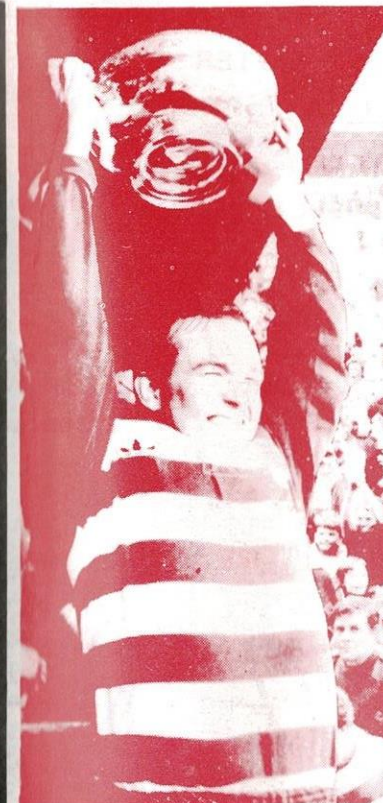

WATERSHEDDINGS SURVEY

THOSE fans who travelled to Widnes last Sunday were treated to a terrific show from an Oldham side that was full value for its 23-13 victory — our first win at Naughton Park for more than a decade.

Teamwork was the secret of our success with every man backing up and handling well on attack and the whole side moving up swiftly to tackle the Widnes men when they had the ball.

The result was that we produced some terrific football in the first half and rocked the Chemics with three lovely tries by Gary Bishop, Alan McCurrie and Mick Parrish to go into a 17-2 lead.

It must be a long time since Widnes found themselves on the wrong end of a score like that on their own Naughton Park pitch.

They hit back later to score three tries, but they never really looked like catching us. The damage had already been done and with Parrish stroking home penalty goals and both Bishop and Ray Ashton landing drop goals we managed to secure a thoroughly deserved victory.

Going off previous years the win ought to put us home and dry in the First Division for next season. Our No. 1 target this season was to get sufficient points to warrant another season in the top flight and with 26 points in the bag already and five games still to play we are well on target.

Indeed, if we can reproduce the sort of display that shocked the Chemics we will be looking for a lot more points this season to earn a place in the Premiership play off.

We are currently in seventh position with 26 points from 25 games — one point more than Leigh who are in eighth place.

Below Leigh come several clubs who are desperate for points to avoid slipping into the Second Division, but who, with a good run, could also be pressing for a top-eight place.

Over the next few weeks most of the First Division results will be important to us — both those of the teams above us and those of the teams beneath us.

We have never played in the Premiership since the introduction of two divisions ten years ago and we now have a great chance of qualifying so long as we continue to pick up points.

Our remaining matches are against Halifax at home today, Leigh away on Good Friday, Barrow at Watersheddings on Easter Monday, Wigan away on April 10, and Castleford at Watersheddings on April 17.

It promises to be a very exciting run-in to the end of the season so long as we can maintain the form of last Sunday.

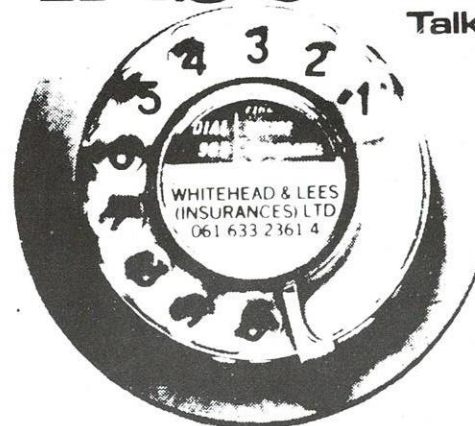

HISTORICAL NOTES ON HALIFAX

Following an advertisement in the local press on November 1st, 1873 and a couple of meetings at the Upper George Hotel, the Halifax Football Club came into being. During the first season, 1873-74, only practice matches were played. The elected officials were A. Walsh, captain, Major Brown, vice-captain and A. Nichol, secretary.

