



After a long and successful run Jim Bawdens international career looks like coming to an end for the Millom centre has lost his place to meet France at Hull later this month.

This is the only dissapointment in the Millom camp as their four other players retain their places, Peter Knowles, Mick James, Joe Jackson, and Steve Mossop.

For the trip to France the U19's side retain Askam's Mike Knight and Derek New while Dane Carter a travelling reserve for the game against Australia at Leeds in January loses out for there will only be one travelling to France.

Walney Central and Millom will carry the flag for the Barrow league in the BARLA Cup yesterday Walney were meeting Widnes St. Marys in a third round replay after drawing 13 - 13 last Saturday at Widnes.

Millom take on West Bowling (Bradford) or Crossfield (Warrington) this tie being away.

Askam lost their third round game at Queensbury (Bradford) 16 - 5.

In the Cumbria league Ulverston the leaders received their biggest defeat of the season when they lost at Millom 49 - 2.

Great Players No. 17. Tommy Harris

In the last programme Joe Egan was featured as the "Great Player" and I said he was many peoples choice as the best ever hooker. Another player who was one of the greatest No. 9's was Tommy "Bomber" Harris, a welshman who moved North to find fame with Hull.

Percival Thomas Harris was born at Crumlin, Wales, in 1928 and began his career by playing Rugby Union for Newbridge. Along side him in that pack was Bill Hopkin and when officials of Hull R.L.F.C. went to sign Bill, Tommy asked them if he could have a trial game only to be bitterly disappointed when they told him that he was too small to be a Rugby League hooker.

However, Tommy would not take no for an answer and persisted with the Hull club until, in December 1949, they relented and gave him a trial game against Wakefield 'A'. Immediately after that game he signed for the Yorkshire club, and in the years that followed was to gain both respect and honours from the sport of Rugby League.

After a settling in period Tommy began to set the game alight. He gained a regular place in the Hull side, and in 1952 won his first Welsh "cap" when he played against France at Bordeaux. From that point his career really took off, with each of the next eight years bringing honours at both club and international levels.

In 1953 he won four Welsh "caps" and gained a losers medal with Hull in the Yorkshire Cup Final. 1954 brought another Yorkshire Cup Runners-Up medal, a tour of Australia, plus the bonus of a Test appearance for Great Britain against New Zealand at Auckland.

Between 1955 and 1959 he played many times for both Wales (who he captained against France in 1959) and Great Britain to take his total to nearly 40 internationals, including 2 Tours "down under". In the same period Hull twice won the League Championship, lost in two more Yorkshire Cup Finals, and reached Wembley (in 1959) only to lose heavily by 30 - 13 to Wigan. This was Tommy's fifth losers medal in as many cup finals!

However, in 1960, he played a large part in helping Hull to reach Wembley for a second successive season. The final though turned out to be more disastrous than the previous years as they crashed 38 - 5 at the hands of Wakefield Trinity. Tommy was knocked out in a first half tackle but played on despite collapsing three times with full sight in only one eye.

He played the game of his life until 5 minutes from the end when he had to leave the pitch and go to hospital for treatment. He was unfit to receive his medal from the Queen but his courage won him the hearts of millions of T.V. viewers and also the Lance Todd Trophy from the R.L. writers.

That game summed up his dedication to both Rugby League and Hull in particular. Amazing to think he was once told he was too small!

FLASHBACK

"Season 1960/61"

Despite the fact that Leeds won their first ever Championship the top club side in 1960/61 were St. Helens who won two trophies, although the scene that season was dominated by the World Cup which was won by Great Britain.

The first honours of 1960/61 were won on October 29th when both the County Cup Finals were played. A crowd of 31,755 saw St. Helens beat Swinton 15 - 9 at Wigan in the Lancashire Cup Final, while 17,456 were at Odsal to watch Wakefield lift the Yorkshire Cup by beating Huddersfield 16 - 10.

In the Rugby League Challenge Cup First Round most of the ties went according to form but surprisingly both the eventual finalists (Wigan and St. Helens) needed replays to reach Round 2.

By the time the Semi-final stage was reached the surviving teams were Hull, Halifax, Wigan, and St. Helens.

St. Helens played Hull, who were attempting to reach their 3rd successive final, and Halifax were drawn against Wigan. St. Helens won 26 - 9 and Wigan won 19 - 10 to set the scene for a Red-Rose Final at Wembley Stadium on May the 13th.

The "Saints" emerged as winners by 12 - 6 thanks mainly to a brilliant try by Tom Vollenhoven, although Dick Huddarts surging runs were a constant threat to Wigan and helped him win the Lance Todd Trophy.

In the League the top 4 were 1, Leeds 2, Warrington 3, Swinton 4, St. Helens. In the Championship Semi-finals Leeds beat St. Helens 11 - 4, and Warrington beat Swinton 13 - 5.

The Final was played at Odsal Stadium before a crowd of 52,300 who saw Lewis Jones score 13 points as Leeds overran Warrington 25 - 10 to become champions for the first time in their history. Leeds also won the Yorkshire League in 1960/61 while Swinton were top of the Lancashire League. The two 'A' team Leagues were won by Widnes and Wakefield Trinity.

The 1960 World Cup was held in Britain, and was competed for in the form of a League which Great Britain won by defeating France (33 - 7), New Zealand (23 - 8), and Australia (10 - 3).

The great Vollenhoven headed the try scorers (for the third successive season) with a total of 60, while Austin Rhodes his St. Helens team mate was the top goalkicker with 149.

Transfers also hit the headlines in 1960/61 when Leeds paid Hunslet a world record £13,500 for forward Brian Swan. Other big money transfers were Jan Prinsloo (St. Helens to Wakefield) £9,000. Mike Sullivan (Wigan to S. Helens) £11,000. Ike Southward (Oldham to Workington) £11,002 - 10s.
