

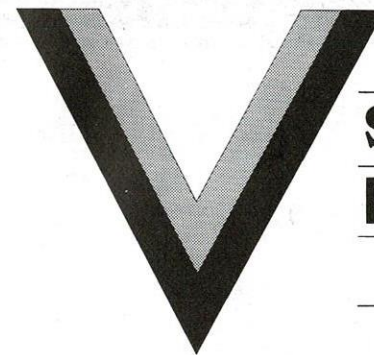

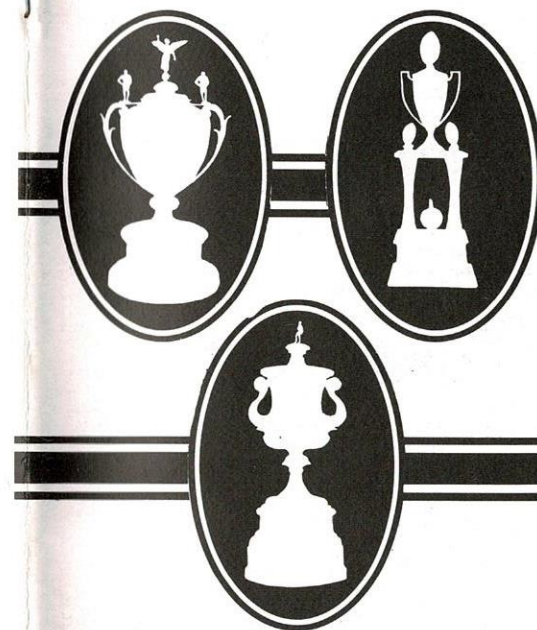

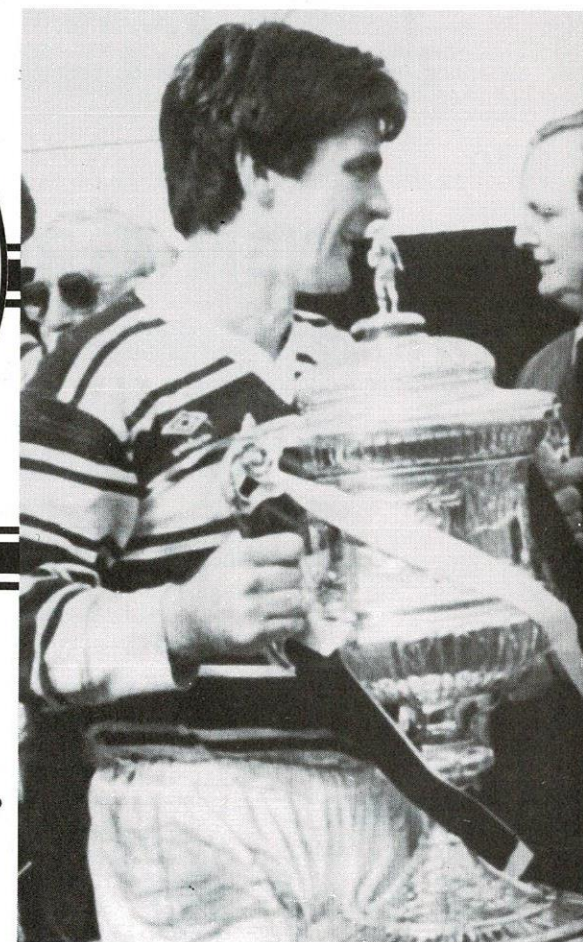

With the celebrations having died down following last weekend's memorable events we begin our assault on a fourth major Trophy today with the visit of Oldham in the first round of the Premiership. Despite the prospect of Wembley in a fortnight's time the side will be determined to make it a case of third time lucky in this particular competition for we have reached the Final for the past two years only to suffer defeats by Hull K.R. and Widnes, both at Headingley. Our opponents Oldham have made commendable progress this season after winning the Second Division title last season and now possess a side of vast potential. With Frank Myler at the helm the Lancastrians possess several outstanding youngsters including **Alan Ashton**, **Andy Goodway**, **Mick Worrall** and **Terry Flanagan** all of whom have starred for Great Britain Under 24's and Great Britain in recent months.

They come here today hoping to repeat their 5-2 league win at the Boulevard in December, one of only two home league defeats we have suffered this season.