Just about a year later Halifax played its first match against Leeds Athletic Club on November 22nd, 1874 away from home. Halifax had only sixteen players and with two unavailable were compelled to play a man short, as games were fifteen-a-side those days. The game ended in a draw. Leeds Athletic Club scored six tries against one touch down by Halifax but as only goals counted, the teams finished level.

The first home game was played on December 26th, 1874 on the Halifax Trinity Cricket Club pitch which was covered with snow. Wakefield Trinity, the visitors scored one try and one touch down to one try and three touch downs by Halifax.

The Trinity ground was wanted for building purposes so Halifax moved to the Ovenden cricket ground for a spell, but as this was well out of town, and there were no tramcars, permission was obtained to play at Savile Park. Here crowds of up to four thousand were reported and men on horseback were required to keep onlookers off the pitch. In 1876 a move was made to Hanson Lane and finally the move to Thrum Hall took place ten years later.

In late December 1877 the first trophy, the Yorkshire Challenge Cup was won by Halifax. Sixteen clubs entered, Wakefield, Hull, Halifax, Mirfield, York, Bradford, Leeds, Dewsbury, Huddersfield etc., providing one or more entries. On the way to the final Halifax defeated Wakefield, Wakefield Trinity and Bradford while their rivals York accounted for Bradford Caledonians, Kirkstall (Leeds) and Hull.

It was intended to play the game at Huddersfield but on account of the depth of snow on the pitch, the committee resolved to play the game at the Holbeck Recreation Ground, now the home of Leeds United and Hunslet.

Halifax had a back (presumably full back), two threequarter backs, two half backs and ten forwards. York played two backs, two threequarter backs, two half backs and nine forwards. Halifax finally ran out winners by one goal, one try, seven touch downs and one touch-in-goal to nil, after leading by one goal, one touchdown and one touch-in-goal to nil at half time.

That was the first ever of the Yorkshire Cup and before leaving Rugby Union for Northern Union football in 1895, Halifax won the trophy on six occasions.

From very humble beginnings and only seven people at the inaugural meeting, Halifax developed into one of the leading clubs in the North of England. The first match, a practice match played on December 6th, 1873, was contested by only ten players so it must have been five-a-side. S. Duckitt who called the first meeting later became vice-president of the Yorkshire County Rugby Union.

HERE COME HALIFAX

WE have had some tremendous games against Halifax in the last few years and today's encounter may be no exception because another win today should ensure our survival in the First Division. It is as important as that.

Being realistic, Halifax must recognise that they are bound for relegation—barring a miracle—but there is much of the derby-match element about Oldham-Halifax clashes and pride alone will ensure the men from Thrum Hall give us a good run for our money today.

On the playing side many changes have taken place at Halifax in recent years. Experienced men like Mick Blacker, Ken Loxton, Jimmy Birts, and Tony Garforth have moved on.

By recruiting from local youth rugby and making one or two signings of experienced men, Halifax are building a side which, if relegated, can be expected to be among the Second Division powers next season and may well bounce back at the first attempt.

Men signed in the last couple of seasons or so include centres Malcolm Agar (from Dewsbury) and Paul Martin (Castleford), stand-off Gary Cawood (Bramley), and forwards Ian Van Bellen (Blackpool), Neil Goodwin (Wakefield), Francis Jarvis (Hunslet) and Steve Bond (Bramley).

Agar is not only a strong-running centre, but an accomplished goalkicker. Martin is a more recent signing.

Halifax have exceedingly high hopes of stand-off Gary Cawood. He is only 20 and a very good prospect indeed.

He joined Halifax early on this season as part of an exchange deal which took Garforth and Loxton to Bramley, where they teamed up once more with their former Thrum Hall boss, Maurice Bamford.

