TODAY'S VISITORS

HALIFAX AGAIN

TODAY's game against Halifax at Watersheddings should not only be one of the best Second Division matches of the season but it will give us a chance to revenge for the beating we took at Thrum Hall a few weeks ago - the first of only two defeats we have suffered in the league.

Things have not gone too well for Halifax since they beat us at Thrum Hall and then, seven days later, travelled down to South Wales and pulled off a memorable 31-21 win against Cardiff at Ninian Park.

Mick Blacker and Co had every reason to be well satisfied at those two results but they were to be the forerunner of a surprising mini-slump which saw Halifax lose three successive games - two of them in the Second Division.

Goalkicking centre Malcolm Agar broke his thumb at Cardiff and his loss seemed to upset things in the Halifax camp.

Humberside giants Hull turned on a magnificent display of pace and power to win a firstround John Player Trophy tie quite comfortably at Thrum Hall and in the next match, against Swinton, Halifax were made to pay dearly for missed chances early on and again slipped to defeat against the Second Division's "form" side.

So to a trip to Bramley a fortnight ago - and yet another set-back for a side that one might have expected to be in with a big shout for the Second Division title.

The month of November is certainly a crucial one for Halifax. Last Sunday they were at home to more promotion rivals in Workington and today they come to Watersheddings, no doubt determined to try and complete the "double".

Agar was due to return to the side against Workington after a lengthy lay-off but winger Mick O'Byrne damaged his cheek bone at Bramley and he now faces an absence of several weeks after a facial operation.

His place on the flank has gone to Graham Hirst, who is expected to keep the wing spot today, with Graham Garrod back at stand-off and Agar slotting into the centre spot Garrod has been holding down during his absence.

In a few recent games Hunslet stand-off Steve Lane has been wearing the Halifax No. 6 shirt while on trial at Thrum Hall but the powers-that-be have decided not to pursue their interest and Lane has been transferred back to Hunslet.

Halifax possess a strong and experienced side with player-coach Mick Blacker now operating at full back and his right-hand man, Terry Langton, still providing sterling service at the base of the scrum.

The Oldham forwards will not need reminding that prop Alan Ackroyd and front-row man Tony Garforth had great games in the previous clash between the sides at Halifax and that second-row man Dave Callon scored two tries.

If last week's pack formation against the Cumbrians is any guide, Garforth could be in the second-row today with George Standidge, who was on holiday in Malta when the teams last met, holding down the No. 10 shirt.

Halifax have slipped a few places down the table with those Second Division defeats by Swinton and Bramley and they will be keen to boost their top-four challenge today by trying to inflict the double on their old enemy from the other side of the hill.



FINANCIAL SUCCESS

RUGBY LEAGUE chief Bill Oxley enjoyed that warm glow of satisfaction that comes after successfully sticking out one's neck.

Chairman Oxley was making his way North after the Wales-England clash in the first League international at Cardiff's Ninian Park.

He was also ready to admit to a sense of relief after 8,102 fans had paid just below £13,000 to justify the League's gamble in going back to South Wales for an international.

As the man who had tipped the scales with the decision which met with plenty of criticism he enjoyed watching the crowd show their appreciation of an entertaining clash.

"I spoke to quite a few people taking their first look at Rugby League and others who had seen the odd game before," Oxley told me afterwards.

"They expressed the view that they had thoroughly enjoyed themselves. They were impressed with the sort of football they saw and the spirit in which it was played.

"They compared the game favourably to Rugby Union and will, I am confident, be back for more."

League official David Howes stressed afterwards that the League were hoping there would be a spin off from this game for Second Division Cardiff City.

It seems that the League were left with around £3,000 clear after expenses had been met but it was obviously more than a slight financial success if you take the long term view.

With the prospect of further Rugby Union recruits coming into the game the climate could be just right for the staging of a Wales-Australia game next season.

"If the recruitment of Rugby Union players continues along present lines then we have to consider the possibility of taking the Australians to Cardiff for an international," confirmed chairman Oxley.

I was one of those who feared that with a full League programme in the North we might have to be satisfied with a crowd of around 5,000 at Ninian Park.

There is surely a great chance now of topping five figures for a well presented Wales-Australia game early next season and even the possibility of playing a game at Fulham's Craven Cottage.

The Londoners have a steady following and there are enough Aussies living around the capital to swell a crowd for say an Under 24 international against the Kangaroos or a club match.

A SHORT HISTORY OF HALIFAX R.L.F.C.

THE "Halifax Guardian" of November 1st, 1873, contained an advertisement which read, "Persons desirous of joining a Football and Athletic Club are requested to meet on Thursday next, November 6th, at 8.30 p.m. at the Upper George Hotel." The prime movers were few in number, only eight attending the meeting but two more attended a fortnight later. A. Walsh was appointed captain, M. Brown vice-captain and A. Nicholl secretary.

The first match took place at Leeds on November 21st when Halifax fielded two backs, one three-quarter, two halves and nine forwards. It was customary to have such a back division. Halifax played in their ordinary clothes as their strip had not arrived in time. Leeds won by six tries to one touchdown by Halifax but as only goals counted, the result was adjudged to be a draw.

