

SAINTS COME MARCHING IN

By their own very high standards St. Helens are not enjoying one of their most successful seasons, having won only nine of their 22 First Division games at the time of writing.

When Oldham and St. Helens had each played 22 league games Saints had 19 points to Oldham's 15 and they could easily have been level on 17 points apiece but for our injury-time defeat at Knowsley Road on Boxing Day.

However, the Saints are traditional cup fighters and it is no surprise to see them here at Watersheddings today in the last eight of the Three Fives Challenge Cup and regarded by some observers of the game as a good outside bet for Wembley.

Warrington, who met Wakefield at Wilderspool yesterday, were just about joint favourites to lift the trophy at Wembley alongside Hull KR, who do battle this afternoon with Salford at Craven Park.

But no one can write off Saints when it comes to the Wembley run - and it would be only a fool who would underestimate them on the strength of their modest First Division placing.

Saints possess two of the strongest finishing wingers in the game in the long-serving Les Jones and Welshman Roy Mathias while in the bustling Chris Arkwright they have one of the best centre prospects in the game.

Half-back is the hub of any side and here again Saints are normally well served by Peter Glynn at stand-off and young starlet Neil Holding at the base of the scrum.

Holding dislocated a shoulder in the second-round win against Hull and is almost certain to miss today's game though Saints have a very able deputy in Steve Peters.

Forward, Saints are very stong indeed with Welsh prop Mel James on the open side, England international Graham Liptrot as hooker, and Mick Hope on the blind-side.

There are few more experienced second-rows around than that formed by Eric Chisnall and Peter Gorley while at loose-forward Harry Pinner is a player of undoubted class as his representative record already proves.

Gorley hurt an ankle against Hull, beaten 3-2 at Knowsley Road, but even if he is not fit Saints can call upon a veteran cup campaigner of the calibre of Test man George Nicholls, one of the most respected forwards in the game today.

We were very unfortunate to lost 11-10 at Knowsley Road on Boxing Day when Pinner hoisted an up-and-under in a desperate, last-ditch Saints attack and it led to a try under the posts which provided Holding with the formality of landing the winning goal.

Mick Parrish landed four goals that day and Ray Ashton landed two drop goals and if today's cup clash is anything like as close and exciting the fans will really get their money's worth.

Tickets for the Show are now available from the Social club, Geoff himself, or any member of his testimonial committee.


Talking of Keith Macklin and promoting the game, congratulations should be offered to the team that is presenting the new "RL Action" programme on ITV on Monday evenings.

ALEX RULES O.K.

THE OBSTRUCTION LAW:-


The referee's signal will endeavour to clearly indicate the offence by miming the action. Obstruction can be a complex subject to discuss because there are so many and varied types of obstruction. Good advice to a referee is to differentiate between accidental or the deliberate offence. The referee must remember that the man with the ball cannot be guilty of obstruction, neither can a colleague be blamed for the manoeuvres of the man with the ball.

Being too severe on accidental obstruction may unjustly penalise good tactical manoeuvres, the "scissors" and "dummy" movements are typical examples. The increase in "dead ball"

manoeuvres also increases the problems.

In the case of the referee deciding the obstruction was accidental then a scrum should be formed. If he decides it was obstruction intentionally either actively or passively then a penalty is given. A player who has knocked on must not be obstructed. The player who kicks through must not leave his kick too late and then expect a clear passage, the opponent may be committed to the

Spectators often shout for obstruction even though the man with the ball has been tackled, the referee will play on.

JIMMY 'TACKLER' THOMPSON CALLS IT A

Jimmy Thompson's decision to call it a day at Brian Batty the end of this season sees another fine Daily Mail member of our last Ashes winning side leave the playing scene.

Thompson has been one of the game's top forwards for more than a decade, battling courageously in recent years to overcome injury troubles with plenty of character and determination.

It seems an eternity since he made his mark at Wembley in the second row of that fine Featherstone Rovers Cup winning side against Barrow in the 1967 final.

