SALFORD SCENE

YOUNGSTERS are proudly carrying the Salford flag into battle so far this season after a traumatic few weeks at the Willows.

The close season has proved a very difficult time for the Red Devils whose pack strength has been torn apart by the retirement of Kevin Ashcroft, Chris McGreal and Colin Dixon and the transfer to newcomers Fulham of prop Tony Gourley.

Mike Coulman had also announced his retirement but such were the problems facing the club that he agreed to bring his boots out of the cupboard and help out.

Eric Prescott has not played yet this season and ace schemer Ken Gill is not training because of pressure of business.

On top of all that there was newspaper speculation last week that all was not well between Salford and coach Alex Murphy. Salford later stated that the story leaked to the Press had been blown up out of all proportion.

Behind the scenes Salford have clearly not experienced one of their happiest summers but the youngsters called in to help in the crisis have done a wonderful job and the fact is that Salford come to Watersheddings today unbeaten after three games.

They easily beat Swinton in a friendly before winning at Dewsbury narrowly in their second pre-season run-out.

Their biggest test was at the Willows last Sunday when a very youthful pack laid the foundation for a very satisfying 23 - 12 win against Leigh in the first round of the Forshaw's Lancashire Cup.

Apparently, the secret of their success was the mobility and tackling of their young forwards and the experience and guiding hand of half-backs Steve Nash and Frank Wilson.

This experienced and tough pair are shouldering much of the responsibility and the young forwards, with David Major outstanding, are responding to their promptings in magnificent manner.

Nash, the Great Britain scrum-half, is being sought by York for the player-coach vacancy at Clarence Street and this has been yet another headache for the Salford management in the past few weeks.

He will be out to retain his No 7 shirt in the Great Britain side when the touring New Zealanders are here in the autumn and he will certainly give us a real test in today's game.

Wilson, now playing stand-off after spending most of his career on the wing or in the centre, is a hardened campaigner whose partnership with Nash provides Salford with the sort of experience which is so vital behind a youthful set of forwards.

And out on the wing there is always Keith Fielding, the fastest man in League, to cash in on half chances and turn a game with one fleeting break or burst for the line.

Salford recognise their pack of forwards needs strengthening for the demands of the First Division but, for the time being at least, their youngsters are doing a terrific job.

Nothing builds confidence like winning matches and Salford have still to lose one despite their mountain of problems!

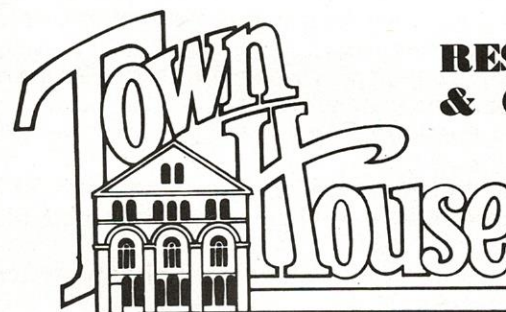

TIME TO CALL A HALT

Has the time arrived to seriously consider scrapping pre-season charity games in their traditional form?

The question can be posed as feeling grows within the game that things are not what they used to be concerning the annual pipe-openers.

In truth it is difficult to know of anyone who is really happy about the presentation of charity games in 1980.

THE FANS must surely feel they are not getting value for money when clubs play below-strength teams and, with the use of five subs, call players on and off with gay abandon.

THE PLAYERS are not exactly over-joyed at playing for £5 the League maximum for charity match wages when they risk injury and may have to miss a "real" game that could be worth up to 20 times as much if they win.

Indeed, we have had the case on Humberside this year when the traditional Hull v Hull KR friendly was not played because the players demanded a £70 wage.

THE CLUBS, too, have little to gain except to give their players a run-out before the genuine thing and this could be done just as well in other ways.

Take the Oldham-Hornets Law Cup clash as an example. In the days when these games were at their most popular the clubs fielded their strongest possible sides. In those days the wages paid to the players represented a much higher percentage of their normal pay than today.

What's more, the Law Cup was traditionally played on the third Saturday in August not the first Sunday as it was this year.

Consequently, the public were more ready for rugby and fewer players were still absent because of holidays.

Player's wages could be increased but then we would run the risk, as the spectator by necessity becomes more selective in his rugby habits, of actually incurring losses on charity matches.

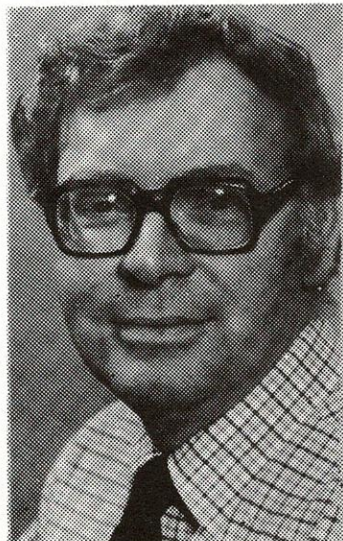
Moreover, it is debatable whether those who benefit from charity matches these days get much out of them anyway.

