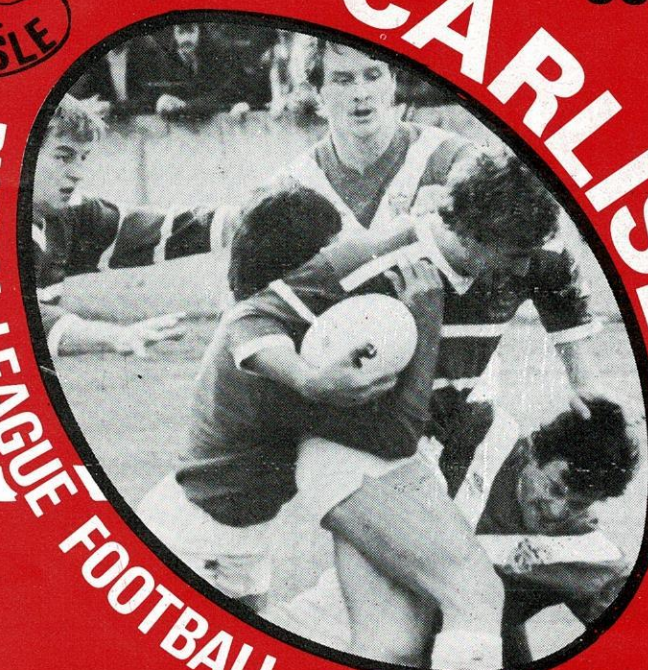

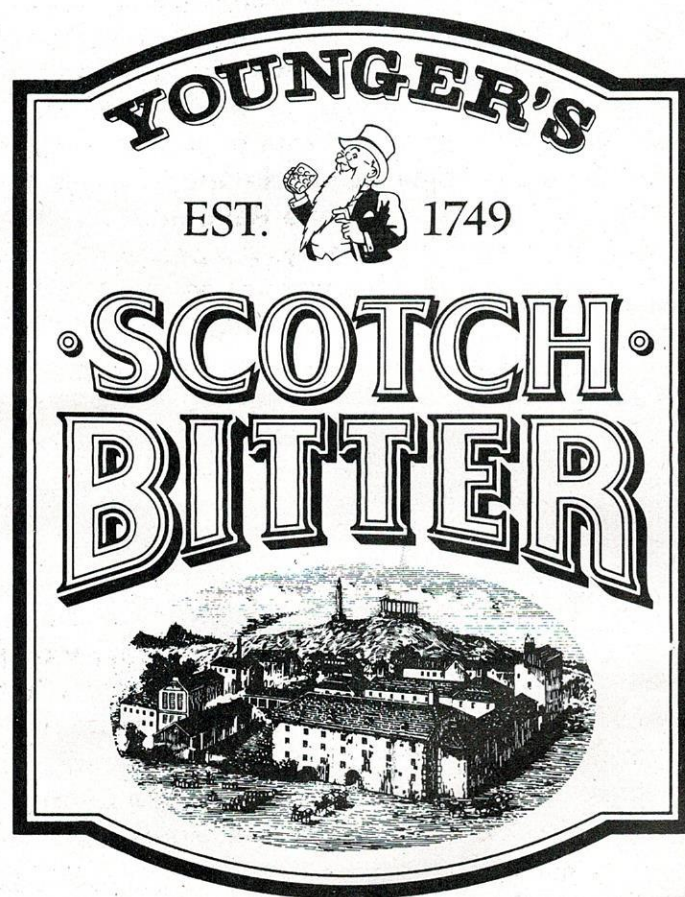

TRUMANN'S MAN OF STEEL

FIRST BALLOT 1982-83

Great Britain veteran half-back JOHN HOLMES and STEVE NASH are the halfway stage leaders in the Trumann's Man of Steel First and Second Division Player of the Year Award ballots. The First and Second Division Player of the Year Awards are determined by a twin ballot of the players in each Division in January and April. The players select their top three who receive five, three, and one points respectively. The eventual winner of the Trumann's Player of the Year Award receives £350, a £200 silver memento, and a framed citation, plus the opportunity to be considered for the prestigious Trumann's Man of Steel title with a £1,000 cash prize and a £350 silver memento.

In the First Division ballot, HOLMES, the king-pin of the Leeds title bid this season, is closely challenged by a group of players who also represented Great Britain in the recent Dominion Insurance Test series with Australia. His rivals include, in alphabetical order, Hull loose-forward MICK CRANE, Leigh wingman DES DRUMMOND, Warrington's try scoring ace BOB ECCLES, Headingley colleague DAVE HERON, and Bradford Northern full-back KEITH MUMBY.

In the Second Division ballot, NASH, whose career is under threat because of an eye injury, is being chased by the following players, again in alphabetical order: DAVID ALLEN (Fulham), JOHN BUCKTON (Doncaster), TOMMY DAVID (Cardiff City), MIKE LAMPKOWSKI (Wakefield Trinity), and GARY SMITH (York).

The 7th presentation of the Trumann's Man of Steel Award ceremony will be staged in May on a date and at a venue to be announced shortly.

BOB ECCLES:

BOB ECCLES has an excellent chance of breaking the try scoring record for a forward in a season after his four tries against Bramley on Sunday. The Warrington second rower is now only 11 short of the record set by BOB HAIGH, the Leeds second row forward with 40 in 1970-71.

Eccles, in fact, is scoring at a faster rate than Haigh, having scored his 29th try in Warrington's 27th match. Haigh's 29th try did not come until Leeds' 34th match. In Haigh's record breaking season, Leeds played 50 matches with his 40th try coming in the 48th game.

If Warrington got to Wembley and reached the Premiership Final, they would not play more than 46 matches barring replays.