Van Bellen, the big, No. 8 forward, certainly needs no introduction. He had a good game against us in our win at Thrum Hall last autumn. Not only is he one of the biggest props in the game, but almost one of the most experienced, having seen service with Huddersfield, Castleford, Bradford, Fulham and Blackpool Borough.

Neil Goodwin once had a spell here at Watersheddings while Francis Jarvis played for Bradford and Featherstone before joining Halifax from Hunslet.

Loose-forward Steve Bond cost about £20,000 from Bramley and is one of the Halifax club's most expensive signings.

Halifax have not neglected local junior talent, however, and in today's game there could be several players who have come up through the ranks of colts and "A" team football.

Among the lesser-known players will be full back Steve Smith, right-winger Bob Priestley, possibly scrum-half Nigel Marshall and forwards Greg Sharpe, Brett Greenwood and Steve Laws.

Marshall is another promising youngster at Thrum Hall and the No. 7 shirt will probably go to either him or to the vastly-experienced club skipper Terry Langton.

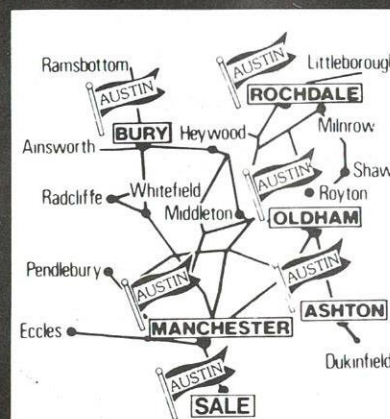
Graham Garrodd and Keith Waites in the backs and Nigel Whitehouse, at No. 9, will probably complete a squad of players who will be keen to halt our bid to finish in the top eight.

