

SAINTS COME MARCHING IN

By their own very high standards St. Helens are not enjoying one of their most successful seasons, having won only 11 of their 26 First Division games at the time of writing.

When Oldham and St. Helens had each played 22 league games Saints had 19 points to Oldham's 15 and they could easily have been level on 17 points apiece but for our injury-time defeat at Knowsley Road on Boxing Day.

However, the Saints are traditional cup fighters and it was no surprise to see them at Watersheddings in the last eight of the Three Fives Challenge Cup, they won 6-5 but lost to Hull KR in the semi-final.

Saints possess two of the strongest finishing wingers in the game in the longserving Les Jones and Welshman Roy Mathias while in the bustlin Chris Arkwright they have one of the best centre prospects in the game.

Half-back is the hub of any side and here again Saints are normally well served by Peter Glynn at stand-off and young starlet Neil Holding at the base of the scrum.

Holding dislocated a shoulder in the second-round cup win against Hull but Saints have a very able deputy in Steve Peters.

Forward, Saints are very strong indeed with Welsh prop Mel James on the open side, England International Graham Liptrot as hooker, and Mick Hope on the blind-side.

There are few more experienced second-rows around than that formed by Eric Chisnall and Peter Gorley while at loose-forward Harry Pinner is a player of undoubted class as his representative record already proves.

Gorley hurt an ankle against Hull, beaten 3-2 at Knowsley Road, but Saints can call upon a veteran campaigner of the calibre of Test man George Nicholls, one of the most respected forwards in the game today.

We were very unfortunate to lose 11-10 at Knowsley Road on Boxing Day when Pinner hoisted an up-and-under in a desperate, last -ditch Saints attack and it led to a try under the posts which provided Holding with the formality of landing the winning goal.

Mick Parrish landed four goals that day and Ray Ashton landed two drop goals and if today's clash is anything like as close and exciting as that match of the 6-5 cup clash here a few weeks ago the fans will really get their money's worth.

PRAISE THE ATTACKERS!

ARE Rugby League people so defensive minded that they sometimes fail to appreciate exciting attack? Put another way, do we see only faults in our own team rather than the virtues of the

opposition?

I ask the questions after listening to the comments on the Oldham-Wakefield game when the highlights were shown on television. Both sides scored three tries in an exciting match which Wakefield won 15-13 but the praise of commentator Keith Macklin and Ray French, who summed up was always qualified by references to poor defence.

French, while clearly excited about some of Oldham's football and the contribution of young half-backs Ray Ashton and Paddy Kirwan, made the point that both defences were poor because

tries were scored from close range.

No one wants to hear the sort of eulogising we get in Rugby Union sometimes but I do belive that League people often go to the other extreme and automatically blame poor tackling or covering when a try is scored instead of examining the contribution of the attacking side.

What a pity the programme from Watersheddings had to end with Agar's criticism of defences when the highlights had show some terrific attacking

moves from both teams!

In fairness, French had some complimentary things to say abouth the match

and I thought he made some excellent points.

He was lavish in his praise for Kirwan and Ashton, referred to Oldham as an entertaining side, pointed out that Wakefield were more professional in their approach, referred several times to the excellent contribution of McCurrie and summed up that the sheer strength and power of the Wakefield pack was the difference between the sides: all valid points.

His criticism of Oldham's defence when Trinity stand-off Tinker ran diagonally


to score at the corner was justified.

REFEREE'S NOTES

People often ask me what is required to become a Referee. It is no secret that we are desperately short of Referees. Since the untiring efforts of B.A.R.L.A. and the many unsung heroes who act as Club Committee Men, the Amatuer game is on the crest of a wave. This often means that some Officials referee as many as three games every weekend and often referee during the week when helping out at Schools and University level.

Anyone interested can attend the local Referees' Society meetings without any obligation to join. If they then wished to join, the Society would set a number of simple questions which would ensure that they would be able to handle basic rules of refereeing and run the touch line for

As their experience and confidence increases by handling more matches, they can then ask the local league for permission to apply to RL Headquarters to sit the Grade 5 exam. The local league will be monitoring their progress from match reports submitted for local clubs and, of course by

GRADE 5 is achieved by sitting a written examination at RL offices and consists of approximately 100 questions to be answered in one hour. This will be the only written test and if passed will enable the Official to referee all Amateur matches, act as touch judges for, "A" teams and 1st teams and also referee "A" teams. These appointments of course depend upon reports on their

GRADE 4 is for Officials forty years of age, who can referee Amateur matches and also act astouch

judges at 1st and "A" team matches.

GRADE 2 means that you are now a "Senior Referee". Having handled top Amateur and "A" team matches plus having been under the scrutiny of the RLAssessors Sam Shepherd and Joe Manley, you can now referee 1st and "A" team matches. Your allocation of 1st team matches will ensure a reasonable probationary period and, depending upon your marks from clubs, you would either advance or return to Grade 4 or 5.

GRADE 1 Officials handle only 1st team matches although many helf out on 'FREE' weekends in the Amateur Leagues. All Senior Referees are marked by both clubs. Points that the club look our

Application of laws and control

Positioning and fitness Stoppages and signals.

