



We met Town in a cup-tie here two years ago and that was a real cracker with the Cumbrians being inspired off the field by our former player Ike Southward and their then manager Tommy Bishop, whose son Gary is now a signed professional for Oldham.

Last Sunday saw us stage the return under-24 international between Great Britain and France at Watersheddings when Britain were again under the helm of our coach Frank Myler and when three of our players, Terry Flanagan, Ray Ashton and Andy Goodway represented their country for the second time in a fortnight.

HISTORICAL NOTES ON ST. HELENS

"Herman the German" is probably the best known man to settle in St. Helens. He worked at Pilkington's Glass Works and to him is given the credit for founding the St. Helens Rugby Football Club. His advice to early players has been recorded and often quoted. Here it is again. "It does not really matter whether you win or lose. What does matter is that you play the game—and enjoy yourselves".

Another account of the founding of the club is not generally accepted. A gang of local lads used to watch "the young gentlemen's team" play rugby at Dentons Green. One day a visiting team failed to arrive so the locals formed the opposition. After the local team was defeated they presented the youngsters with the tackle, the ground and the goalposts.

However, Herr Herman is supposed to have founded the club in 1870. In those days there were few accounts of matches but by 1875 the club was playing at Littler's Field, then later at the Bishop Road ground.

It was not until 1890 that the Saints moved to Knowsley Road. The enclosure was described as just a field with the stewards taking pay at pigeon holes in the fencing at the Eccleston end. No doubt this procedure was adopted after troubles with collections at previous grounds. Before the game started the club sent men round with collecting boxes. In due course it was realised that the spectators waited until the boxes had been round before getting near to the playing field. Then it was decided to take the collections at half time which meant greatly increased takings.

In those long forgotten days under the Rugby Union banner, St. Helens played Werneth, Rochdale St. Clements, Crompton and Mossley before reaching the standard of the Oldham club.

St. Helens players were a cosmopolitan lot as they included foreign workers who were employed by Pilkingtons. A Frenchman, Le Petton was once captain, and Irishmen, one Scot and one Welshman joined the local lads in forming the team.

In the early days at Knowsley Road the cost of fencing the ground was £101 6s. The rent was £30 per annum and on a good day the gate receipts varied from £20 to £40. By 1953 gates of over £2,500 had been achieved with a season's gross receipts amounting to around £30,000.

One famous player was the Rev. C. M. Chavasse who was a curate in an Anglican church in St. Helens. He played wing-threequarter and scored three tries in six games in season 1910-11. In 1908 he had contested the 400 metres race in the Olympic Games. In due course he became the Lord Bishop of Rochester.

Another speedster was Matt Creevey who was champion over 70 yards. Alf Ellabu was a yard outside evens. Halfpenny was a yard or two slower than Ellaby but was still fast. Over 120 yards Tom Barton, who played in the Challenge Cup final at Watersheddings in 1915, was the fastest man for miles around. He won the professional championship at Leigh in 1910 over 100 yards in ten and one-fifth seconds. Over 120 yards he was faster still. He success at Leigh was quite remarkable as the race was open to allcomers from anywhere in the British Isles.

It may seem strange to followers today that Saints were once one of the poor relations. John W. ("Jack"), Manchester was sold by Saints to Hunslet in a bid to restore the club's financial position. When the club decided to become a limited company in 1937 the response to applications for the £5,000 share capital was disappointing but eventually the sum was raised.

THE SAINTS COME MARCHING IN

IT is always a pleasure to welcome St. Helens to Watersheddings. Over the years, the Saints have set and maintained high standards of Rugby League football at the other end of the East Lancs Road.

We have already had two cracking games against them at Knowsley Road this season, drawing 15-15 in a pre-season friendly and losing 20-15 in a First Division fixture there last September.

In the highly-competitive First Division, matches are often won and lost due to one incident late in the game. At Warrington two weeks ago, we might have won but for Green Vigo being recalled for off-side when he chased an Ashley McEwen kick in the late stages with the scores level at 12-12.

There was a similar incident in our league defeat at Knowsley Road when, in the dying minutes, Vigo got over the Saints line for a try that might have levelled the scores only to be pulled back for a forward pass.

In the pre-season friendly, we were leading 8-5 at half-time and in the final reckoning Saints owed much to teenage substitute Andy Platt, who came on and scored two second-half tries.

By a strange twist of fate, Platt might well be playing again for Saints today because regular loose-forward Harry Pinner has been struggling lately with leg and shoulder injuries.

He could not play last week-end against Hull KR, so young Platt, who went to France with Great Britain colts three weeks ago, could well be wearing the No. 13 jersey.

Saints have had a good run lately and when you weigh up the talent they have available it is not difficult to see why.

