IN THE HORNETS NEST

Rochdale Hornets, our friends and neighbours from over Summit Hill, are passing through a period a great change in which many experienced players have left the club over the past 12 months.

Hornets were one of the four clubs relegated from the First Division at the end of last season and they have certainly had far more than their fair share of problems in the past few months.

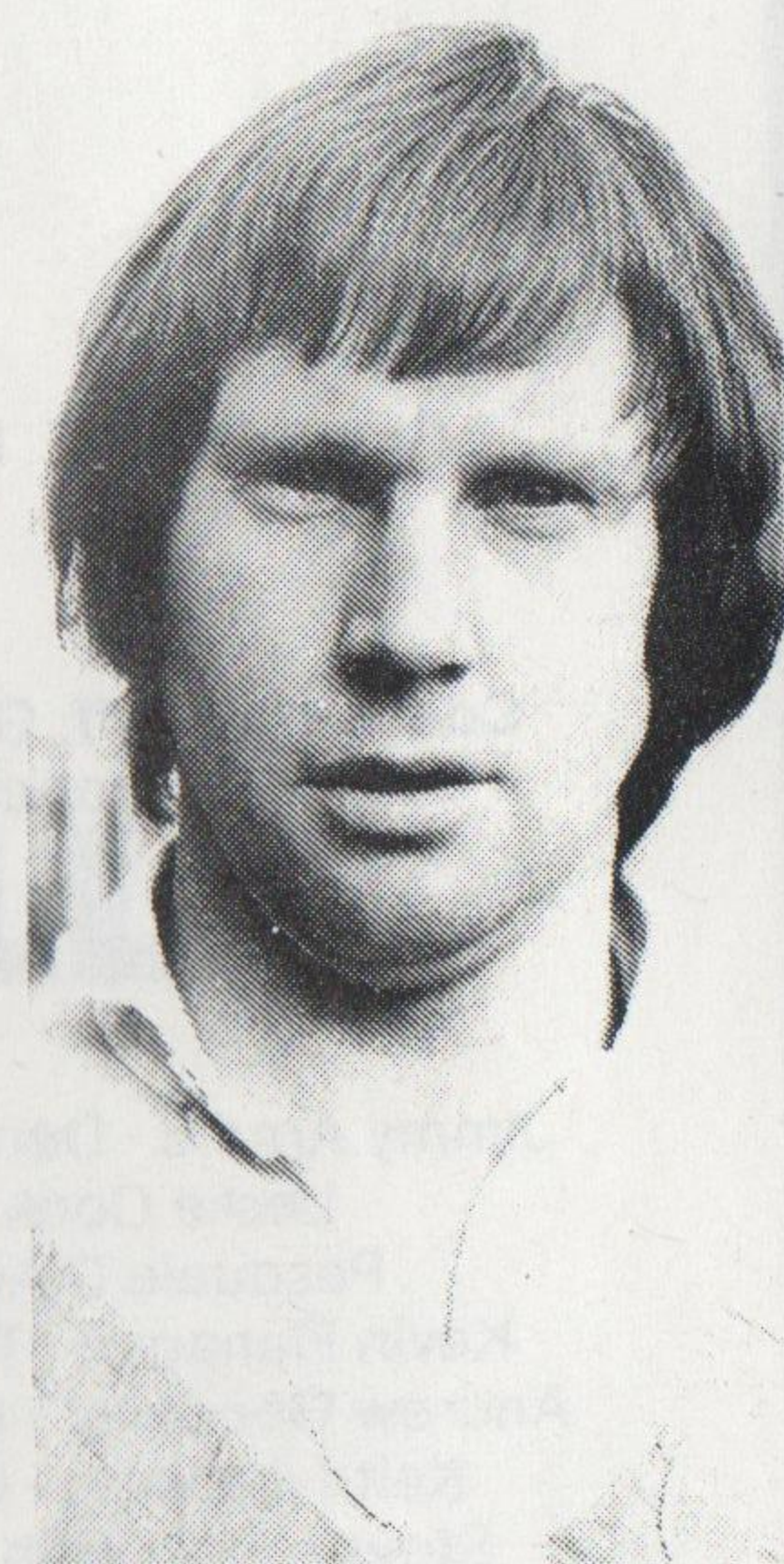
The resignation of coach Kel Coslett was a tremendous blow at the time but by all accounts his successor Paul Longstaff is doing a fine job despite massive problems.

