in March 1974 when the two sides fought out an 8-8 draw in a First Division match here at Watersheddings.

Whether Leeds maintain that recent good record remains to be seen but certainly Oldham will find it tough going against this experienced Leeds squad which is superbly led by hooker Dave Ward, a tireless worker who was one of Britain's successes during the recent tour of Australasia. That tour was Ward's second trip 'down under' for he also participated in the 1977 World Championships which were also staged in the Southern Hemisphere. Ward has now made ten full international appearances with Great Britain and he has also represented England once, the British under-24 side twice and Yorkshire twice. Leeds signed him from Shaw Cross Boys' Club in May 1971 and he quickly established himself in senior football to become a firm favourite with the Headingley crowd.

The other Leeds representative in Australasia during the summer was utility back John Holmes. He joined Leeds in 1968 and has been a prolific point scorer for them throughout a colourful career which has seen him play four times for Yorkshire, seven times for England and in 20 full internationals for Great Britain. He was the scorer of 26 points from two tries and 10 goals when Britain beat New Zealand 53-19 in the 1972 World Championship and similar scoring feats have littered the career of Holmes.

He is sure, therefore, to be a key figure in this powerful Leeds outfit whose appearance here at Watersheddings has been eagerly awaited ever since the draw was made.





There have been many famous "pairs" in Rugby League . . . Gee and Egan, Challinor and Bevan, Davies and O'Grady, Ashton and Boston, Stirrup and Daley, to name but a few.

The better half-backs tend to hunt in pairs and the same can be said for centres and wings and second-row forwards.

At Oldham, who will forget those brilliant half-backs, Frank Stirrup and Dan Daley? Or Davies, the prince of centres, and his wing partner, O'Grady? Or that beautifully blended second-row of master ball player Charlie Winslade and devastating runner, Sid Little?

More recently, another well known Oldham twosome has broken up - Larder and Elliott.



For 11 of those seasons the Welshman played outside Phil Larder and though Phil, also 34, is now in his benefit season things will never quite be the same again for the centre who sent Elliott in for so many of his tries.

Says Phil: "Mike was always under rated by the Oldham Public. In a better side I'm sure he would have gained top honours. He has scored some really great tries".

Elliott made his debut on October 27th, 1962 outside Ray Fisher - the first of more than 30 players to play as Mike's centre before his partnership with Larder was struck up.

He was the club's leading try scorer four times and joint top scorer twice. Larder, too, has made a significant contribution to Oldham's cause in the past decade.

Before this season started he had scored 105 tries and kicked 485 goals in 315 appearances - and he is still going strong!

It says much for his love of the game and his attitude to injury that, at 32 years of age, he bounced back after smashing his arm and having it plated to be the club's top scorer with 18 tries in 1977-8 and again with 16 tries last season.

And he has not started off too badly this time, either, with four tries in six games played so far.

Because they never enjoyed the benefits of playing in a great side, Elliott and Larder will not be remembered with the awe that surrounds the likes of Stirrup and Daley or Davies and O'Grady.

But, in their own way, they have served the club superbly over a long number of years and they will surely be remembered with affection.

NEW LAWS TO COMMENCE FOR SEASON 1979-80

ATTACKER TACKLED IN THE IN GOAL AREA".

If a player in possession of the ball is tackled in his opponents in-goal before he grounds the ball, the game is re-started with a scrum, five metres in the field of play, opposite where the tackle was effected but no nearer than ten metres to the touch line.

NOTES: Play used to commence with a tap kick by the defending team on the 25m line.

DEAD BALL FROM PENALTY KICK

If the ball is kicked out of play over the dead-ball line or the touch-in-goal line from a penalty kick, (not necessarily a kick at goal), and is not touched by any player other than the kicker, the game is re-started with a drop-out by a defending player from the centre of the 22m line in his half of the field of play.

NOTE: Play used to commence with a tap kick by the defending team on the 25m line.



David Way, Special Events Manager of John Player, says, Thirteen years is a long time to support any sport and it is essential to maintain interest through the introduction of new ideas.

We had problems with last season's extremely bad weather. To overcome this we have introduced a new schedule of dates which has telescoped the tournaments into three months at the beginning of the season.

This means a September start and a final at the beginning of December. In this way we hope to avoid delays in the final stages and we can also hope for better games on drier pitches.

I feel that another sound move is the descision to have semi-finals on neutral grounds for the first time. It should be received with widespread approval.

AMATEUR R. L. NEWS By Alan Burke

This afternoon sees the launching of a brand new Amateur Rugby League competition for which the British Amateur Rugby League Association have secured a £3,000 sponsorship deal with John Player and Sons - a name which is synonymous with all that is best in British sport. After giving their backing to many top class sporting events thoughout the country, including cricket, motor racing, show jumping, rugby union, and rugby league, the John Player company have now decided to support a new amateur rugby league 7-a-side tournament, which will include 32 of the country's finest teams, and which will be organised in conjunction with the professional Player's No.6 Trophy competition.

Thirty minutes prior to each professional game an amateur sevens contest will take place of fifteen minutes duration, with the competition being played on knock-out lines, and with the Final being staged immediately before the Player's No.6 Trophy decider. Each team entering the tournament will receive a financial award to help cover their expenses, while the eventual winners of the new competition will be handed £500 plus the handsome John Player Amateur Sevens Trophy, with £300 going to the runners-up and with each losing semi-finalist gaining £100.



Every local amateur league in the country is to be represented in the competition, which it is hoped will become an annual event, with Oldham's qualifiers, Waterhead, having been drawn to play Moldgreen of Huddersfield at The Willows prior to the Salford-Huddersfield clash. Waterhead were nominated as the Oldham respresentatives by virtue of them being the current holders of the local league's 'Albert Edwards Memorial 7-a-side Trophy', and with the fact that they play in the Pennine League's Premier Division while Moldgreen compete in Division 2, it is hoped that the Oldham team will be going into the Second Round draw.

The curtain-raiser to today's Oldham-Leeds match at Watersheddings provides possibly the most interesting match in the opening round of the new competition, with National Dock Labour Board of Hull, winners of the BARLA National 7-a-side title in 1975 and 1976, taking on the Southern Amateur Rugby League's qualifiers, Ealing of London. The match will kick-off at 2.30p.m., and should the teams be level after 15 minutes play, they will change ends with the first team then to score being declared the winners.

With the ever increasing number of amateur matches now taking place it is obvious that more referees are also required to control them. However, although several new teams are being formed each season, there is a desperate shortage of match officials, especially in the Pennine area. Therefore, the Oldham Rugby League Referees' Society invite anyone interested in having a go at refereeing to come to their monthly meeting, which takes place tomorrow evening at the Royal Hotel, Lees Road, Oldham (8p.m.).
