

OLDHAM LINE-UP

Since the departure of Alan Taylor to Bermuda CHRIS WILLIS has taken over the mantle of full-back. He is 20 years old, and signed originally as a stand-off at the beginning of the season.

GREEN VIGO will be on the right flank. The South African wingman was signed this season from Swinton, after spending his early years in Rugby League with Wigan, for whom he turned professional. He has scored some remarkable tries in his career.

His centre partner should be prolific points scorer MICK PARRISH, an excellent goal-kicker who joined Oldham from Hunslet three years ago. At left centre we would expect to see TERRY BILSBURY, one of the classiest players around and who is currently on loan from Leigh in an exchange deal with Paddy Kirwan. BRIAN CAFFERY should complete the three-quarter line. Brian joined Oldham from Waterhead A.R.L. Club in 1980 and has virtually been an ever-present since.

At stand-off, and making his return to Widnes will be DES FOY, who originally joined Widnes, before returning to his home town in a deal which brought Brian Hogan to Naughton Park. His half-back partner will be another man with Widnes connections, RAY ASHTON, as he was signed from the Widnes A.R.L. and has now become one of the games most accomplished scrum halves, and the man most likely to push Andy Gregory farthest for his International place.

At open side prop will be mineworker MICK COOMBES, who it was feared a few weeks ago could be sidelined for some time with injury. Happily those fears proved unfounded and he will be adding his solid frame to the front row this afternoon. He will be supporting one of the games most experienced hookers in ALAN McCURRIE, who joined Oldham from Wakefield, for who he appeared against Widnes in the 1979 Wembley final. Before that Alan played for his home town club of Whitehaven.

Completing the front row will be MICK MORGAN, who has recently joined the Watersheddings outfit from Carlisle where he spent two seasons as player/coach. Mick is a natural ball distributor and has toured the circuit with many clubs, most noticeably with Featherstone Rovers, with whom he acquired a benefit.





Brian Batty on Rugby League

Once again British officials are left wondering whether or not it is worth continuing to play the French at international level after the ugly, violent scenes at Hull. Not that the British players were blameless by any means but it is both strange and sickening how these games between the two countries so often produce more fisticuffs than football.

Obviously the fact that the French had been allowed to get away with a spate of fouls in Carcassonne in the first encounter had a bearing on the attitude of the British players. And New Zealand referee Don Wilson, brought over at considerable expense for a fortnight, never measured up to the task just as he was below par in the Carcassonne clash when he claimed he did not know the sinbin system was in operation.

This time he used the sinbin to send three players there for five-minute spells and also called the two captains together for a general warning. But the violence called for tougher action and using the sinbin was no more punishment than slapping the players' wrists. This was the time for dismissing players and yet we had the amazing sight of French hooker Christian Macalli going through the game tripping opponents and escaping punishment.

I think this bitter clash proved that the sinbin system is a mistake and is going to cause the game more problems rather than solve any. We had a Second Division game recently when six players were sent to the sin bin and a lot of referees are now using it as a 'get out' to facing up to the proper remedy of removing players.

Yet the referees have my sympathy in one respect when they do take the necessary action the players are let off with "sending off sufficient" decisions. Surely if a player has been sent off in a game now then he must warrant collecting some punishment. Yet two players who deserved to be sent off recently in a First Division game got off after making personal appearances and another who did not appear got two matches.

It is getting beyond a joke and the whole disciplinary situation has deteriorated and will continue to do so until we resolve things and the faster the better.

STEVE DIAMOND

STEVE DIAMOND became the first player to score a century of goals this season when his five goals in Fulham's 25–25 draw against Hunslet last Sunday took his total to 104. LINDSAY ROTHERFORTH's try scoring sequence for Wakefield Trinity ended after a run of six matches.

CLIVE SULLIVAN

CLIVE SULLIVAN, the former Hull and Hull K.R. Test winger, began his new career as Doncaster's Coach by steering them to their first home win since they beat Bramley 16–13 on 11th April last year. Last Sunday's 15–12 defeat of Dewsbury ended a run of 14 matches at home without a victory. It included a draw against Batley last September. Ironically, Sullivan still holds the Hull record for most tries in a match—7 at Doncaster in 1968.

DAVID TOPLISS

DAVID TOPLISS, the Hull stand-off, needs two tries to become only the second non-winger to score 100 in Division One matches. At the moment, Hull K.R.'s stand-off Steve Hartley, who also scored many tries as a centre, is the only non-winger among the eight players who have totalled 100 Division One tries since the reintroduction of two Divisions in 1973-74.

Carlisle's JOHN ATKINSON needs two tries for a career total of 400.






They will be aiming to improve on that today, although the Chemics will be just as keen to collect the points as their visitors, following the two they picked up at