Welshman Clive Griffiths, who in the past has made a habit of doing it on Oldham, either with his goalkicking or linking up, is now restored in the Saints No. 1 jersey, having seen first John Butler and then Brian Parkes holding down the position earlier in the season.

Young speed men Barrie Ledger and Kevin Meadows have been operating on the wings. Meadows, another former GB colt, scored a hat-trick of tries for Lancashire against Cumbria at Workington at the back end of last season and is always a dangerous and elusive runner.

Ledger, son of former Saints player Eric Ledger, is probably the fastest man on the Knowsley Road books. He has made steady and continued progress this season and looks capable of holding down a wing place for Saints for many seasons to come.

Parkes and Roy Haggerty, who was last week-end called up into Frank Myler's Great Britain under-24 squad, are probably in line for the centre positions, though there could be a place for former under-24 international Chris Arkwright, another well-known son of a famous father, who made his comeback last week in the "A" team after an injury lay-off.

At half-back could possibly be the experienced Peter Glynn and the pacy scrum-half Neil Holding, a player whom Oldham's Ray Ashton has kept out of the under-24 reckoning this season.

Holding has been in good form lately, both as an attacker and a defender, and it was his pace, as much as anything else which caused Oldham problems in the two games at Knowsley Road.

Few sides possess such a big front-row as that provided by Mel James, Graham Liptrot and Paul Grimes. The last-named has been a revelation since his signing from Whitehaven, for he has recently been named man-of-the-match for Saints on four separate occasions.

Cumbrian Peter Gorley, a hard tackler and forager in the typical Cumbrian mould, and Gary Moorby, a strong, fast and direct runner, form a well-balanced second-row.

The strength of Saints' front-row was evident in their recent win over Barrow when they won the scrums to the tune of 20-4.



Great Britain will travel to France on February 20 facing the task of lifting themselves off the bottom of the international pile.

With Australia on top of the world and New Zealand their closest rivals we have to make up for lost ground by proving we are better than the French.

I know we whipped them at The Boulevard last season but it was not long before France were

cock-a-hoop at giving us a caning in Marseille.

And the French showed in holding Australia to 15-4 in the First Test that they are a well drilled force, even more so now that the brilliant Joel Roosebrouc has resumed his international career.

I think the French will have learnt something from the Aussies trip and they proved their enthus-

iasm by sending over coach Louis Bonnery to check on the games in this country.

There is growing evidence that Rugby Union is eager to learn from the Kangaroos tour and they could even leave us behind in this respect for their presentation of international games is something to be envied.

England Under 23 Rugby Union coach Dick Greenwood says: 'Video of the three Great Britain-

Australia internationals should be compulsive viewing for every Rugby Union player.

Steve Smith, England and Sale skipper, whose club claim to play League in training, not only videoed the Tests but managed to see a couple of the tour games.

He was greatly impressed with the tackling and said: 'It is something we don't work on at all in

'The Aussies go forward to meet the player and they stop him dead in his tracks. They hit him with the shoulder and drive through.

Leicester's coach Chalky White said: 'They've developed a game that gives the athletic player full

'They are runners rather than scrummagers and it underlines the artificial and sentimental way in

which rugby sides are selected.'

Lancashire's Des Seabrook has been highly impressed by the preparation of the Aussies and talks of "simple moves with straight lines of running done with great skill and pace".

If ever rugby needed proof that a try is worth a minimum of four points it was demonstrated in games 1,000 miles apart and in the different codes.

When Rugby Union decided to make the switch from three to four points it was certainly a sound

one in my view.

Yet I still think they have got the scoring values wrong after the England-France encounter at Twickenham.

Fortunately for France their magnificent attacking play brought them three tries and 12 of their

But England still managed to get 15 points from four penalties and a drop goal and might have had

more from this source but for Dusty Hare's erratic kicking. All this suggests that Union would be better devaluing the penalty goal and the drop goal by a

point to get a fairer balance in their scoring system. The day after the Twickenham clash we had the Great Britain Under 24 side showing in Carpentras

a clear superiority over the French. It was superb rugby that brought winger Garry Clark his hat-trick of tries along with touchdowns

for Ronnie Duane and John Fieldhouse. Those tries were worth only three points giving Britain a 19-5 win but next season will be different

when we get the four-point touchdown in Rugby League. I felt Britain had deserved to win by a greater margin with skipper Terry Flanagan and stand off

Tony Myler repeatedly opening up the French defence.

It looks as if Myler in this mood will challenge strongly for a full cap in the full international against France at Carcassonne on February 20.

Hooker Brian Noble confirmed his ranking as the top candidate for the game even though St. Helens star Graham Liptrot is back to form.

Noble blended in well with props Mike O'Neill and Andy Goodway and this trio did a sound job. The second row of John Fieldhouse and Mick Worrall revealed promise for the future as did Flanagan's flair.