The crowd for this year's Law Cup game was the best for four years but still only 1,600. In the old days, before the National Health, profits used to go to the Oldham and Rochdale infirmaries.

In more recent years the receipts, after the deduction of expences, have gone to the amateur leagues and the schoolboy game in the two towns.

Worthwhile causes, of course, but each will benefit only marginally by the time the proceeds have been split around.

Perhaps the time has come for clubs to consider the soccer method genuine friendlies behind closed doors or, if they wish to admit the public, treat the games like the old-style pre-season "trials" and possibly take round the hat!

TOM WEBB'S HISTORY OF SALFORD RLFC

The Salford club celebrated its centenary in 1979 but strictly speaking could have done so half a dozen years earlier. The Cavendish Street Sunday School in Hulme started a rugby team and for two years the home ground was in Moss Side. Two years later a move was made to the Mile Field off Trafford Road, the famous New Barns. As the name Cavendish, which the club was now called, lacked appeal the name was changed to Salford in 1879 - 80 season and the immediate result was fixtures with Leeds St. John's (which became the Leeds club), Dewsbury and Kirkstall.

Four years later the club colours of amber, black and scarlet jerseys gave way to "turkey red" and the club's official colours today are still red. During the present century, sometime in the 1930's on a tour of France the club was honoured by the French who described them as the Red Devils, a title earned by the club long before Manchester United gained the same one.

When the Northern Rugby Football Union was formed in 1895 - 96 Salford attended the original meeting but decided to stay with the Rugby Union. After one season the club moved over to the Northern Union.

In 1901 - 02 Salford were second to Broughton Rangers in the first season of the Northern Rugby League and lost to the Rangers in the Cup final. That season saw the move to The Willows at Weaste. The club lost in their first four Challenge Cup finals but won the cup in the 1937 - 38 season. Previously the Reds had won the Lancashire Cup on four occasions. During the 1930s Salford won the Lancashire League championship on five occasions.

Just before the first world war Salford were in difficulties and the club was in the hands of the Official Receiver. In spite of these troubles the club reached the championship top four final and defeated the mighty Huddersfield side to become the league champions.

During the 1920s the club was at rock bottom but Lance Todd was appointed manager and he took the club to the top. Amongst his players were Gus Risman, Alan Edwards, Barney Hudson, Emlyn Jenkins, Billy Watkins, Harold Osbaldestin, Bob Brown, Sam Miller, Cliff Evans, Albert Gear, Paddy Dalton, Alf Middleton, Billy Williams, Aubrey Casewell, H.C. Day and Joe Bradbury.

In recent seasons a new generation of Salford stars has again brought some success to the club. Dave Watkins, who overtook Bernard Ganley's goal kicking record, Chris Hesketh, Keith Fielding, Kenny Gill, Stevie Nash, Mike Coulman, Colin Dixon, Kevin Ashcroft, Eric Prescott, Maurice Richards and others of similar status have all gained distinction.

On the administrative side, Lance Todd, Jimmy Douglas, Alex Murphy and Graham Atkinson who was also a noted county cricketer stand out. Brian Snape who took over at a difficult period raised Salford in a rags to riches story. His position as club chairman has been taken over by his brother Keith who has the same forward looking outlook.

Jack has been with us only a matter of months but the fantastic progress he has made even astonished the experts from the turf research centre at Bingley. We must now surely boast one of the finest playing areas in the Rugby League.

The summer also saw us appoint Mr. John Chadwick as club secretary. John is now well and truly settled into the Watersheddings office where we hope he will enjoy a long and successful stay.

Married with a young family, John originally comes from Shaw. He was educated at Chadderton Grammar School and is a life-long Oldham fan, though he spent about 13 years living in the Flyde area where he was a director of a firm of insurance brokers.

On the playing side we sold Jim Fiddler to Bradford and agreed terms with Salford for the transfer to the Willows of prop Dennis Ashcroft, but Ashcroft declined the move.

The biggest scoop of the summer was the double signing from Hull K.R. of prop Brian Lockwood and speedy winger Clive Sullivan.

We hit the headlines in early June when we "signed" Brian soon after he had won the Lance Todd Trophy in Hull K.R.'s win over rivals Hull at Wembley.

It is history now that Hull K.R. claimed Brian was still on their register and that the signing was delayed until only ten days ago after vital talks in Hull concerning Rovers, Brian and the Oldham club.