So the First Division title comes to the Boulevard for the first time for 25 years and although that appeared a formality before our home game with Barrow the side desperately wanted to go out in style. A packed Boulevard witnessed another impressive display consistent with the form of recent weeks as courageous Barrow tried in vain to preserve their First Division status. It was ironic that despite Featherstone's home defeat by Bradford Northern our disposal of the Cumbrians ensured another season in the top flight for our Challenge Cup Final opponents.

Early proceedings hinted the possibility of a shock result as Barrow made the most of sustained possession to impose pressure on our line. Gary Kemble underlined his value with try-saving tackles on Andy Whittle and Dave Milby but once Lee Crooks had opened the scoring with a towering penalty goal, the Cumbrians were always second best despite their resilience. By the interval the title was assured as crisp, stylish football paved the way for four tries, each clinical in its execution.

Firstly Trevor Skerrett showed the pace of a threequarter to race thirty yards to score after Kevin Harkin and Lee Crooks had combined to create the opening. Shortly afterwards Mick Crane found James Leuluai in full stride and the Kiwi's perfectly timed pass left Paul Prendiville with a clear run to the line. A temporary respite for Barrow was provided by hooker Les Wall who intercepted a Keith Bridges pass to race clear, and held off Gary Kemble's challenge to score. Our next two tries were

reminiscent of so many scored this season as we reaped the benefit of our now famous runaround move. Firstly David Topliss linked with Steve Evans to leave Barrow bewildered and then Mick Crane crowned his Man of the Match performance with a classic individual effort. Breaking quickly from a scrum twenty five yards out, he sent Topliss on a dummy run before feinting and weaving across for a try near the posts. The second half opened in dramatic fashion as referee Peter Massey was forced to retire with a leg injury and he was replaced by one of the touch judges Harry Mason while a local official Steve Taylor answered a loudspeaker appeal to run the touchline. That naturally disturbed the rhythm of the game but both sides continued to produce some enthralling rugby and Barrow demonstrated that their stay in Division Two will not be long as tries by Les Wall and David Cairns made the scoreline more respectable from their point of view. Still a fitting finale was provided by our Kiwi contingent as Gary Kemble, James Leuluai and Dane O'Hara each touched down to seal one of the greatest days in the club's history. There the celebrations began as skipper David Topliss went up to receive the coveted trophy and the fans were then treated to a Hull F.C. version of the New Zealand "Haka" dance with our three Kiwis leading the routine. Then followed the traditional lap of honour and it was testimony to the loyalty of our fabulous supporters that not one ventured onto the playing area. With the Premiership and Wembley looming, Team Manager Arthur Bunting reflected; "two down and two more to go. Since we won the Cup semi-final and got to Wembley the team have been playing better and better. The Challenge Cup and League Premiership are not beyond us. I can't praise the players too highly. All of them have worked hard for it, not just those who played against Barrow. It's been a long, hard season and they've shown discipline and dedication all the way". Well done lads!

1982 - A Year to Remember

(continued)

With the Challenge Cup on the Boulevard sideboard for the first time in 68 years Hull's fans were hoping it would mark the beginning of a glorious period in the club's history. A few days following Hull's greatest night the celebrations were tarnished somewhat by the shock retirement decision of crowd favourite Sammy Lloyd. One of the most prolific goalkickers of modern times and the holder of countless records with Hull F.C. and Castleford had decided that the time was appropriate to call it a day. After joining Hull F.C. in a £12,000 deal in August 1978 Lloyd brought a new dimension to the side with his match winning qualities, never better demonstrated than in Hull's 10-5 Challenge Cup semi-final victory over Widnes at Swinton in 1980. A nightmare day at Wembley in the ensuing all Humberside final when his form deserted him shattered Sammy's confidence but "golden boots" buried the ghost two years later when his four goals kept Hull in the game against Widnes and set the stage for that thrilling 14-14 draw. The sudden loss of Lloyd was somewhat compensated by the signing of two of Hull's outstanding junior prospects, Andy Dannatt and Tony Collinson, both expected to be in the First team within three years.

As the curtain was drawn on a memorable season with a sevens tournament at the Boulevard in which Hull and Hull K.R. again competed in a final with the Robins coming out on top by 21-18, so began Hull's bid to transform the Boulevard into a stadium of international calibre. The £40,000 first stage of the ground improvement scheme involved digging up the speedway track which had surrounded the pitch for the previous 11 years. That meant Hull could widen the pitch and bring the perimeter fence forward, ultimately increasing the ground capacity by between 2,000 and 3,000.