Following the early season departure from the Athletic Grounds of players like Warren Ayres, Tony Cook, Alan Rathbone, Tony Wainwright, Charlie Birdsall and Paul Woods, plus the retirement of Jeff Heaton and Mick McLoughlin, the board had to rapidly start afresh, as it were.

They had pulled in around £40,000 from the sale of these players and embarked boldly on a youth policy plus the introduction of one or two experienced men to steady the ship-men like Alan Ashton, the scrum-half they bought from Whitehaven for £5,000 prop Andy Wilson from Huddersfield for £12,000 and stand-off Mick Nolan from St. Helens for about £2,000.

More locally they snapped up stand-off or centre Glenn Banks from Mayfield, who has already made quite an impression at the Athletic Grounds.

Hornets now are a blend of youth and experience, with a very definite leaning towards youth, as they build for the future.

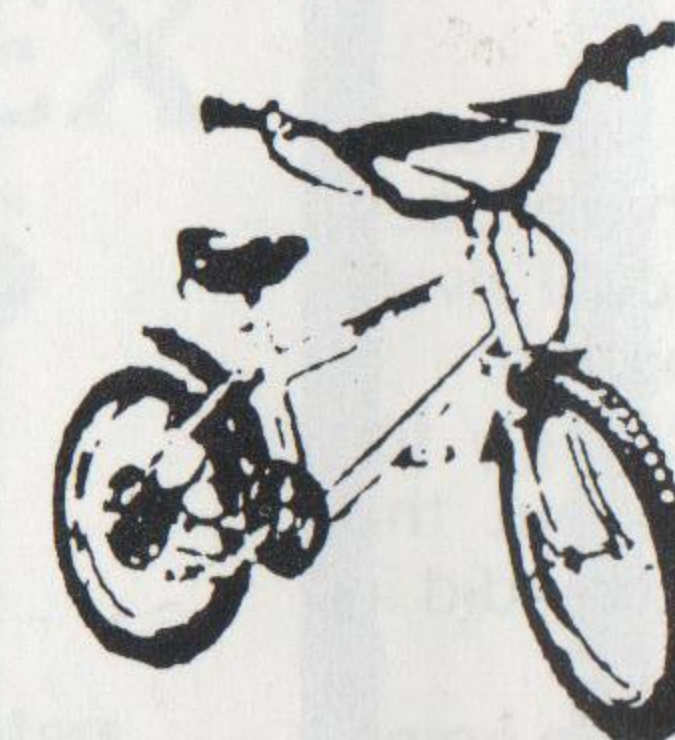

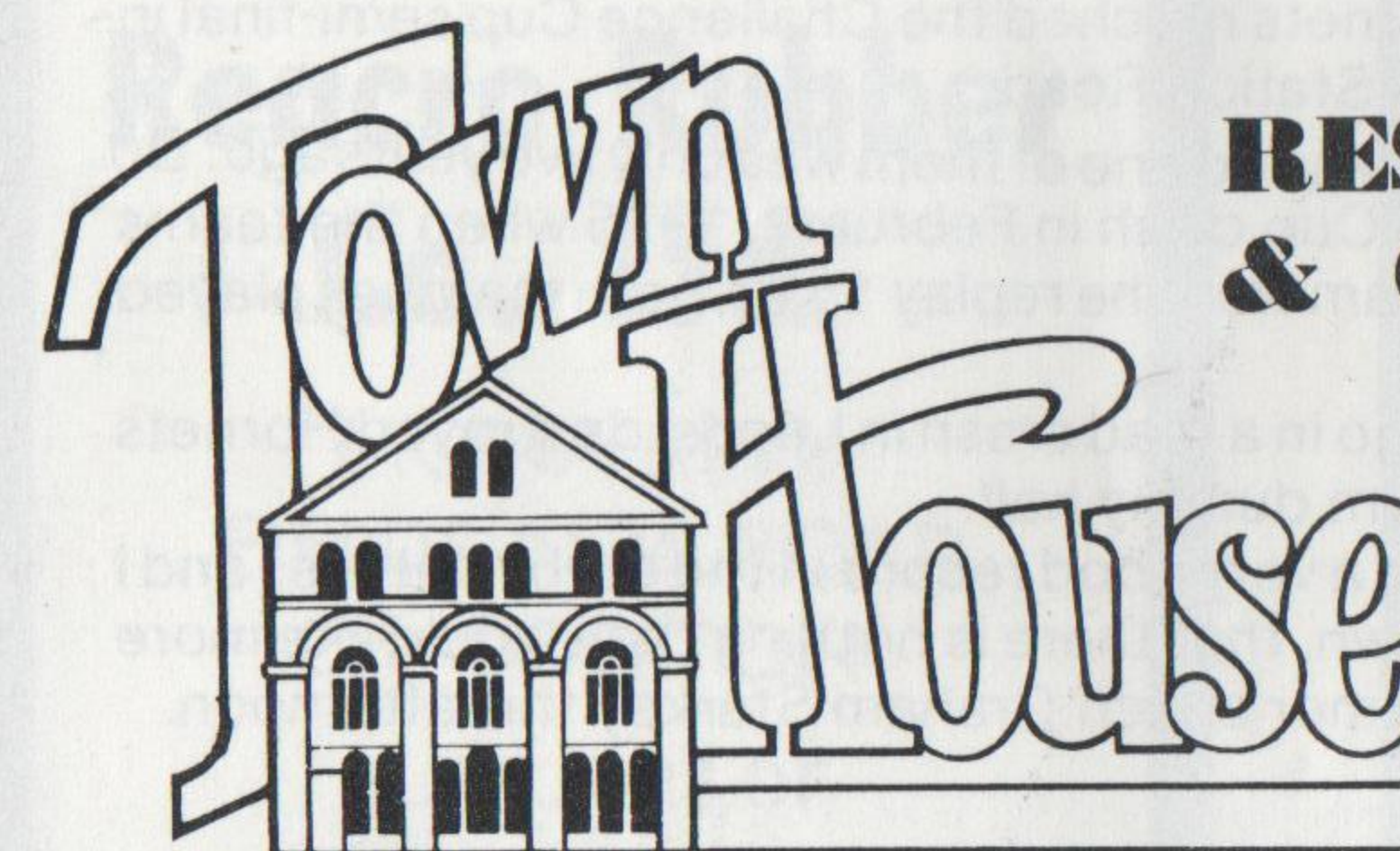

ROGER'S REPORT

There is always something special about Oldham - Hornets derbies. Over the years there have been some memorable clashes between the local rivals and today's battle promises to be no exception. Oldham, on the one hand, are going strongly for promotion and they still have not ruled out the possibility of going up as champions, as they did in 1964.

Hornets, relegated at the end of last term, are going through a rebuilding programme but, nevertheless, will produce something extra at Watersheddings - they always do - and still produce a sting or two! It all seems a far cry from those days of my youth when I stood on the Athletic Grounds terraces in red, white and blue and watched Norman Short, Les Jones, and Co. do battle against the great fifties side from Watersheddings.

My earliest memories of Hornets go back to Gerry Wilde and Albert Fearnley, but it was in the mid-fifties when I really warmed to the Rochdale scene.

Those were the days, shortly before the Jim Sullivan era, when my boyhood hero Ted Cahill was taking charge of the backs and Welshman George Parsons was bossing the pack.