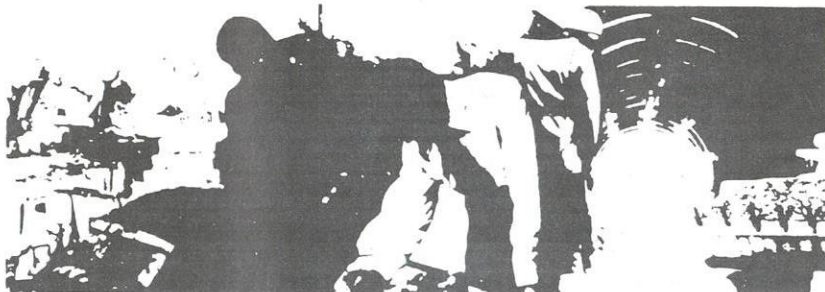

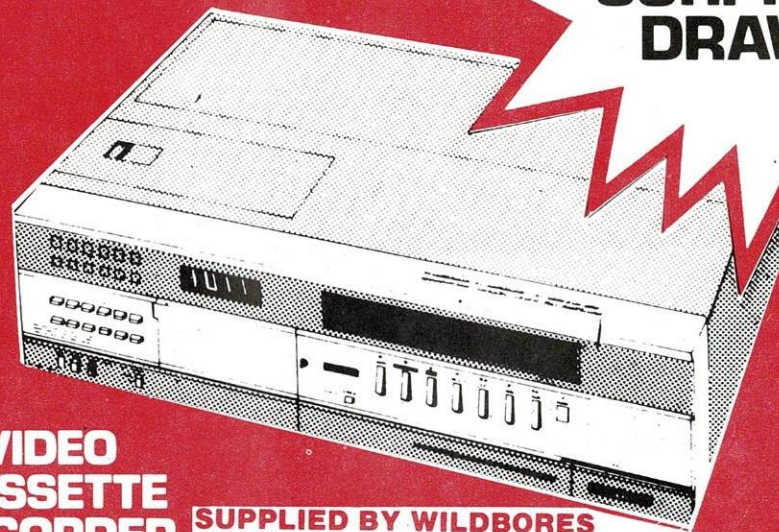

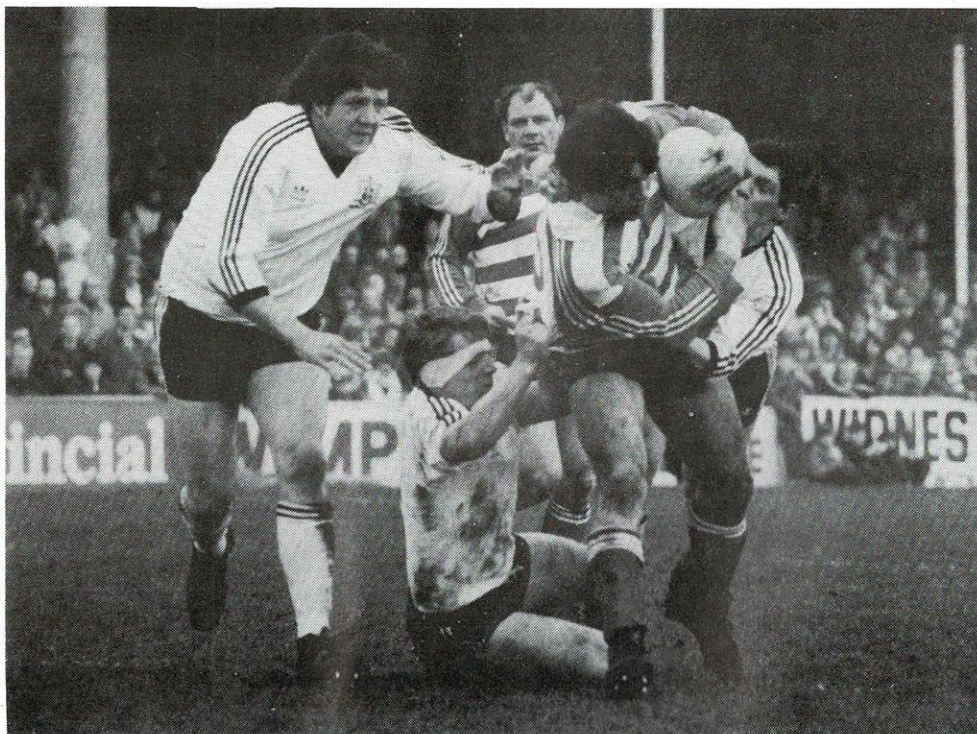

Once again British officials are left wondering whether or not it is worth continuing to play the French at international level after the ugly, violent scenes at Hull.

Not that the British players were blameless by any means but it is both strange and sickening how these games between the two countries so often produce more fisticuffs than football.

Obviously the fact that the French had been allowed to get away with a spate of fouls in Carcassonne in the first encounter had a bearing on the attitude of the British players.

And New Zealand referee Don Wilson, brought over at considerable expense for a fortnight, never measured up to the task just as he was below par in the Carcassonne clash when he claimed he did not know the sinbin system was in operation.

This time he used the sinbin to send three players there for five-minute spells and also called the two captains together for a general warning.

But the violence called for tougher action and using the sinbin was no more punishment than slapping the players' wrists.

This was the time for dismissing players and yet we had the amazing sight of French hooker Christian Macalli going through the game tripping opponents and escaping punishment.

I think this bitter clash proved that the sinbin system is a mistake and is going to cause the game more problems rather than solve any.

We had a Second Division game recently when six players were sent to the sinbin and a lot of referees are now using it as "get out" to facing up to the proper remedy of removing players.

Yet the referees have my sympathy in one respect when they do take the necessary action and the disciplinary make a mockery of things and let players off with sending off sufficient decisions.

Surely if a player has been sent off in a game now then he must warrant collecting some punishment.

Yet two players who deserved to be sent off recently in a First Division game got off after making personal appearances and another who did not appear got two matches.

It is getting beyond a joke and the whole disciplinary situation has deteriorated and will continue to do so until we resolve things — and the faster the better.
