AFTER Wednesday's visit of Warrington to Watersheddings in the Forshaw's Lancashire Cup semi-final we again have attractive opposition today in the shape of Featherstone Rovers.

Rovers roard to the Second Division championship last year with Halifax in

second place. Oldham third and Barrow fourth.

Mind you, the Colliers of Post Office Road will have good reason to remember their clashes with Oldham in the Second Division last year because we beat them 23-22 at Watersheddings and then, at the turn of the year, drew 8-8 in a real thriller at Post Office Road.

The game at Watersheddings was also a cracker with Rovers soaring into a commanding lead thanks to the brilliant attacking play of their backs which include such talented young performers as John Gilbert, Paul Coventry, Steve Evans and the mighty Quinn, one of the most consistent goal kickers in the

game today.

Oldham hit back to take the lead before never-say-die Rovers levelled again and then, in an exciting finale, Ray Ashton stepped up to drop the winning goal. It was just as tight several weeks later at Featherstone with Ashton again dropping a goal, Eric Fitzsimons landing two goals and our only try coming from scrum-half Ken Gwilliam, who went in just before half-time on Terry Flanagan's timely pass.

Most Second Division teams, however, were not in the same class as Rovers, who ought never really to have been in the lower division in the first place. They won immediate promotion after only one season and they ought to do quite

well this year on their return to the top flight.

They have too much talent at Post Office Road -- and a good youth policy, too --

to be kept out of the limelight for long.

Harold Box at full back, although a long-serving player, is still one of the best full backs in the game and Rovers are blessed with pace and class right through

their back division.

Evans, equally at home at stand-off or centre, already has international honours and an Australian tour behind him and he will clearly be making a big impression on the selectors as thy prepare for the triangular tournament and the Tests against the New Zealanders in the autumn.

Gilbert is one of the fastest and most dangerous backs in the game while no club can afford to give any penalty kicks away while Steve Quinn is around.

Quinn is also a most accomplished footballer . . . but no set of backs can operate unless their pack is functioning and, in that department, Rovers are also well blessed with players like the experienced Mick Morgan and Keith Bell

to boss the show and youngsters like Dave Vickers to cash in.

Coach Paul Daley will have set his sights on seeing Rovers do well in the First Division -- and, as Oldham took three points off his side last year, he will

probably be especially keen to pick up points today.

TREAT IN STORE

HAVING watched their side for three seasons in the backwaters of the Second Division and watched themstruggle for two of those seasons even in that sort of company Oldham supporters are in for a great treat this year if the home games against Salford and Castleford are any quide

Both were thrillers with Oldham coming back from 13-7 down to beat Salford in injury time and, in the next match, conceding six points in the last few minutes as Mal Reilly snatched a draw for Castleford with a drop goal.

It was tremendous entertainment with top-class players in action in both games, a touch of atmosphere which Second Division could never provide, and Oldham holding their own to earn a Lancashire Cup semi-final place for the first time since 1968, and pick up a point with which to start their First Division programme.

If Oldham can build upon their encouraging start and they have gone progressively better with each game it is going to be a season to relish at Watersheddings. The walk-over wins of last season are a thing of the past. The tight affairs we have already seen, with the result in doubt until the hooter, will probabley be what we can come to expect.

There was disappointment at Watersheddings after Castleford had come back from the dead to earn their 14-14 draw. Having led by six points so near the end the immediate reaction was to regard the result as a point lost rather than a point won. It was certainly an anti-climax but such is the vast gulf that exists between the two divisions -- a great divide that only Hull KR, Leigh and Hull have successfully negotiated in recent years -- that any point Oldham pick up this season must be viewed as a point won.

Indeed, the management is realistic enough to state publicly that the season's top priority is First

Division survival. Anything more than that will be regarded as a bonus.

On the face of it the side at present does not have the pace or power to make a real impact. Despite the problems, however, the team has made tremendous progress since the end of last season and the signing of Brian Lockwood as pack leader must surely mean that Oldham are better off than most for skilful and creative ball players.

Clubs throughout the league are crying out for ball distributors and Oldham have two up front in Lockwood and Terry Flanagan and two in the backs in Bill Francis and Ray Ashton.

I do not go along with the view expressed in some quarters that Oldham might have too many ball

players for their own good.

It is easy to understand what is meant by that criticism but so long as the side's work rate does not suffer how can it possibly be a weakness to have a surfiet of talent?

It does mean that it is perhaps more difficult to organise the side to a set pattern. Oldham are perhaps going to be a very unorthodox side and it all adds to the glorious uncertainty that is the First Division!

CLUB NEWS

ALEXANDER BLOW

WE suffered our first serious injury blow of the season in the match against Castleford two weeks ago. In the opening match on our return to the First Division prop-forward Adrian Alexander went down awkwardly in a first-half tackle and had to be taken off in considerable pain.