Meanwhile the rugby continued in the form of an exhibition match in Venice between Great Britain and France. Paul Prendiville, Trevor Skerrett and David Topliss were selected to go to Italy though disappointment ensued with a narrow victory for the French.

After a short break the players were back in the training routine preparing to emulate the season's achievements of John Player Trophy and Challenge Cup winners and League Championship and Premiership runners up. That was no mean feat and Team Manager Arthur Bunting was already encountering problems with so many of his senior squad absent from training for different reasons. Kiwis Dane O'Hara, James Leuluai and Gary Kemble had returned to New Zealand to represent their country in a Test series against Australia, Lee Crooks was on Tour leading Great Britain Colts in Australasia and five players, Paul Prendiville, David Topliss, Steve Evans, Steve Norton and Trevor Skerrett were with the Great Britain squad preparing for the visit of World Champions Australia in the ensuing Winter.

After a quiet close season on the transfer scene Hull finally struck gold when perseverance paid with the £30,000 capture of Hull K.R. second row forward Paul Rose. Rose had been in dispute with the Robins for some time and Hull had persistently chased his signature so success was a great relief. Two of the customary pre-season games were staged at Boothferry Park to allow the reseeded Boulevard pitch a little more time to bind together. The Eva Hardaker Cup was retained with a 16-5

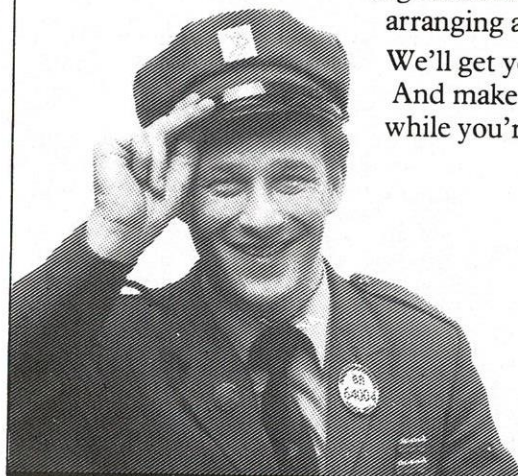

win over Castleford and a crowd of 3,000 paid tribute to Clive Sullivan in his 20 year testimonial game against his hometown club Cardiff which the Airlie Birds won 20-11.

Prior to the game Hull had made further progress in the strengthening of their squad with the signing of Keith Bridges from Bradford Northern. One of the game's best strikers of the ball former Great Britain hooker Keith was eager to make the most of an unexpected new challenge having lost his regular place at Odsal to promising youngster Brian Noble.

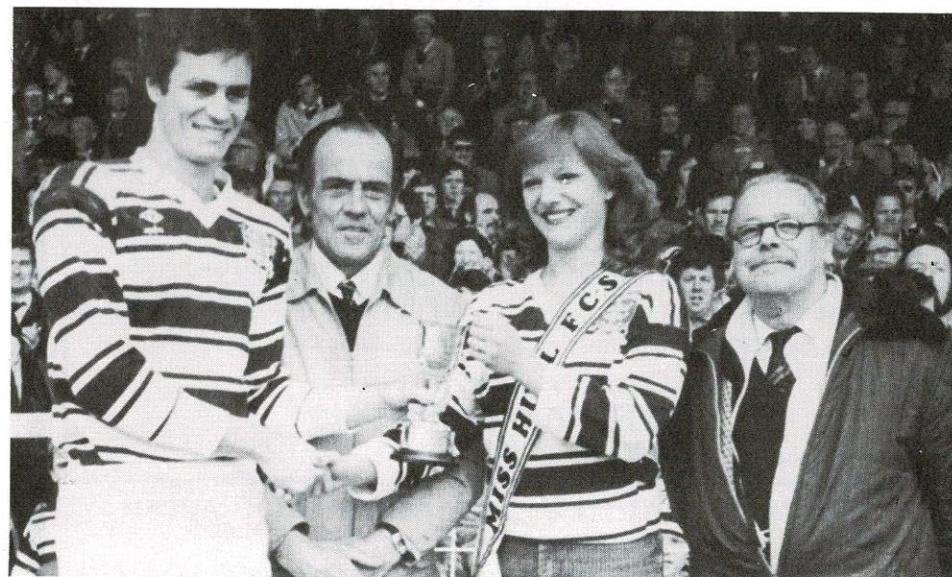