During the first season Halifax normally played practice games and the first home game was on Boxing Day 1874 when Halifax scored one try and three touchdowns to one try and one touchdown by Wakefield Trinity. A touchdown was when the defending side made the ball dead by touching down. A dead ball was when the attacking side made the ball dead. The other minor points of those days were awarded or claimed when the ball went into touch in goal.

After using two or three grounds a move was made to Hanson Lane in 1876 and James Dodd played his first match in the first match played on the ground and never appeared in a losing Halifax team on the ground.

In 1877 the first final for the Yorkshire Cup (T'Owd Tin Pot) was played at Holbeck and Halifax, after defeating Wakefield, Wakefield Trinity and Bradford met York in the final for the cup which was valued at 50 guineas. Halifax won by one goal, one try, seven touchdowns and one touch in goal to nil. Between the original Halifax club and the Rugby Union club which was formed later, Halifax had won the cup 16 times by 1978.

When the Rugby Football League was formed under its original title of Northern Union, Halifax was among the first 22 clubs. The club won the Northern League championship in 1902-03, 1906-07 and 1964-65. The Rugby League Challenge Cup has been won in 1902-03, 1903-04, 1930-31 and 1938-39. The Yorkshire Cup has been won five times and the Yorkshire League championship on four occasions.

Early stars were Rigg, Joe and Jack Riley, Toothill, Bartle and Winskill. Later players included Oldham's Arthur Smith, Frank Williams, T. H. Grey, Beames, Langhorn, Willie Metcalfe, Asa Robinson and Stuart Prosser.

In the 1960s we saw Colin Freeman, Johnny Burnett, Stan Keilty, Ken Roberts, Terry Fogerty, Barry Robinson, Charlie Renilson and Jack Scoby among others while directors Lingard and Bill Hughes (the club secretary for 30 years) helped to keep the club in the top echelons of the game.

Like Oldham the club gradually declined and support dwindled but happily a resurgence has taken place and the club is improving each season since a disastrous John Player Cup defeat by Hull junior side, Cawoods.

Like Oldham the club descended from the first division at the end of last season and no doubt the lads from Thrum Hall will be keenly contesting this year's promotion struggle.

Last year Jimmy Birts kicked over a hundred goals but he has since left for Wigan. Mick Scott has gone with him. The Halifax directors are steadily building up a side whichwill restore their playing fortunes, in spite of such departures.



AMATEUR RUGBY LEAGUE FINAL AT BOUNDARY PARK

ANOTHER piece of BARLA history will be made in Oldham next Sunday when local amateur team Saddleworth Rangers take on one of the code's giants Leigh Miners Welfare in the final of the BARLA Lancashire-Cumbria Cup, and with the match to be played at Boundary Park – the home of Oldham Athletic Football Club (3 p.m.)

Having qualified for their first appearance in the County Final since they defeated Roose of Barrow in the 1963 decider, Saddleworth won the draw for the choice of venue, although the Oldham senior club were unable to stage the fixture due to prior commitments. Officials of Saddleworth and the Oldham League therefore met with the local professional soccer club to discuss the possibility of erecting rugby posts at Boundary Park and re-marking the playing area. Athletic, obviously aware that a similar procedure has already been successfully operated at Cardiff City, Carlisle and Fulham, immediately agreed to the local amateurs' requests, and will thus host the first ever Amateur Rugby League game to be played on a professional soccer ground.

Saddleworth and Leigh Miners are among the best supported amateur sides in the country, and with many people also expected to attend because of the novelty of having rugby posts at Boundary Park, local league officials are confidently expecting a large crowd. Both teams are also currently in excellent form, with Rangers having gained their Cup Final place with an away victory in Warrington against Crosfields, who themselves had put out trophy holders Pilkingtons in the quarter-finals. The two sides are also among the challengers for their respective Premier Division Championships, with Saddleworth competing inthe Pennine League and Leigh Miners playing their fixtures in the North-West Counties League, while both clubs also organise extremely successful youth teams.

The ingenuity of the local amateurs and the co-operation of Oldham Athletic has already sent a wave of excitement through the Amateur League world, while the venture will no doubt also be carefully assessed by Athletic's fellow professional soccer clubs.

Several players from both Saddleworth and Leigh Miners met last month when the Oldham League's open-age town-team travelled to meet the Leigh League in the BARLA openage Inter-town competition. Although that game ended in victory for Leigh, who therefore went into the quarter-finals as winners of the qualifying group, which also included Manchester and Rochdale, the Oldham town-team will also be involved in the next stages of the event. Oldham have won through as one of the two best runners-up by virtue of their high scoring record, and will now visit Humberside in the quarter-finals.

All three Oldham town-team outfits have therefore gained a place in the last eight of their respective Inter-League tournaments, with the under-19s now at home to Huddersfield, and the under-17s playing hosts to Warrington. The under-19s, who are defending the trophy they won last season, were scheduled to play their game next Sunday, although that has now been postponed due to the County Cup Final at Boundary Park, while the under-17s play their match on Sunday, December 13th.