It was obvious as soon as he was examined by the club doctor and physiotherapist that the knee injury received by "Alec" was of the more serious type and our worst fears were confirmed two days later when the player was

examined by the club's orthopaedic surgeon.

It was diagnosed that Alec had torn a ligament on the inside of his knee and he was expected to be out of action for some weeks. This was a real blow to us because, since his debut last December, our former Union man had played on the open-side of the front-row in 19 out of 22 matches played.

The injury did underline, of course, the need to have strength in depth and more so now that we are in the First Division and every game is just as important to us

as a cup-tie.

For instance, we had to go to Bradford last Sunday -- home of league champions Northern- without Alexanader and then, on Wednesday night, we had the Forshaw's Lancashire Cup semi-final against Warrington.

Centre Clive Hunter was also hurt against Castleford -- he had a recurrence of groin trouble -- but he quickly responded to treatment and at the time of writing it was hoped he would not be out of action for too long.

Talking of the Castleford match it was bitterly disappointing to end up with a 14-14 draw after we had led by six points near the end.

But we got a point to start us off on our First Division programme - and that was better than nearly half the clubs!

No matter how we fared against the Wires on Wednesday it has to be reiterated that our priority this season is the First Division.

It is a tremendous gulf to cross and, since the reintroduction of two divisions in 1973, few clubs have negotiated it successfully. The two Hull clubs, Leigh and Bradford have firmly established themselves as First Division outfits in a big way after spending time in the Second Division but there have been many casualties among clubs coming up from the lower division.

Take Oldham as an example. We have been up and down like a yo-yo but have never really looked like doing enough to become a force in the First Division. We managed to stop up one year -- by the skin of our teeth -- but we were relegated the following year and then spent three seasons in the Second Division before winning promotion last time.

This time we have to consolidate and by next season we will have had another year to strengthen where necessary and another year in which our talented youngsters will have "grown up" in football terms and gained in football maturity.

So this time we have to concentrate on league points and regard anything else- the winning of cup-ties etc -- as an added bonus.

In the meantime our "A" team should, with luck, be in for a very interesting season. They won the Lancashire Shield last year, as you will remember, and this season they will again be hoping to get among the honours.

They began their defence of the Shield with a first-round tie at Warrington on Friday night. In the Combination our "A" team began their season at Salford and won comfortably by 13 points to 6 with tries from Paddy Kirwan, Alan Forster and Mike Cowley and two goals by Brian Caffrey.

It was an accomplished display and Salford were never really in with a chance of winning. There were particularly good displays from centre Caffrey, scrumhalf Kirwan, and forwards Forster, Les Cook and Colin Hawkyard.

TOM WEBB's HISTORY OF FEATHERSTONE ROVERS RLFC

Featherstone Rovers started off as a junior club in the Wakefield, Dewsbury and District League and startled the world by reaching the third round of the Challenge Cup in 1905-06 defeating Otley in the intermediate round, Brookland Rovers (the team that produced Joe Ferguson) in the first, Widnes a senior club by 23-2 in the second before going down 3-0 at Keighley in the third.

As Irving Saxton, the club historian and statistician has told, there was a Marie Celeste mystery about the club which vanished for about three years after this notable success. The club revived and along with Featherstone and Purston White Horse kept interest alive in the Village. The club played in the Leeds League and the Yorkshire Combination along with senior "A" teams before being admitted to the Northern Rugby League in 1921-22 the last season in which our game was known as Northern Union Football. The club had a taste of senior football when it was admitted to the War Emergency League in 1915-16 along with another minor club, Brighouse Rangers and another aspiring club, St. Helens Recs.

The club was in a lowly position for a few years and on one occasion Oldham ran up 53 points against 15 by the Rovers. The writer of these notes saw that game

from the Penny Rush away back in April 1924.

Within four years of that defeat Rovers reached the top four and finished as league runners-up. In those days it was said that when Rovers wanted a couple of forwards someone whistled down a pit shaft and a couple of them would come up. Today the club by virtue of its youth policy develops its own star players.

Rovers won the Rugby League Challenge Cup in 1967 and 1973 and twice lost in the final. Twice the Yorkshire Cup was won. In 1976-77 the club topped the first division but two seasons later dropped into the second division. This season the club in company with ourselves returns to the first division.

Among the many capable and dedicated officials of the club, John Jepson, Ron Bailey, George Johnson, Derek Hobbs, G.W. Ward, Arthur Berry, Alf Greaves and Arthur Higgins have been prominent at various stages in the club's history.

made 789 first team appearances and Jack Hirst. The latter must not be confused with Oldham's Jack Hirst who played for the Oldham club and set up

the try scoring record before the turn of the century.

