



WATERSHEDDINGS SURVEY

A LITTLE bit of Oldham history is made today because this is the first occasion in the 11-year-history of the John Player Trophy that we have reached the quarter-final stage of the competition.

It also means that, for the first time this season, we meet First Division opposition in a competitive match, the only previous occasion being the pre-season friendly with St. Helens in which we triumphed 8-5.

Leeds provide us with what should be a cracking third-round tie and we ought to get our best crowd so far this season despite the disappointment in our going down 7-22 to Carlisle at Watersheddings a week ago.

Carlisle's victory meant that we surrendered our unbeaten home record in the Second Division, but in terms of the promotion race the week-end's situation could have been considerably worse because Salford and Halifax also lost ground with defeats at Keighley and Bramley.

As things stand at present we are still on top of the division with the top-four made up with Workington, Carlisle and Keighley, though some clubs have a game in hand on us.

French referee M. Pierre Bonnefont handled the Carlisle game and it was interesting to compare his style and interpretation with that of English officials.

On the day Carlisle finished comfortable winners with Oldham's only points coming from two goals by Mick Parrish and a try from full back Martin Murphy.

Another tit-bit to the match was the debut of our new hooker signing Alan McCurrie who proved that he will be a good asset to the side when he is really settled in. Though the score might suggest otherwise, there were times in the first-half when we produced some of our best football of the season with the new boy playing a major role.

Next week we return to Second Division football with a visit to Watersheddings from one of our promotion rivals - Halifax.

They are one of only two sides to defeat us so far in the league and we certainly have plenty of reason for wanting revenge against a side that traditionally produces a tip-top game with Oldham.

The Cardiff game, which should have been played today at Ninian Park, has now been re-arranged for Sunday, January 31st.

We originally had a blank date on January 31st while Cardiff were due to play Huyton, a fixture that has been brought forward to today.

It meant that both Cardiff and Oldham were "free" on January 31st so no time was wasted in arranging our outstanding fixture at Ninian Park.

It is a welcome piece of news for the Oldham club because there were at one time fears that we might have to prepare to go to South Wales for an evening fixture towards the end of the season and that would have been no good to anyone.

By coincidence, the new date also means that we will play the Welshmen on successive Sundays because they are down to play here on Sunday, February 7th on the original fixture list.

The Sunday trip to Cardiff also means that we will be going ahead with the original plans to run a train for players and supporters and details will be announced as soon as they are to hand.

Our Colts came unstuck last Saturday when losing 15-28 to Castleford at Watersheddings, but they played some good, determined football to record tries by centre Keith Atkinson, winger Stephen Dobb and winger Stuart Collinge. Atkinson also kicked three goals.

The "A" team lost 14-16 at Wigan "A" on Wednesday night of last week but in view of the scarcity of possession against a Wigan front-row that included veteran hooker Peter Clarke and a prop of the calibre of Eddie Bowman, the Oldham performance had much to commend it.

Indeed, not only did Oldham tackle stoutly throughout the match but they scored four tries to Wigan's three.

Alan Platt kicked one goal and tries were scored by Bob Mordell, John Walls (2) and Derek Seabrook, whose performance earned him a place on the first-team sheet for the Carlisle match.



TODAY'S VISITORS

WELCOME TO LEEDS

LEEDS, today's visitors to Watersheddings are the first First Division side to come here this season in competitive football and they cross the Pennines after a run of four games without defeat prior to their game at Hull last week-end.

The Headingley lads, under a new coach this season in Robin Dewhurst, did not make the best of starts in the league but they pulled off a shock first-round Yorkshire Cup win at Hull before going out to Bradford Northern in round two.

In the Player's Trophy they have knocked out Wigan 19-10 and Warrington 13-8, both at home, so they will be going into today's tie full of confidence.

The two Player's wins, plus victory against Wakefield and a home draw against Fulham in the First Division, gave them their four-match unbeaten spell before last weekend.

At that stage Leeds were in mid-table with three wins, one draw and five defeats from their nine games.

A new name on the Headingley first-team scene this season is that of full back Tony Binder, who has come through the "A" team to make the senior No. 1 job his own after two or three seasons in the reserves.

Alan Smith, David Smith, John Atkinson, Mark Massa and Terry Naylor have shared the wing duties but Atkinson will not be in the running today because of a shoulder injury.