A Grade 1 Official can be Down-Graded to Grade 2 or 4.

The Senior Referee now has three physical and fitness tests each season at Salford University. He will also be present at all local and Lancashire County meetings, plus attending Senior Referees meetings where they discuss all aspects of the game and indeed do meet with the RL Executive Council, and have had discussions with coaches.

The Lancashire County RL sponsor Referees' Schools run by a Senior Referee to help pass on experiences and discuss points of law to prepare your Referees for the furture.

Not everyone can reach Senior Referee Status, but I can assure anyone interested of a close

involvement with the game at all levels, (it must be no less a thrill to be touch judge at Wembley), and tremendous companionship with colleagues who have a 100% interest in the game.

If your are an ex-player, a teacher or a spectator why not come and join us.

our 25-24 defeat at Leigh recently.



ALAN DEARDEN RETIRES THROUGH INJURY Brian Batty

Rugby League has unfortunately lost one of the men who in his own modest way helped Widnes earn the title of Team of the Seventies.

The retirement of second row forward Alan Dearden at only 29 with knee ligament trouble robs the game of a real dedicated pro, possessing admirable qualities.

In his tenth season with his only club Alan was twice called up for Lancashire when tragedy struck in the autumn of his career.

'I got in the Lancashire side twice this season and had won everything with Widnes bar a Premiership winners' medal. But the highlights were going to Wembley,' he told me



He collected a winners' medal against Wakefield Trinity, making up for the losers' when Leeds took the honours and he was at the heart of the the club's John Player and Lancashire Cup triumphs.

Fulham player-coach Reg Bowden was always a big Dearden fan in his Widnes days Just as teammate Mick George was his pal from early schooldays.

Bowden appreciated Dearden's contribution to a great pack when he was skipper at Widnes and told me once: 'Alan is the original quiet man of rugby but don't let that fool you. This boy has made a big impact where is matters - on the field.'

Alan always admitted he hated losing yet he was disciplined and never really looked for trouble, taking the knocks and tackling himself into the ground. Skipper Mick Adams says: 'Alan always underrated himself. He never got his

fair share of the praise but he was an invaluable member of the pack and will be missed on and off the field.'

It is to be hoped that Alan will not be forgotten and that perhaps his wonderful contribution as a one-clubman can be recognised in some way.

When you hear of the testimonials being collected in sport, especially cricket, it is sad to see a player cut down in his prime.

Had he not finished up with a shattered knee, Alan might well have played on for another four or five seasons, even longer.

What makes his loss worse is that it has happened at a time when the game is suffering so much from a lack of players with his tackling power, dedication and high workrate.

LETS STOP THIS 'CIVIL WAR'

Welcome back to Watersheddings all of you who might have been in attendance at this morning's Oldham Standard Cup Final between Saddleworth Rangers and Waterhead. If a conclusive result was achieved then one of the teams will now be in the midst of celebrations, while should the Final have ended in a draw - therefore giving both teams an excuse for a celebration - a replay will take place here at Watersheddings on Easter Monday evening (7pm). Despite the Oldham senior club being at home to Salford earlier on Easter Monday, the club have willingly agreed to allowing any possible replay to take place on the same day, thus further strenghtening the links between themselves and the local amateur league. Unfortunately, however, this kind of situation does not exist throughout the Rugby League scene, and the game itself can only be harmed while officials of both the professional and amateur codes are in conflict.

Throughout the past season there has been constant reports about the 'civil war' which exists between the Rugby Football League and the British Amateur Rugby League Association about the eligibility of youth players to compete under the

juristriction of both organisations, and this type of publicity can only be bad for the image of the 13-a-side code. During the coming smmer it is the hope of the vast majority of true supporters that the situation can be resolved as it is only a handful of people from both sides who constantly oppose any form of agreement.

Professional clubs should not be cruxified for wanting to attract the top youth players to their clubs so as soon as possible and thus play them in the Colts and Under-17 teams. Indeed, a fair point is that why should a youngster be prevented from playing Rugby League Football as an amateur on two consecutive days when a professional footballer could appear for Manchester United on a Saturday and play amateur Rugby League the following day and still be eligible for all BARLA honours. BARLA are opposed to the fact that many professional rugby clubs were previously organising a Colts team on a Saturday afternoon and then playing virtually the same team in the amateur leagues on the same weekend. Despite such teams having existed for several years, BARLA have now banned such sides, and cannot be blamed for wanting to protect the interests of the oridinary amateur youth player who does not have the advantage of using a professional club's facilities.

Since the BARLA decision to ban these teams at the start of this season, many other arguments have been put forward, but the basis point is that BARLA do not want professionally organised teams, although all amateur players, from dominating their events. I therefore again submit the idea that BARLA should allow ALL amateur players to play in their competitions, but that an amateur team be limited to playing two players who are also registered with a professional side. This would prevent senior clubs from winning all the amateur honours, but would also allow the genuine players to play whenever they wanted.

If some kind of decision is not reached in the near future then many players and supporters will eventually become tired of the whole situation. And after the magnificent efforts made in the both the professional and amateur codes in recent years to improve the game, it would certainly be a crime if Rugby League Football was allowed to suffer because of the attitude of a very small minority of people in the game itself.
