

HISTORICAL NOTES ON WORKINGTON TOWN By Tom Webb

Just before the end of the second world war a move was started to establish a senior Rugby League club in Workington. Workington Town were elected to membership of the Northern Rugby Football League for season 1945-46. In that first season Town won 16 and lost the other 20 of their league matches, scoring 62 goals and 78 tries, 358 points in all while conceding 53 goals and 105 tries, or 421 points. The club finished 19th out of the 28 clubs. In the games with Oldham Town lost 6-3 at Watersheddings but won the

return game in Cumberland by 11-0.

In the Lancashire Cup Workington beat St. Helens 9-8 at home in the first leg but by virtue of losing 21-11 in the second leg, lost on aggregate 29-20. Although disappointed that the club was ousted from the cup because of the two-leg system, Town were pleased about it when the Challenge Cup came round. In the first leg of the first round Sharlston Rovers, then the oldest junior club in Yorkshire, beat the senior side by 12-7. A 16-2 win in the second leg before a crowd of ten thousand took the club to the second round. At this stage a trip to St. Helens was not a very promising prospect but a 13-6 victory took the club into the last eight. However Wakefield Trinity won the third round tie at Belle Vue by 14-4 when there was an attendance of fifteen thousand.

Stan Hayton and Hedley Rodgers played in 40 of the 42 games played in that first season and other regular players included George Jepson, Bill Irving, Jimmy Hayton, Dennis Cavanagh, Cyril Hughes, Barker (sorry I haven't the first name), Albert Pepperell, William S. Askew, Billy Jackson, Stan Inglesfield, Billy Holding, Harry Bradshaw and Jock Carr. Ned Hodgson the former Oldham favourite also played in many games as did

Watson, Studholme, Billy Miller, Alvin Ackerley and Joe Shearman.

Thanks to Bill Glaister, the Workington statistician who borrowed my records and lent me those that he had, I have virtually complete records of Workington Town apart from

substitute details which are really hard to complete.

Bill researched Gus Risman's playing career from his signing by Salford for £25 down, £1 a week for a year and £25 at the end of the year. From 1928-29 to 1954-55 when he was with Batley, Gus kicked 1,704 goals and scored 231 tries. With Salford he kicked a century of goals in a season on five occasions and accomplished the same feat three times for Workington Town, for whom he kicked 721 goals and ran in 33 tries. His association with Workington Town covered 1946-47 to 1953-54 inclusive and there were some great achievements by the club in that period. The Championship was won in 1950-51 and the Challenge Cup was won in 1952, a wonderful achievement for a club with such a short life at that stage. Other honours have come along since, of course.

Paul Charlton's career was also researched by Bill Glaister, and Paul too played for both Salford and Town, although at different periods. He made a grand total of 708 appearances with 225 tries and 88 goals to his credit. He made 413 of those appearances for Town for whom he scored over 100 tries and all but a couple of his goal kicks were

taken for Town.

Oldham paid Workington a record fee for the services of Ike Southward and when he made the reverse journey a record fee was again paid, Town adding £2.50 to the existing record of £11,000 paid by Wigan to St. Helens for the transfer of Mike Sullivan.

Ike Southward made 373 appearances for Town scoring 302 goals and 272 tries, and 53 appearances for Oldham in which he scored 55 tries. He also made half a dozer appearances for Whitehaven. His greatest scoring achievement was in 1957-58 when he ran in 45 tries and landed 80 goals.

WELCOME TO TOWN

IKE SOUTHWARD, the former Oldham wing-threequarter, continues to take charge of today's visitors, Workington Town, until the arrival next week-end of coach Dave Cox from Australia.

Dave, who coached here a year or two ago, was appointed to succeed Paul Charlton last month and he is due to arrive in London from Sydney next week-end, possibly in time to watch Town in a tough First Division match at Widnes.

We have already beaten the Cumbrians twice this season, but it took a desperate, last-ditch tackle by full back Alan Taylor to give us a narrow 8-4 win at Derwent Park last October. Two months later, Town came to Watersheddings and shocked us with a late rally. In the end we won, but only 24-19.

The Cumbrians have found the going tough in the First Division this season. But three weeks ago they showed what they are capable of on opponents' grounds when they had a good win at Halifax. Their inconsistency was shown up the following week when they lost 50-0 at Leeds.

The Cumbrians are well known to us because, as well as coming out of the Second Division with us at the end of last season, we also met them here at Watersheddings two seasons ago in the Challenge Cup.

At full back Lyn Hopkins is one of the most prolific goalkickers in the game, and when they snatched him from the Welsh valleys, Town certainly found a ready-made successor as marksman to Oldhamer lain MacCorqudale. We can afford to give away no penalties with Hopkins around in what could be a tight cup-tie.

Ian Thompson and John Beattie are strong, young centres, Brian Hutchinson will probably play on the right-wing, and David Beck may turn out on the left. There are not many wingers who finish so strongly as Beck when in full flight.