Willis Fawley, Don Fox, Joe Mullany, Freddie Miller, Malcolm Dixon, Harod Box, Terry Clawson and Tommy Smales are just a few of the outstanding Rovers' players over the past 60 years and they set the standard for players like Steve Evans, Steve Quinn, John Gilbert and company to follow.

Perhaps the outstandingly well known player today is Mick Morgan who compares and stages the Rugby League Road Show as well as doing the

honours at the Featherstone Rovers Social Club.

Prop forward O'Reilly, who helped his country win the World Cup in 70 and played in the same competition in France in 72 as well as touring this country in the 73 Ashes winning squad has gone out on crutches.

He recently had a knee operated on and is in plaster to his thigh as he plans his future outside the game.

O'Reilly figured in quite a few torrid clashes with Welsh giant Jim Mills who

always felt he had the upper hand on his rival after putting him in his place when he spent a spell with North Sydney.

O'Reilly, who aims to go into the hotel business has played with Parramatta, Penrith and Eastern Suburbs with his old international pal Artie Beetson. It is interesting to players, coaches and international selectors throughout the game to hear his views as he looks back on his 14 years in the game.

He believes the biggest change he has seen has been in the standard and approach to the game in Sydney.

'It is much more professional now than when I started out,' he says. 'The players are much fitter and faster.

'I am not saying the players today have more ability than players when i first began but more emphasis is placed on fitness and extra work is done to bring out a player's best points.

'But the training now is three and four nights a week plus more time to watch video replays and motivation films and most clubs begin training for the next season in October or November.

'These days you have to be pretty fit to start training for the season which means working hardthrough the summer as well.'

O'Reilly was never really rated highly in this country because he always seemed to fall in the shadow of Big Artie but he did some solid work in the 73 Test series.

He never showed any real flair and that is perhaps why he is not seeking to stay in the game in a coaching capacity.

Instead he wants to spend more time with his wife and young family now he has made the break and looks set to leave Sydney for a country life.

NEW LEAGUE IS THE FIRST ENTIRELY SPONSORED AMATEUR CHAMPIONSHIP

With sponsorship thesedays becoming an almost essential part of the sporting life, the newly formed Greater Manchester Youth League were delighted to announce last week the securing of a financial deal with a local company who have agreed to provide assistance in the League's

inaugural season.

Oldham Exhaust andTyre Centre are to give their backing to both the Under-15 and Under-17 league fixtures, with the teams in both age-groups therefore being in contention for their respective Oldham Exhausts Championship. This is the first time ever in the history of Amateur Rugby League that an entire league programme has received sponsorship, and thus ensures that the youngsters who are part of the successful teams will themselves gain their own personal awards at the end of the season. Seven teams are to enter the Under-15 competition, with nine sides playing at Under-17 level, while knockout cup tournaments, a seven-a-side competition, and an end of season play-off are also planned, for which sponsors are also being sought.



The new Oldham Supporters Club team, who are to compete

in the Under-17 age-group, have yet to receive clearance from BARLA as to whether they will be allowed to play in the amateur ranks due to their connections with the senior club. The BARLA decision to impose a ban on any team who receive professional club assistance could, in the case of the Greater Manchester Youth League, affect the Oldham and Rochdale Hornets Supporters teams, with the Hornets being represented in both divisions. The Rochdale side were in existance last season and have already been given the go-ahead by the Association, although Oldham's application has still to be vetted.

Having already accepted the Oldham side, the Greater Manchester League have written to BARLA backing the local team's application. However, should BARLA officials reject the new side, several questions could be asked of the Association in order to clarify how their ban is to be imposed. Although BARLA are against the idea of a professional rugby club entering a totally amateur side in their youth leagues, they still allow many professional companies to subsidise an open-age amateur team, including several ex-professional players, with a social club, playing area, and equipment, all provided free of charge - items which other amateur clubs have to finance out of their funds. Pilkingtons of St. Helens have won the BARLA National Cup for the past two seasons - if the glassworks firm were to start a new professional club next season would BARLA ban the amateur

team?

The newly-formed Fulham protessional club - who are playing their first match today - have provided BARLA with the problem of selecting just one amateur team to compete in both the Player's No.6 Trophy and the State Express Challenge cup, instead of the usual two representatives. In previous years the two finalists in the BARLA National Cup competition have qualified for the John Player event, with the winners of the Lancashire/Cumbria and Yorkshire amateur cups competing in the Challenge Cup. However, last season's National Cup victors, Pilkington's are to be the sole representatives of the amateur game in this term's Player's competition, while the eventual winners of the two BARLA County Cup tournaments will meet in a play-off match to decide who joins the professional clubs of the road to Wembley.