Neil Hague and Les Dyl, who represented England against Wales in Cardiff last Sunday, will probably be in the centre with John Holmes and Kevin Dick operating at half-back.

Andy MacIntosh, the club's talented young stand-off, is recovering from a knee injury and will not be playing today.

In the forwards Mick Harrison, Roy Dickinson and Steve Pitchford are rivals for the prop positions while the No. 9 job goes to David Ward, who captained England at Ninian Park last week-end.

Keigh Rayne and Graham Eccles have been operating in the second-row with David Heron at loose-forward though other contenders for the back-row include Heron's brother, Wayne, and Joe Carroll.

Carroll, substitute forward against Warrington in the last round, made the tie safe for Leeds by setting up the try that sealed it.

Prior to last week-end, Leeds had not lost since suffering a 12-5 defeat at Leigh on October 7th and that is a measure of the task that confronts Oldham today.

What's more, Leeds won a first-round tie here 31-7 two years ago, so Oldham certainly have reason for wanting to extract some revenge.



GREAT LOSS

RUGBY LEAGUE has suddenly been robbed of two highly respected figures by the deaths of Sumner Baxendale and Jack Woodward.

These two men made a great impact on the game in their respective roles on the same side of the Pennines yet were well known in both Yorkshire and Cumbria.

Sumner Baxendale spread his wings that bit further in that while a long serving Wigan director he took on the important role of League chairman.

He filled so many different positions on committees during his distinguished service as a Council member that it is difficult to keep track of his varied work.

He thrived on involvement in the code was a popular and almost permanent figure on the trips to France with different international sides.

There is not question though that his greatest moment was, during his time as chairman, to tour Australia and New Zealand in 1979. The warmth of his personality, receptive manner and interest in the game and its products earned him friends in many corners of the world.

Jack Woodward's travels were perhaps a great deal more limited in his role of Widnes chairman, which he took on in 1975, but he was a powerful and proud figure behind the club's domination of the trophy winning scene.

When Jack Woodward welcomed you to Naughton Park as he did so warmly then it was with a handshake that left you in no doubt that he meant it and that you were in the grip of a former forward.

Jack Woodward possessed a single minded approach in his dedicated and determined aim to see Widnes remain on top and he was never afraid to speak his mind.

You had to admire his enthusiasm and I am sure he would look back on his finest moments with the club when he led them out at Wembley along the road to repeated Cup triumphs.

A second or front row forward he played 67 first team games for Widnes in a career hampered by a shoulder injury. He gained a reputation as the game's longest kicker when he came to touch finding.

He could carry the length of the pitch with his kicking and played alongside the club's acting chairman Jack Hayes who says: "Jack was a grand forward and a fine chairman. He is going to be greatly missed for his wonderful efforts."

There is no doubt that the game is going to be poorer for the loss of two men who gave so much time and dedication to improving it.

A SHORT HISTORY OF LEEDS

AN advertisement in the "Leeds Mercury" in 1864 read, "FOOTBALL - Wanted number of persons to form a football club for play on Woodhouse Moor for a few days a week for 7 to 8 a.m." H. I. Jenkinson was the inserter of the advertisement and he was assisted in his efforts to form a club by J. G. Hudson and W. Dickinson.

The players used to start their football practices at 6.30 in the morning and members who were late were fined six pence. They had broomsticks with cotton flags for goal posts and they experimented with all sizes of balls up to one fourteen inches in diameter. Out of this club sprung the Leeds Athletic Club, which had a hand in the inauguration of the Yorkshie R.U. Challenge Cup.

However the present Leeds club which was formed in 1890-91 took as its football section the old Leeds St. John's club. This club had been formed in 1870 and played in amber and blue. The club's first ground was on the "cinders" of the Militia Barracks and later on the celebrated Cardigan Fields.

Like Wakefield Trinity the club was for a time confined to church members but membership was widened in due course. The club reached the final of the Yorkshire Cup in 1887 but lost to Wakefield Trinity. A year later a group of Leeds sportsmen and some of the leading citizens thought that the time was ripe for the formation of a superior organisation.

These gentlemen bought lot 17a, or part of it, when the Cardigan Estates were sold.

This Lot 17A is one of the finest enclosures in the land, comprising the cricket and rugby grounds at Headingley. The ground was not ready at the start of the 1890-91 season and Leeds played its first home game at Cardigan Fields and its second and most important one at Headingley on September 20th, 1890. The club colours on that historic occasion were terra cotta and green. Tommy Summersgill scored the first try at Headingley.