In addition to his four tries on Sunday, ECCLES has also scored five tries in a match this season. Haigh's best match figures were a four and two three-try feats.

ECCLES has had a run of scoring tries in nine successive matches while Haigh's best try scoring run in 1970-71 was seven matches. With a minimum of 13 matches left, Eccles will have to improve on even his high-scoring rate to be in with a chance of winning Greenall Whitley's special prize of £5,000 to the first player to score 50 tries this season.

DAVID TOPLISS:-

DAVID TOPLISS's return to action after injury puts him within reach of his century of Division One tries. Hull's stand-off needs just three to become only the second non-winger to score 100 in Division One matches. At the moment, Hull K.R.'s stand-off Steve Hartley, who also scored many tries as a centre, is the only non-winger among the eight players who have totalled 100 Division One tries since the re-introduction of two Divisions in 1973-74.

TOPLISS also shares with Hartley (28) and Featherstone Rovers forward David Hobbs (19) the distinction of being the only non-winger to finish as the top scorer of Division One tries in a season. Topliss headed the list with 22 for Wakefield Trinity in 1976-77.

FRANCE v. GREAT BRITAIN AT CARCASSONNE: Sunday, 20th February, 1983

Great Britain's highest score in France since these matches were given Test Match status in 1957 was a 25-14 victory at Toulouse in that first year. The widest margin came in 1974 with a 24-5 win at Grenoble. France's full revenge did not come until last year when they had their widest victory margin of 19-2 at Marseilles.

The highest score was in Grenoble with a 24-15 win in 1959.

Although Britain have won 22 of the 36 Tests, France have the better record on their own soil with nine victories to eight and one draw. Britain, however, have won two and drawn one of three World Cup clashes in France.

Frank Myler and Dick Gemmell mark their first Test as Britain's new Coach and Manager by returning to France where they played their one Test together. That was at Perignan on 6th December, 1964 when they formed Britain's centre partnership. Wakefield Trinity's BERWYN JONES was Myler's winger while JOHN STOPFORD of Swinton was on Gemmell's left. Unfortunately it ended in an 18-8 defeat. Gemmell played in three Tests all against France while Myler played in 25 including one as substitute. He was captain nine times including the last time Britain beat Australia for the Ashes in 1970.

Widnes's Tony Myler and Andy Gregory are Britain's first pair of club half-backs since 1970. Then Castleford's Alan Hardisty and Keith Hepworth played the last of their three Tests together when Britain were beaten 37-15 at Brisbane in the First Test of 1970.

CHALLENGE CUP RUNS:

WIDNES's run of First Round successes in the Rugby League Challenge Cup ended with the 12-6 defeat by Leeds on Saturday. They have not been knocked out at this stage since 1972 when Leeds again did the trick. Saturday's defeat was also Widnes's first at home in the Challenge Cup since 1971 when they lost 14-11 to Leigh in Round Two.

Blackpool Borough's 19-11 defeat against Hull on Sunday extended their run of First Round exits to 18.

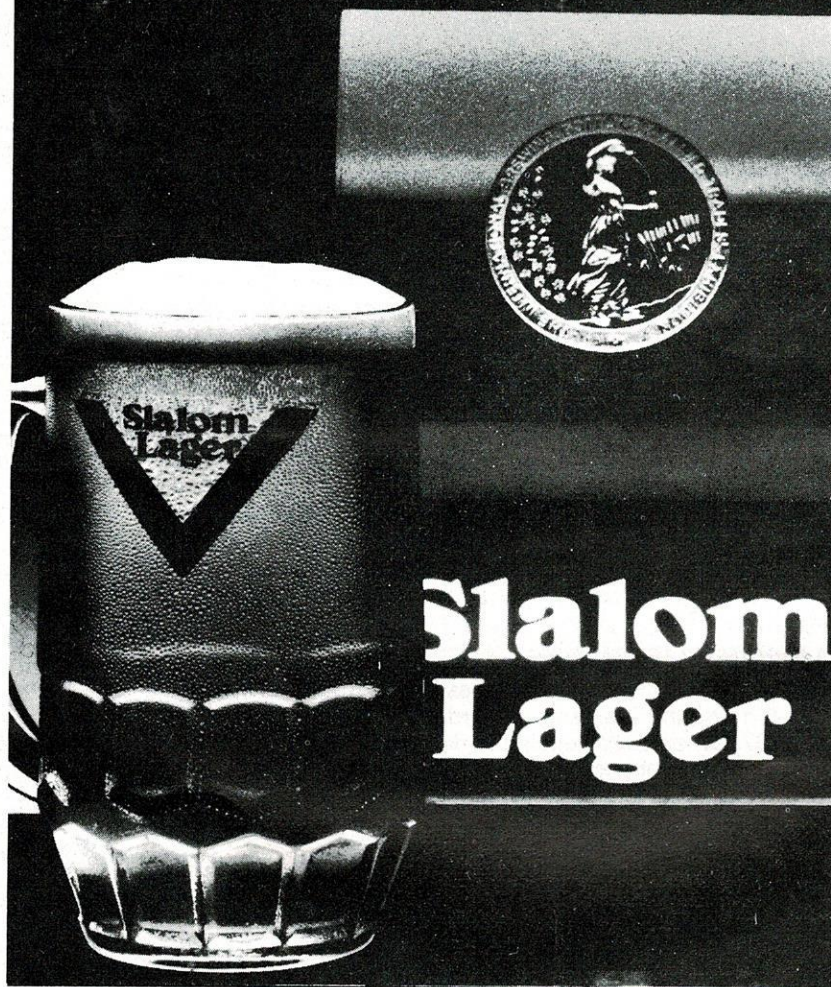