Colin Todd and Howard Burns are the regular Town half-backs.

Todd, you may recall, attracted some Oldham interest earlier in the season, but nothing materialised. Burns, his partner, is highly thought of in Cumbria and there were many disappointed League fans up there when Ray Ashton was named at No. 7 in the Great Britain under-24 side to play France recently.

Burns will certainly need no motivating today when he not only plays against Ashton, but also in front of the Great Britain boss, our own Frank Myler.

The Pattinson brothers have for long formed the backbone of the Town pack and both are likely to be on view today, international Billy at loose-forward and Bobby in the second-row.

Choice of hooker will rest between John Lightfoot and John Banks.

Alf McCarron has switched successfully from back-row to prop, while the No. 10 job may go to one of a couple of lesser-known Cumbrian forwards, Gary Nixon or Colin Falcon.

Partnering Bobby Pattinson in the second-row may be Ian Hartley.

At the time of writing, Town had won only three and drawn one of their First Division matches. But in the first round of the Challenge Cup not much importance must be attached to that. Town need a good cup run to compensate for their disappointments in the league — and that will probably be reflected in their performance.

Cox has spent the last two years in Sydney, during which time he has been studying Australian methods of coaching, training and match preparation. By a strange twist of fate he goes to Cumbria less than a season after the departure of former Great Britain scrumhalf star Tommy Bishop, who also crossed the world to take control at Derwent Park.







It will be a long time before Australia's record breaking tour begins to fade from the memory . . . but there is no need for any Rugby League fan to forget their feats.

That magnificent 1982 tour has been captured on video by the Leeds based firm of Telvista Tele-

vision - two hours of nonstop action.

This cassette should not only be a top seller Down Under with the fans, players and officials but should be compulsory viewing for everyone interested in the game in this country.

The film embraces the Kangaroos' arrival, the views of British officials and their Australian rivals as

the programme unfolds and gathers momentum with every triumphant display.

Not only the Test series but all the club games are covered as well as behind-the-scenes glimpses of

the tourists at work and play.

If I had a slight criticism of the tape it would be that we might have had a little more of some of the more closely fought encounters like the club games against Wigan, Hull and Widnes, plus more of

I think we could have done without some of the runaway performances which tend to bring a repetitive look as we get try after try and missed tackle after missed tackle.

I would also have liked to have seen a little more of the Aussies preparing for the Tests and heard more from their coach Frank Stanton on his coaching techniques.

It might also have been a good idea to have had an interview with a top Aussie player on the general scene at club level back in Sydney and his general approach to the game.

The one feature in which the tape succeeds is that it has put on record a performance which may never be repeated.

Producer Bob Jones points out that this is only the start by Telvista and they are naturally seeking to lift standards as they go along.

It was obviously a difficult task editing 25 hours of action into a two hour showing.

But from all those hours of action there will be two further cassettes with Phil Larder working on Coaching and former top official Joe Manley on Refereeing.

'I think this step is a great one for the game and there is some tremendous rugby recorded for the sport', says League official David Howes.

It is amazing how fate in sport provides many ironic twists and there is no better example than in

the 1983 State Express Challenge Cup competition. Take the first round encounter between Widnes and Leeds those deadly rivals or the probability of a Wigan-Castleford clash if the former club triumphs, as expected, over Cardiff in the preliminary

It was Widnes, who removed Leeds from the Wembley trail last season with a dramatic, last gasp score in the semi-final that lived on in the memory for months. Then we had Leeds sampling revenge recently in the John Player semi-finals when they also took

umbrage at Widnes tactics which gives this tie added flavour.

Let's hope though that this next clash lives up to expectations as a classic and certainly Widnes

will be out to put the record straight on several counts. The prospect of having Castleford as opponents at Central Park will whet the appetite of Wigan

boss Alex Murphy. He has taken Wigan to John Player success across the Pennines and to a handsome home League

win but I am sure, if these sides do meet, he won't be looking back to those results. He won't forget the experience of Leigh, when he was in charge at Hilton Park last season. They

fell in the Cup to Mal Reilly's men who gave a magnificent display of Cup fighting.

Apart from these mouth watering morsels the first round draw has not captured the imagination in many areas.

A fine derby clash is in prospect between Salford and Leigh in Lancashire, Huddersfield and Halifax in Yorkshire and in Cumbria, where Barrow tackle Whitehaven.

It is First Division v. Second Division on top of the Cup ingredient so this will provide added spice. St. Helens won't underestimate Carlisle even though they seem to be well on the way back because

the Cumbrians will be anxious to salvage something from a barren season. Blackpool Borough will be hoping that Hull fans will be in the mood to make the marathon trip

as their club bid to return to Wembley.

Hunslet must feel they can also enjoy a much higher gate than normal with the attractive visit of Hull KR, another club who can claim stronger support than most.