I was fortunate enought to see Thompson develop into a Test forward three years later

on the successful tour of Australia and New Zealand.

'Tackler' as he became nicknamed by the respectful Aussies, had left England eager to learn the ropes but he quickly forced his way into the Test side to stay. He returned home a giant in playing terms having gone out a mere stripling but tragically ran into a crippling knee injury that threatened to wreck his fast ripening career.

But he eventually underwent an operation on the shattered knee and after almost two seasons out of the game gradually won his fight to remain in top

class football.

There was no doubt that his loss of pace - a legacy of his injury - was a handicap but when Peter Fox took him from Featherstone to Bradford Northern to renew their partnership it was like the start of a second career.

Coach Fox had had Jim under his wing at Post Office Road long enough to visualise the new role he could play as a skipper and in the front row of the pack at Odsal.

It proved a shrewd move - Bradford will never get a better deal - for soon Thompson was heading for fresh honours and was back on the international front.

Since they teamed up again Bradford have won the Premiership trophy, the Yorkshire Cup, the John Player trophy and the First Division championship. Fox had set his heart on taking Bradford to Wembley this season but that dream was to live no longer than the first round and so the chance for Jim to bow out in style was lost.

There is still the Premiership to aim for and so Bradford have an extra spur to give Jim a fine send off and I am sure he will be in there battling for a final honour.

1981 OLDHAM STANDARD CUP FINAL

Saddleworth Rangers versus Waterhead - that's the treat in store for the local Amateur Rugby League supporters in this season's Oldham Standard Cup Final, which as usual will take place at Watersheddings on Good Friday morning (11am). Saddleworth will be defending the Cup they won last year when defeating Saint Anne's, while Waterhead will be aiming to lift the famous trophy for the first time in their history, having appeared in five previous finals since the war. Despite winning the Standard Cup last year, Saddleworth were relegated to Division One of the Pennine League, but have restored their pride this season by once again reaching the final with victories against Spotland Rangers, Fitton Hill and Higginshaw. Waterhead, who are members of the Pennine League's Premier Division, won their place in the decider with away wins over Langworthy Juniors and Shaw, and a semi-final success against Mayfield.

Both teams are currently in excellent form and include many of the area's top players. Rangers will have three current Lancashire County representatives in their side, with propforward Paul Wilson beying gained ones, are becomes applica-


forward Paul Wilson having gained open-age honours earlier this year, while scrum-half Gary Ainsworth and second-rower Mark Rowbottom both appeared for the Red Rose under-19s outfit. Waterhead, who are coached by former Watersheddings prop-forward Ken Wilson, include two players in their ranks who have gained representative honours at University level. Full-back Mick Childs appeared for Yorkshire Universities while studying at Leeds, while second-row forward Steve Dragicevic, in his first season with Waterhead has previously gained International recognition for England against France. The two sides will also include several players from this season's very successful Oldham town-teams. The Oldham Standard Cup was first contested in the 1903-04 season after the local Amateur League had received the cup from the local "Oldham Standard" newspaper; while it is made entirely of silver, and although originally bought for a mere 30 guineas, it has recently been valued at over £1,500. The trophy itself stands three feet high and, as any winning player will testify, it holds 16 pints of beer.

The tremendous following which both Saddleworth and Waterhead attract points to another large crowd at Watersheddings for this season's final, with an attendance of over 5,000 expected at the match, while receipts for the tie could easily better last year's figure of £1,680, which itself was the highest amount ever for an amateur game in Rugby League history. As usual, supporters from throughout the country will be travelling to Oldham for the final, while local Rugby League followers will be able to make it a full day out, as in the afternoon the Oldham professional club will be at home to Saint Helens in a vital league fixture.

Next Sunday, the Oldham under-17s town-team travel to Widnes for their BARLA Inter-League quarter-final, and for the first time will be wearing the new set of playing kit presented to them by the Oldham senior club a fornight ago.