They were the days of the rugby specials from outside the old Electric House up Milnrow Road to the ground.

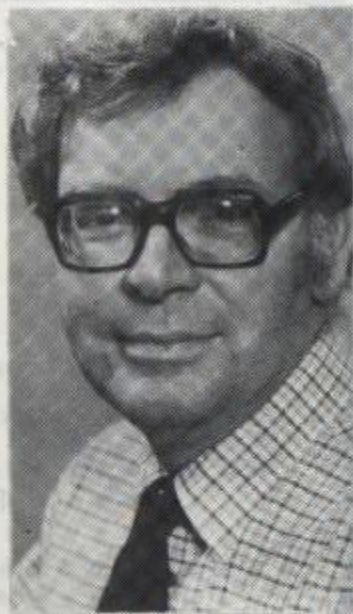
They were the days when Oldham were the old enemy and came to Rochdale with a star-spangled side that usually won... but every now and again had a nasty shock in store.

They were the days of big crowds and tremendous atmosphere, and while Oldham were always the kings, let us not forget that the Hornets reached the Challenge Cup semi-final in 1958 only to lose 5-3 to Wigan at Swinton's Station Road.

There have been some memorable derby battles and one of them was only five years ago. Do you remember that second-round Challenge Cup clash in February, 1975 when the teams drew 10-10 at the Athletic Grounds and Oldham won the replay 15-3, both matches played in front of large and partisan crowds?

Dickie Brown, killed so tragically 18 months ago in a road crash in Leeds, destroyed Hornets on that occasion with his remarkable play from dummy half.

In recent seasons, however, Hornets have had a very good record in the derby battles - and I know, as a Rochdalian who still lives in the town, that there is nothing they would like more than to put one over on Oldham and their former coach Graham Starkey this afternoon. Over to you Oldham!

HEADLINE-CATCHING SIGNING

The Oldham club has rarely had as much national publicity in recent years as that attracted by the recent signings of London-area Union boys, Bob Mordell and Adrian Alexander.

We enjoyed a tremendous show in the national papers when Mordell joined us at the end of October, but even that was nothing compared with the pictures and column inches reserved for the Alexander signing a fortnight ago.

Adrian - or Alec, as he is known - comes to us with a big reputation in Union circles. He was the captain of Harlequins whose home ground is Twickenham itself, and an England squad member.

He had represented Middlesex for five seasons, was his club's youngest captain for more than 100 years, had toured USA and Canada with the Barbarians and was in England's squad for the international against the All Blacks a week or two ago.

He was being widely tipped to win a full England cap in the forthcoming home internationals, but instead decided to start a new career in Rugby League with Oldham.

He had, in fact, played a secret "A" team trial for us a week or two before his signing and the deal was set up when a five-man deputation went to watch him lead Harlequin against Blackheath on the week-end that our first team played at Huyton.

Manager Graham Starkey, player-coach Bill Francis, and club officials Jack Bowden, Frank Diskin and Keith Potter made the trip south and within two or three days we had landed another big fish!

Adrian and his wife Carol, a stewardess on British Airways, hope to move into a new home in Hopwood, near Heywood in the near future.

Also moving up soon will be Bob Mordell and his wife Lynn, who are buying a house in the Greenacres area.

The pair of them have been friends for years and we trust their happy association will continue as team mates in a new code.

Adrian, a flanker in Union, has the size to make a prop in league and he had a good debut in the "A" team at Widnes.

He followed up two days later with a try-scoring debut against Batley and then had a real cracker of a game at St. Helens on the following Wednesday as the "A" team won through to the semi-final of the Lancashire Shield.

Talking of the Shield, the Oldham club now has a very real chance of winning the trophy for the first time since the 1976 team did it under the guidance of Ken Wilson.

Barrow are also through to the semi-finals, but at the time of writing the other two semi-finalists were not known.

May we take this opportunity of wishing you all a happy and prosperous New Year. If we as a club make as much progress during 1980 as we did in 1979 it should be some year.