On the same day we signed Clive Sullivan, who was on the transfer list as a bargain £2,000 after his years of service to both Humberside clubs.

In one coup we signed two vastly-experienced players one for the pack and one for the backs - who should prove invaluable assets to the club as the First Division battle rages in the long months ahead.

We welcome you all back to Watersheddings at the start of a brand new season that could be one of the most exciting for years if all our plans and ideas materialise.

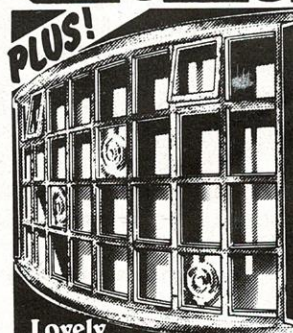
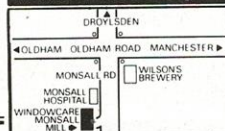

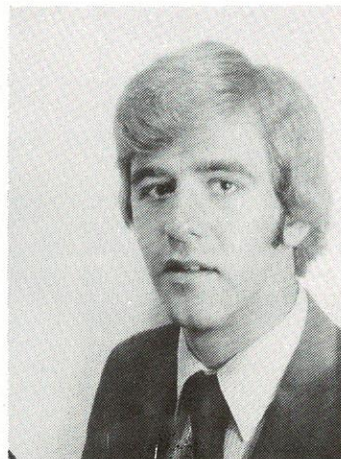

A CUP WON, A TOUR STARTING, AND IT'S ONLY AUGUST

Although today sees the official opening of the 1980-81 season at Watersheddings, the activities of the local amateur league teams are already in full swing, with several pre-season friendlies having taken place, the first Pennine League competition of the new term having been decided, and with a tour of Oldham by the youngsters of the Catalan club from Perpignan in France beginning this Thursday. The chase for the various divisional awards in the Pennine League begins next Saturday, when nine new sides will be joining the fray, thus creating a total of seventy-eight teams throughout the area, which covers Oldham, Rochdale, Halifax, Huddersfield, Keighley and Bradford. Eight sides will form the Premier Division, including Saint Anne's and Waterhead, while local interest in Division One will be centred on Fitton Hill and Saddleworth Rangers. Divisions One to Seven will each contain ten teams, with Ferranti, Higginshaw and Saddleworth 'A' being Oldham's representatives in the Second Division, while Shaw will be our only side in Division Three. The reserve teams of St. Anne's and Waterhead join Salem Hornets in Division Four, Ferranti 'A' are our sole representatives in the Fifth Division, and Hollinwood, Salem 'A' and Tudor Lodge compete for the Division Six title. The newly formed teams will all be contesting the Seventh Division Championship with Fitton Hill's reserve side being Oldham's only challengers.



Waterhead last season's inaugural winners of the John Player Amateur Seven Trophy, were one of the Oldham League's representatives in last Sunday's Pennine 7-a-side tournament, in which they defeated Worth Village (Keighley) and Illingworth (Halifax) to reach the Final. In the decider Waterhead's opponents were Bradford side Dudley Hill, who had earlier in the competition beaten Saddleworth Rangers, and who completed a double over the Oldham teams with a narrow 16-15 win against Waterhead, thus qualifying for the BARLA National Sevens next May.

The annual matches between the youngsters of Oldham and the Catalan club from Perpignan resume this Friday with a series of games at Waterhead Park, beginning at 4.30 p.m. It is almost a decade since the annual fixtures first began between boys aged eleven to sixteen, with many of the youngsters having since gained greater honours in their respective countries. Catalan are one of the leading French clubs with teams from open-age level down to Under-11s, and who currently boast three Internationals - all of whom have made journey's to Oldham on previous youth tours. The Oldham senior club have, of course, also benefited from the tours with players such as Terry Flanagan and Paddy Kirwan having visited France with the local schools' side. Catalan arrive in Oldham on Thursday, and after their opening games at Waterhead, the seniors will be playing in a curtain-raiser to next Sunday's match at Watersheddings, and will then be involved in a full day of youth rugby at Saddleworth's round in Greenfield on Wednesday, September 3, beginning at 9.30 p.m. The French will also be visiting West Lancashire for a series of games against the youngsters of Widnes Tigers.

A new sponsorship deal has recently been announced involving BARLA, Forshaw's Burtonwood Brewery, and BBC Radio Manchester, and which will benefit both players and clubs in the North-West. Each month local clubs will be asked to submit nominations for a "Clubman of the Month" award, with details and the results being given on the local radio station's "BARLA Reports" programme, which is broadcast every Friday (6.30 p.m.). A representative from each of the organisations involved will choose the monthly winner, with the individual receiving an engraved tankard and with his club being awarded a "Medisport" treatment case, complete with medical equipment especially for use by sportsmen.