In 1895-96 the club joined the Northern Union but fared rather badly compared with later years. Not included in the original First Division of the Northern Rugby League the club had to fight its way up from the Second Division.

In recent years the Leeds club has been the dominant one in Yorkshire and at times has towered over the rest of the clubs in the Rugby League, having won the league championship on three occasions. In seven other seasons the club has lost in the final. Five times the League Leaders Trophy has been won. Leeds won the former Yorkshire League championship 15 times and has triumphed in the Yorkshire Cup 16 times. The Challenge Cup has been won 10 times, the League Premiership twice and the B.B.C. and John Player trophies once each.

Dipping at random in the records, some of the greatest players have included George Mosley, Cliff Evans, Gordon Brown, Eric Harris, Fred Harris, Joe Thompson, H. E. Cook, F. Webster, Dinny Campbell, Vic Hey, Drew Turnbull, Joe Brittain, Stanley Smith, and for a short spell the legendary Harry Varley of Oldham. Our own Joe Warham is now a leading official at Leeds, along with Harry Jepson, Bill Carter and one or two other celebrities.

LET'S START TO FINISH RUGBY LEAGUE'S CIVIL WAR

FOR many years prior to the formation of the British Amateur Rugby League Association in 1973, and also in the early years of the association history the amateur code had included several teams whose players although genuine amateurs were able to gain the benefit of professional club assistance.

These sides which operated at open-age level as well as in the youth leagues were used as "feeder" teams for the professional clubs, and were accepted wholeheartedly into the amateur game. At the formation of BARLA only a hand full of such teams existed, and although they had never previously been in the limelight, as soon as these sides began to win the major BARLA honours, other professional sides decided to follow the example, and amateur teams began their complaints about the assistance being given by senior clubs.

Naturally, the amateur leagues did not wish to receive an influx of such teams who would then take all the top honours, and the BARLA honours list for its early years certainly showed that this could be a possibility. The national youth cup was twice won by these teams, the youth 7-a-side championships were taken on three consecutive occasions, while in Yorkshire where almost every professionally organised amateur team existed, the county Under-19's cup went to these sides five years in succession with two finals being totally "professional".

The main complaints from their fellow amateurs was that such teams were training throughout the week at the senior club, while the players were taking part in Rugby Football League's Colts League on Saturday afternoon, with the entire side also appearing the following day in the amateur code. Unfortunately, in attempting to prevent the amateur leagues from being overrun by the progress of these sides, BARLA have possibly now become too stern on restrictions on youth players, with a ban now being placed on any youth who plays one game — even as an amateur — for a professional club's Colts or Youth team.

It is wrong for professional clubs to organise a Youth team to play in the local amateur league with R.F.L. Colts and Under-17 leagues now giving these sides an outside chance to oppose each other, while it is equally wrong for BARLA to prevent genuine amateur players from appearing in their events purely because they have tried to enhance their career.

One BARLA rule which has the backing of everyone is that no professional players be allowed to play in the amateur youth leagues, thus encouraging more youngsters to attempt the game and thus causing the present disupute between the R.F.L. and BARLA to be concerning genuine amateur players. It is perfectly understandable that professional clubs wish to attract the top youngsters as soon as possible, thus forming the foundation of their own youth teams, while BARLA's policy to protect their own sides can also be understood. However, is is surely of more benefit to the game itself if the youngsters were able to play Rugby League Football twice in a weekend instead of the present situation where many apply their talents to other sports on the day when they are banned from the 13-a-side code.

To allow this to occur the R.F.L. Colts and Youth leagues should naturally operate on Saturdays with the BARLA Youth games taking place the following day, and with the amateur organisation allowing all genuine players to appear. however, to prevent the previous situation where an entire team of amateurs could play together on both days BARLA could simply introduce a ruling where an amateur side could only field a total of three amateur players who are also on the books of a senior club. Thus no single team would be gaining the benefit of these more experienced players, who themselves could pass on their knowledge to their fellow amateurs.

The question of representative honours could also be easily overcome by BARLA having the pick of all the youngsters who are registered with any amateur team, and with the R.F.L. choosing the county and international sides from professional players or any amateurs who do not also appear in the local leagues. Although such solutions might not solve all the current problems, it could at least go part of the way to healing the split which, if it remains open, will eventually only bring harm to the entire game of rugby league football.