COLTS CORNER

Congratulations are the order of the day for our three talented teenagers who have earned selection for the Great Britain Colts team to play in France in four weeks' time.

Terry Flanagan will be the British vice-captain and will play at loose-forward in a strong-looking pack.

Ray Ashton, who like Flanagan has already made a big impression in our senior side, will play at scrum-half and his link-up with his club colleague should provide an extra string to the British bow. Paddy Kirwan, who has successfully captained both our colts team and "A" team in his first season as a pro, will go as substitute back.

Scrum-half Kirwan has had a magnificent start to his professional career and there will be many Lancashire people disappointed that he and Ashton are not partners in the British side.

They linked up together at half-back in the Lancashire side but the selectors opted for Andrew MacIntosh of Leeds at stand-off and then chose Ashton for No. 7 ahead of Kirwan because the Widnes lad has already had considerable first-team experience. The British party will travel to Heathrow on Thursday, January 24th and fly out on the Friday. At the time of writing, the venue had not been named and it was not known whether the international would be staged on Saturday, January 26th or the following day. It will mean, of course, that none of our three representatives will be available for our home Second Division clash with Huddersfield on January 27th.

Leigh referee Stan Wall will travel with the party to handle the international and the team will be coached by Garth Budge of Rochdale Hornets and managed by Mr. Harry Jepson of Leeds. There will be training sessions for the squad on January 7th, 14th and 21st.

IT'S CHRISTMAS - LET'S LOOK FORWARD TO EASTER!

The local amateur teams are all currently taking a well-earned rest for the Christmas period before they begin the second-half of their season, which in Oldham culminates with the Standard Cup Final at Waterhseiddings on Good Friday morning. Therefore, with local sides already beginning to think of Eastertime, it might be appropriate at this holiday period to put to one side all thought of what is presently happening in the amateur leagues, and instead look at some of the facts and records concerning the Standard Cup competition.

The trophy was donated to the local league in the 1903-03 season by the former "Oldham Standard News" evening newspaper, and although originally purchased for a mere 30 guineas it is now worth over £1,000. The silver cup stands three feet high and, as every winning player will testify, it can hold 16 pints

of beer. The attendance record for the Final was obtained in 1949 when over 6,000 spectators saw Higginshaw defeat Waterhead, while last season's Good Friday morning encounter between Mayfield and St. Anne's drew receipts of £1,071.30p. which is a World Record for any amateur match in Rugby League history.

Rochdale Rangers appeared in the first four Finals (1904-07) but then went out of existence in 1908 following a dispute with the Northern Union. Since the War, Waterhead have appeared in five Finals but have yet to lift the trophy. Langworthy Juniors and Saint Anne's met in three consecutive Finals (1968-70) with each team winning one and with the third being a draw - Saints won the replay. Saddleworth Rangers achieved the highest score in the competition when they defeated Dobcross 84-0 in 1935 1st. Round game. Rcyton won the trophy on three consecutive occasions (1957-59), but never appeared in any other Finals. Sandfield Hornets were awarded the cup by default in 1926 when Crossfield and Choloride Recreation failed to play their semi-final within the stipulated time. In 1929, Higginshaw received the Cup after Chloride Recreation team left the field in the 8th minute of the Cup Final replay due to three of their players having already been sent off. Greenacres won the 1935 competition due to Higginshaw failing to appear for the Final replay because of a dispute with the Oldham league about the receipts of the match. Higginshaw hold the record for the most number of Cup Final wins (12) and appearances (20), and as well as being the only club to have won the trophy of five successive occasions (1929-33), they appeared in 15 out of the 19 finals which were played between 1929 and 1953.

Finally, the Oldham Amateur Rugby League would like to wish all the town's Rugby League followers, both of the professional and amateur codes, the compliments of the season, as well as thanking the Oldham senior club for their tremendous help during the last decade, and we wish them the best luck in the 80's.
